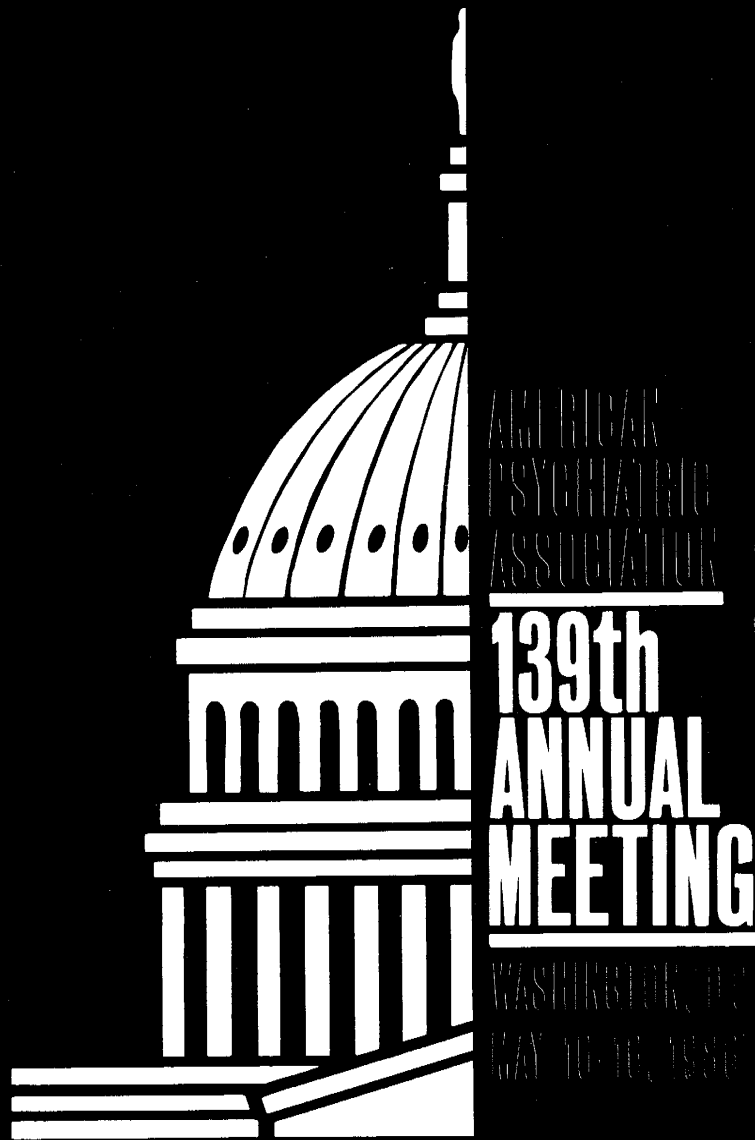

Dear Colleagues and Guests:

Welcome to the 139th Annual Meeting of the American Psychiatric Association. The Scientific Program Committee has developed an outstanding educational program and the Local Arrangements Committee has organized an array of exciting and enjoyable leisure time activities that take advantage of this wonderful city. I am delighted by the program and would like to highlight some events that have particular personal meaning.

On Monday evening, the Convocation honors Annual Award Recipients and welcomes our new Fellows. The speaker will be Helen Suzman, M.P., a distinguished member of the South African Parliament who has an historic position as a long-term crusader against *apartheid*. She is an engaging speaker with first-hand knowledge and understanding of the complex problems confronting her country. On Monday and Thursday afternoons I will be co-chairing two Presidential Symposia: "Issues in Treating Chronically Mentally Ill Women" and "Multidisciplinary Perspectives: Research and Women." On Tuesday evening there will be a special forum, "Women in the Media," in which prominent personalities in print and television will focus on the role and influence of women in areas of public information. The Public Symposium on Wednesday at noon will feature a panel of experts who will address "Family Violence." Competing for our attention at that time is another forum, "Women (and Men) in Leadership." This forum brings together four men, married to prominent women, to discuss the complexities of marriage, family, and growing older. Lectures by six International Scholars will take place throughout the week and there will be a reception for our international visitors on Sunday evening. Residents and medical students will find an increasing number of sessions relevant to their interests and concerns. I am very appreciative of their efforts and involvement in the planning of these programs. APA components have organized a number of workshops that will report on their activities and invite response.

I urge you, while in Washington, to visit your Congressional Representatives and Senators to discuss the concerns of psychiatrists and their patients. We have all experienced repercussions of discriminatory insurance provisions for psychiatric care, the inadequate benefits for patients who suffer from psychiatric disorders, and decreased funding for research and education in mental illness. These affect us now and will have major future consequences. It is important that our legislators hear our concerns.

The meeting is a most meaningful one for me, as the first woman President of the APA. It will end an exciting, productive, and extraordinarily busy term of office. I have been richly rewarded by your support and generosity, and I look forward to our continuing work on behalf of our patients and the Association.

Dear APA Members and Guests:

On behalf of the members and staff of the Scientific Program Committee, I would like to welcome you to the 139th Annual Meeting of the American Psychiatric Association. This year's meeting promises to be the most exciting scientific and educational experience in recent memory. Additionally, with the numerous social activities, you and the members of your family should have an enjoyable time.

Two new formats are being introduced at this meeting. In the Exhibit Hall throughout the week, MEET THE AUTHORS sessions have been scheduled. The authors and the books that they will discuss are listed in the *Exhibits Guide*, a new publication enclosed with your Annual Meeting packet. On Tuesday and Wednesday mornings, at the Sheraton Washington, a CONTINUOUS CASE CONFERENCE with Drs. Paul and Anna Ornstein will be held. These sessions are designed to allow psychiatrists to examine more critically the techniques and outcomes in psychotherapy. On Wednesday afternoon, Dr. Robert L. Spitzer and colleagues will hold a series of mini debates on controversial aspects of the *DSM-III-R*. I urge you to attend this session.

The *American Psychiatric Association Annual Review: Volume 5* will be summarized in PSYCHIATRY UPDATE sessions being held throughout the week. You may purchase this book along with publications from other companies at the Publishers' Book Fair located in the Exhibit Hall.

At noon on Monday RESEARCH ADVANCES IN PSYCHIATRY: AN UPDATE FOR THE CLINICIAN will be held. This session will highlight new research advances occurring in the field and will identify sessions, throughout the week, of interest to clinicians. On Thursday evening, Dr. H. James Lurie will present his play, "MUSICAL CHAIRS." This work in progress will describe the challenges and pitfalls of being a psychiatry department chairman in today's complex society. It should be an enjoyable evening. On Friday afternoon, to close the official scientific activities, psychiatric facilities throughout the greater Washington, D.C. area have sponsored scientific sessions or tours. I encourage you to consider attending these sessions as well as spending the weekend in Washington and seeing the many sights of the nation's capital.

Each of you will receive an ANNUAL MEETING EVALUATION FORM. Please take the time to complete this brief questionnaire. It is important that we hear from you on how to make next year's Annual Meeting, to be held in Chicago, Illinois, May 9-15, 1987, even better.

Your registration badge is needed to ride the shuttle buses. Bus service will be available beginning at 11:30 a.m. on Saturday, May 10 through Thursday, May 15 between the hotels and the Convention Center. For your convenience in attending sessions, an express bus will run between the Convention Center and the Sheraton Washington Monday through Thursday. APA PLACEMENT CENTER

Psychiatrists can visit the Membership Resource Center located in Exhibit Hall B, Convention Center to pick up an application form for the new, year-round Psychiatric Placement Service. Information may be obtained on the positions currently available, and employers are welcome to discuss their recruitment needs.

An On-Site Job Bank, including position listings, interview area, and message center will again be available to all mental health professionals and employers.

MESSAGE AND INFORMATION CENTER

Located in Lobby 4, Upper Level, Convention Center. Staffed during registration hours, this center serves as a locator as well as an information and message center. For 1986, the self-service message carousels will be replaced by a computer system with display monitors. Monitors will be strategically located in the exhibit hall and convention center foyers. Registrants are requested to check the monitors periodically and report to the center for message pickup. Messages not picked up by the close of the day will be held for the remainder of the week. The monitors also will indicate the names of physicians who have medical emergencies. For this reason, you are encouraged to leave a schedule of courses and activities with your home office so that in case of emergency, you may be located at the meeting. A list of persons who baby-sit will be available

at the center, however, APA does not screen applicants and takes no responsibility for them.

PRESS ROOM AND DAILY BULLETIN

Located in Room 7, Lobby Level, Convention Center. Hours of operation: Saturday, 12 noon-5:00 p.m., Sunday, 9:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m., Monday through Thursday, 8:00 a.m.-6:00 p.m. On Friday, the location will change to the Sheraton Washington and will be open 8:00 a.m.-12 noon. This room is for the use of registered press only.

All Annual Meeting sessions are open to the press *except* CME Courses, the Business Session, and Clinical and Continuous Case Conferences.

HOMETOWN RADIO INTERVIEWS

Located in Room 10, Lobby Level, Convention Center. Hours of operation: Sunday through Tuesday, 8:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m. The annual program of Hometown Radio Interviews is sponsored by the Joint Commission on Public Affairs and the Public Affairs Network.

APA PERIODICALS OFFICE

The office of the three APA periodicals, the *American Journal of Psychiatry*, *Hospital and Community Psychiatry*, and *Psychiatric News* will be located in Room 4, Lobby Level, Convention Center. Hours of operation: Sunday, 12 noon-5:00 p.m., Monday through Wednesday, 8:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m., and Thursday, 8:00 a.m.-2:00 p.m.

Staff of both journals will be available to answer authors' questions and to accept papers submitted for publication. Both journals publish only original material that has not been published elsewhere in any form and that is not being considered for publication elsewhere. Four copies are required for either journal.

The staff of *Psychiatric News* will meet daily in the office to discuss news coverage of the meeting. Persons who wish to contact members of the staff may leave messages to arrange appointments or may leave written announcements or letters for possible publication in the newspaper.

CONTINUING EDUCATION CREDIT

The American Psychiatric Association is accredited by the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education (ACCME) to sponsor continuing medical education for physicians. The official Annual Meeting program, with some exceptions, meets the criteria for continuing medical education, Category I credit. One hour of credit may be claimed by each hour of participation. As an organization accredited for continuing medical education, the APA certifies that the continuing medical education activities designated as Category I meet the criteria for Category I of the Physician's Recognition Award of the American Medical Association and the CME requirement of the APA.

All program activities are designated either Category I or Category II. Sessions designated as Category II are marked with an asterisk (*) in the Program Book.

One of the criteria for Category I certification is that a program explore one subject or closely related group of subjects in depth. To claim credit, registrants should attend a session or course in its entirety, and use the Annual Meeting *Syllabus* in conjunction with the Annual Meeting session materials.

TAPE RECORDING POLICY

Registrants are welcome to carry small tape recorders to any session they wish. Larger professional tape recorders, however, are not permitted other than those carried by personnel representing the professional taping firm authorized to tape sessions. The badges of personnel representing this firm will clearly identify them.

Child Care Services

Parents who need to arrange for care of their infants and toddlers may wish to use the child care services of The Children's Center, Inc., designed for those attending this Annual Meeting.

Infants and preschool children will be cared for during convention hours (8:00 a.m.–6:00 p.m.) Sunday, May 11 through Thursday, May 15. The Child Care Center will be located in the Sheraton Washington Hotel. The close proximity to convention activities will allow a parent to visit the child during the day or a nursing mother to attend to her child.

A well-rounded schedule of tours and cultural activities will be provided for older children.

The child care that is provided by The Children's Center, Inc., has a unique concept of providing activities for children accompanying parents to meetings.

The program is equipped to handle children from infancy to 17 years of age and concentrates on providing cultural, recreational, and educational nourishment, not just babysitting. Emphasis is placed on providing for the developmental needs of each age group.

The program was developed by, and is under the direction of Ms. Elsie T. Neeley. Ms. Neeley is a Doctoral Candidate in Education/Administration and has taught at the elementary school level for more than 20 years.

The staff of The Children's Center, Inc., is composed of teachers and student teachers with ratios of caretakers to children at: infants—three children to one caretaker; toddlers up to age four—four children to one caretaker; preschoolers—seven children to one caretaker; others—10 children to one caretaker.

Fees for registration are \$30.00 per day (8:00 a.m.–6:00 p.m.) or \$5.00 per hour. Babysitting is also available in your hotel room for \$5.00 per hour. The daily fees include a nutritious lunch and snacks.

If you did not make reservations in advance for your children, they will be welcomed on a SPACE AVAILABLE basis.

NOON FILM FESTIVAL: POLITICS, POWER, AND PARANOIA

During our history, even though we have been proud of her principles, we have periodically waxed as "paranoid" over America's governance. Although Hollywood's vision of "the system" is on the whole affirmative, movies have intermittently expressed doubts about the quality and probity of our leaders even before Frank Capra's populist fantasies.

The paranoid trend in American political cinema escalated sharply after the Kennedy assassination and the Watergate scandal. Films have shown the country menaced by sinister plots from the right or left, with conspiracy sometimes emanating from within government itself (the CIA, the military, and the White House have been favorite villains).

In the context of a hawkish conservative swing, recent examples of screen paranoia warn against the double threat of the perennial Russian adversary abroad and the "knee jerk" liberal at home.

The locale of this year's Annual Meeting provides an appropriate background for our noon film festival's meditations, serious or comic, on the uses and abuses of power in high places.

In the near future, the dissolution of NATO and a massive Russian crop failure prompt a surprise Soviet-Cuban invasion of the United States. Since the Russians want our grain intact and our government abhors the use of nuclear weaponry on its own soil, the stage is set for a conventional land war on occupied American territory. In the stunning opening sequence, a crack paratroop unit seizes the small town of Calumet, Colorado. A small group of escaped teenagers find the humiliating signature of Russian presence everywhere. The boys return to the hills, and form a classic partisan force to harass the enemy.

"Red Dawn" received a largely negative critical reaction, due in part to the extremity of its politics. It is one of the few Hollywood films of the far right both so ideologically undisguised and so well crafted. A largely unknown cast of young people give exemplary performances as the young partisans.

Taken simply as a tale of adolescent enterprise, "Red Dawn" is enormously thrilling. Many will also find its paranoid/Hobbesian vision of the human condition equally chilling. For a further discussion of the parallels between recent war movies and those of World War II, interested viewers are directed to a discussion of the "Rambo" films on Wednesday evening.

The film contains some scenes of explicit, if brief, violence.

He has served as president of the American Orthopsychiatric Association and vice-president of the National Council of Organizations for Children and Youth. Harvard University recognized his contributions to education by establishing the Chester M. Pierce Endowed Scholarship in 1973. 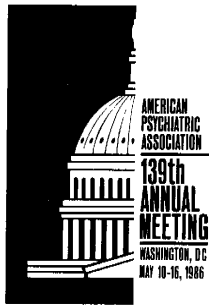

THE PSYCHIATRIST AS EXPERT WITNESS IN THE ROGERS CASE

"Rogers," the leading right to refuse treatment case has been decided. In Massachusetts no psychiatrist may give antipsychotic medication to an incompetent patient without a court order, except in an emergency. Massachusetts psychiatrists are appearing in unprecedented numbers as experts in support of petitions which seek to declare a patient incompetent to make a

decision about antipsychotic medication. Psychiatrists argue that, under a substituted judgment criterion, the patient, if competent, would take medicine. This training videotape presents a realistic dramatization of a "Rogers" hearing.

In this tape, two opposing psychiatrists are examined and cross-examined by opposing counsel, the patient testifies in her own behalf, and the Judge makes a ruling.

Both psychiatrists and counsels, one of whom argued the "Rogers" case for the plaintiffs, will be present to discuss the legal issues in the right to refuse treatment and the skills necessary for the psychiatrist to be an effective expert witness.

For more than 25 years, Fini Schulsinger, M.D., has conducted research to determine the roles of heredity and environment in the development of mental illness. He has been instrumental in the Danish adoption studies that have indicated that the offspring of people suffering from schizophrenia and alcoholism are at greater risk for these diseases whether they were reared by biological or adoptive parents.

For this work he received the prestigious Dean Award of the American College of Psychiatrists. During his lecture, Dr. Schulsinger will discuss the methods in his heredity-environment research and the major results from that research. Dr. Schulsinger is the author of 140 publications including topics on children at high-risk for schizophrenia and the American/Danish adoption studies in schizophrenia, alcoholism, and affective disorders. He also is professor and chairman of psychiatry at the Copenhagen University Municipal Medical School. The development of psychiatric care in Africa traces much of the continent's history. During colonization, psychiatric practice focused on the Western method of treatment, including construction of asylums. But as each nation gained independence, its mental health care increasingly reflected native social and cultural influences in health care. As a result, the role of traditional healers has gained recognition in African psychiatry, according to Tolani Asuni, M.D., professor and head of the Department of Psychiatry at the University of Lagos College of Medicine. A leading psychiatrist in his native Nigeria, Dr. Asuni also has spoken at numerous international conferences around the world. In addition to his expertise in modern and traditional African medicine, Dr. Asuni is known for his work in childhood disorders, criminology and law enforcement. He has served as vice president of the World Federation for Mental Health, associate secretary of the World Psychiatric Association, president of the Association of Psychiatrists in Nigeria, and President of the African Psychiatric Association. Moreover, Dr. Asuni was the general secretary of the Nigeria National Society for Criminology and was a member of the U.N. Committee on Crime Prevention and Control. From 1979 to 1984, he was director of the U.N. Social Defense Research Institute with headquarters in Rome.

Much of our knowledge about human intellectual and moral development is the result of work by Carol Gilligan, Ph.D., who has studied human motivation and moral development since she undertook her doctoral work at Harvard University. Dr. Gilligan is an associate professor at the Harvard Graduate School of Education, where she teaches several introductory and

graduate courses, including adolescent development and moral development. In addition, she has been the principal investigator for research on inner-city adolescents, the contribution of women's thinking to moral development, stress and adaptation among male and female medical students, and the development and education of high school-aged girls. Her research has given rise to 37 professional publications on human development throughout the life cycle, particularly during adolescence. Much of her work has focused on moral reasoning and sexual behavior among young adults. In addition, Dr. Gilligan has made important contributions to our understanding of changing male and female roles in contemporary society. She is author of the book, *In a Different Voice: Psychological Theory and Women's Development*, published in 1982, and she received the American Educational Research Association's Outstanding Book Award in 1983. Dr. Gilligan has shared her expertise during several seminars conducted by the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute, the Wellesley Center for Research on Women, and other organizations. Her work has been honored by numerous academic and professional associations including the American Orthopsychiatric Association which awarded her the 1985 Blanche F. Ittleson Award.

In more than 150 lectures and presentations, Dr. Cooper has discussed psychoanalytic theory and practice, current perspectives and the future of psychoanalysis, and the ways in which medical research interacts with psychoanalysis. He has served as presi-

dent of the Association for Psychoanalytic Medicine and the American Psychoanalytic Association and as vice president of the International Psychoanalytic Association. 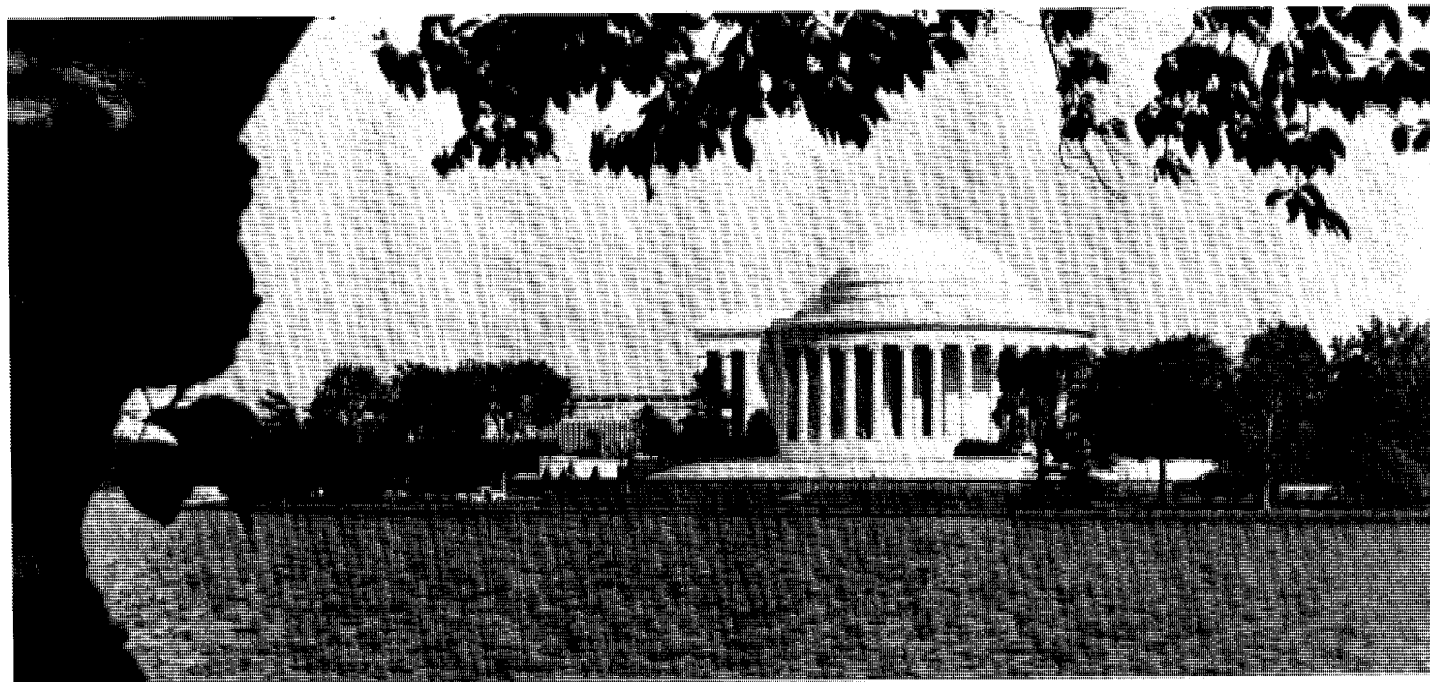

Nobel Laureate Rosalyn S. Yalow, Ph.D., will review research indicating that a certain peptide related to cholecystokinin (CCK) may be useful in treating eating disorders. However, additional research is needed before any link between CCK and appetite suppression can be established. Dr. Yalow is chair of the Department of Clinical Sciences at Montefiore Medical Center and director of the Solomon A. Berson Research Laboratory at the Veterans Administration Hospital, Bronx, New York. Her work in radioisotopes led to her development of the radioimmunoassay which measures minute concentrations of biochemical substances in the blood or other body fluids. First applied to detecting insulin concentrations in diabetics, radioimmunoassays have been successfully applied to hundreds of other medical tests. In 1976, Dr. Yalow became the first woman to receive the Albert Lasker Prize for basic medical research and in 1977, she shared the Nobel Prize for Physiology or Medicine. In 1978, the American Diabetes Association named the Rosalyn S. Yalow Research and Development Award in her honor and presented her with its Banting Medal.

DEVELOPMENTAL PSYCHIATRY COMES OF AGE

John Bowlby, M.D., one of the world's most renowned psychiatrists, is an authority on developmental psychiatry. A 1961 recipient of the APA Adolf Meyer Award, Dr. Bowlby is the first to receive the honor twice. Now honorary consultant to the Department of Children and Parents at the Tavistock Clinic, London, he has focused on studying the relationship between emotional/psychological development and mental

health. He was director of the Tavistock Institute's Human Relations Department for Children and Parents from 1946 to 1968, a consultant in mental health to the World Health Organization from 1959 to 1977 and a consultant to the National Institute of Mental Health from 1958 to 1963. In addition, Dr. Bowlby has written extensively about early life attachments or losses and their effects on later mental functioning. He will discuss studies which show that intimate relationships at each stage of life have an important influence on mental health. Included in that research is work by Mary Ainsworth, in which three major patterns of interaction are highly predictive of later personality functioning. Also to be discussed is work by George Brown, which indicates childhood and current life factors often combine to account for a larger percentage of cases of depression among women. Dr. Bowlby has received numerous awards for his work, including the Blanche E. Ittleson Award presented by the American Orthopsychiatric Association, the Salmon Medal presented by the New York Academy of Medicine, and the Distinguished Scientific Contribution Award presented by the Society for Research in Child Development.

We rarely have the opportunity to examine another Government's procedures for detaining the mentally ill when they appear potentially dangerous. This film takes us to Holland and inside their relatively luxurious detention centers for the mentally ill. Despite the relative comfort of these detention centers, we witness the extreme distress of those whose cases are reviewed unfavorably and continued to be detained by the government. Throughout his life, Richard Schifter has been active in state or national governance. Since November 1985, Ambassador Schifter has been the assistant secretary of state for human rights and humanitarian affairs. He also has been a member of the U.N. Human Rights Commission since 1983. Ambassador Schifter has long encouraged the involvement of psychiatrists in the examination of human rights in the U.S. and abroad. He held the rank of ambassador in 1984-85 when he was the deputy U.S. representative in the U.N. Security Council. But Ambassador Schifter's involvement with government didn't begin recently. An attorney in Washington, DC. since 1957, Ambassador Schifter spent much of his spare time serving for 20 years on the Maryland State Board of Education. He was president of the board for four years and vice-president for eight years. In addition, he was a member of the Executive Committee of the Board of Visitors of the Maryland School for the Deaf and chairman of the Governor's Commission for the Funding of the Education of Handicapped Children and the Maryland Values Education Commission. A native of Vienna, Austria, Ambassador Schifter moved to the United States in 1938. He was graduated summa cum laude from the City College of New York in 1943 and earned his law degree from Yale Law School in 1951.

Betty Friedan has been an important influence upon contemporary American society. Her work and writing have served as the foundation for movement toward equality between the sexes in employment, the law, and society in general. With the publication, *The Feminine Mystique*, Ms. Friedan effectively launched the women's movement in the early 1960s. Three years later, she founded the National Organization for Women and served as its president until 1970. In 1971, she was a convener of the National Women's Political Caucus. Throughout the 1970s, Ms. Friedan served as visiting professor and lecturer of sociology at Temple University, Queens College and Yale University. From 1979-81, she was a senior research associate for the Center for the Social Sciences at Columbia University, where she began her research on changing sex roles and the aging process under grants from the Ford Foundation and the National Endowment for the Humanities. From 1982-83, Ms. Friedan was a research fellow at the Harvard University Center for Population Studies. A prolific writer, Ms. Friedan's work has appeared in *Harper's*, *Saturday Review*, the *New York Times Magazine*, *McCall's*, *Ladies Home Journal*, *Redbook*, *Woman's Day* and *Social Policy*. She also authored several books, including *It Changed My Life* and *The Second Stage*. In 1975, she received the American Public Health Association Citation and the Humanist of the Year Award.

The first of these, "Perspectives on Schizophrenia," uses actors, professionals, and "real" family members to demonstrate some of the personal and system dilemmas which confront individuals who develop schizophrenia. It also looks at the experience of schizophrenia from a number of perspectives including those of the mental health agency treating the patient, a family watching their child develop schizophrenia, and that of the person experiencing frightening or persecutory delusions and hallucinations.

In government rhetoric and popular culture, our Vietnamese debacle is being filtered through a renascent patriotism to recuperate the massive wounds the war inflicted upon national pride. Ideological repositioning towards Viet Nam and an overall political swing to the right, inform the recent resurgence of the war film. Movies like "Red Dawn" and "Rambo" reinstate the

simplistic jingoism of World War II agitprop at a far more complex historical juncture.

Many of the new films focus on the Viet Nam veteran. For more than a decade after the war, movies depicted the veteran either as an urban vigilante or murderous psychotic. Tonight's presentation, "First Blood," offers a far more realistic portrayal of the veteran's emotional trauma. The film is a transitional piece, made during the first flush of economic revival. Thereafter, the veteran and the MIA have been construed as redeemers of compromised national honor, crusaders in a high patriotic rite, particularly in "Rambo: First Blood II."

Sylvester Stallone, whose talents both as actor and director have been consistently underrated by many critics, gives a powerful performance as the tormented ex-Green Beret. The excellent supporting cast includes Richard Crenna and Brian Dennehy. The film was directed by Ted Kotcheff, who also did "Uncommon Valor."

Throughout his career, Gerald N. Grob, Ph.D., has written about the history of mental health. A professor of history at Rutgers University, New Brunswick, N.J., Dr. Grob has written or edited several books about the history of mental illness and American psychiatry, including *The Inner World of American Psychiatry, 1890-1940: Selected Correspondence*, published last year, and *The State and the Mentally Ill*. He has written numerous articles and has made presentations about public policy and psychiatric care. In this lecture, Dr. Grob will point out that the late nineteenth century separation of psychiatry from asylums and the emergence of outpatient care in psychiatrists' offices helped reduce the role of psychiatric hospitals. As the ties between psychiatric care and hospitals weakened, the concept of deinstitutionalization grew stronger. Dr. Grob will describe how American psychiatry's growing emphasis on outpatient care and private practice contributes to the "attack on institutional care and the ensuing dilemma in providing basic care for the nation's chronically mentally ill." Throughout his career, Dr. Grob has received awards for his work, including the Guggenheim Fellowship in 1981, several research grants from the

During the past five years, Jack Hinckley has become one of America's leading advocates for public education about mental illness and for adequate treatment of psychiatric patients. In 1983, Mr. Hinckley stepped down as chairman and president of the Vanderbilt Energy Corporation, a publicly-owned oil company which he founded, and established the American Mental Health Fund (AMHF). The organization provides information about mental illness and works to eradicate the stigma attached to victims of mental disorders. As chairman and president of AMHF since 1984, Mr. Hinckley has traveled throughout the country giving lectures about psychiatric disorders and the devastating effects they have on patients and their families. During his lecture, Mr. Hinckley will discuss his own family's ignorance about mental illness. That ignorance perpetuated their misunderstandings about the severity of their son's mental illness. He also will discuss AMHF activities aimed at preventing other families from making similar mistakes. Mr. Hinckley has been involved in community projects for several years. In 1977 he founded Hunger Outreach, Inc. to develop food and water projects for third world countries and served as director of the Institute for International Development.

Today's psychiatrists, struggling to meet the economic constraints imposed by public and private reimbursement policies, may think their financial straitjacket is new. Not so, says Robert J. Campbell, M.D., director of Gracie Square Hospital, New York City. Economic constraints have always existed, as has rationing of health care, he will state during his presentation, "Revolutions Do Not Go Backward." The new elements are the contemporary emphasis on medicine as a competitive industry and the challenges that pose to practitioners and hospitals. Dr. Campbell will discuss those challenges as they affect psychiatrists' relations with other physicians, self-help groups, third-party payers and other entities. He will draw on expertise developed during his career as a professor, clinician and psychiatric administrator. Before moving to Gracie Square, Dr. Campbell was medical director of Four Winds Hospital, Katonah, NY. He has taught psychiatry at New York University School of Medicine since 1981 and at Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons since 1970. In addition, he is an attending psychiatrist at New York University Medical Center and St. Vincent's Hospital and Medical Center. Dr. Campbell devotes considerable time and energy to professional issues. Now Area II Trustee on the Board of Trustees of the American Psychiatric Association, he was APA's vice-president in 1980-82 and Speaker of the Assembly in 1978-79. His Association work has included membership on the committees on insurance, standards and practices, psychiatric nomenclature and government relations. Currently, Dr. Campbell is editor-in-chief of *Psychiatric News*, president of the Corporation for the Advancement of Psychiatry, secretary of the National Association of Private Psychiatric Hospitals, and Trustee of the Group for the Advancement of Psychiatry. Dr. Campbell also has contributed his knowledge to federal and state mental health agencies, including the President's Commission on Mental Health in 1977-78 and the New York Governor's Health Advisory Council's Mental Health Project Committee and Task Force on Mental Health.

Much of what we know about the nervous system and the effects of psychotropic medications in treating schizophrenics is the result of work by Julius Axelrod, Ph.D., Nobel Laureate and

renowned biochemical pharmacologist. Dr. Axelrod is guest researcher in the Laboratory of Cell Biology at the National Institute of Mental Health and former chief of the Section on Pharmacology at the NIMH Laboratory of Clinical Sciences.

His research into the actions of noradrenaline led to his discovery of catechol-methyltransferase, the enzyme that neutralizes the neurotransmitter's effects. Dr. Axelrod's continued research into the role of this enzyme broke ground in understanding not only the nervous system but also the effects of psychotropic medication. In 1970, Dr. Axelrod shared the Nobel Prize for Physiology or Medicine with Sir Bernard Katz and Ulf von Euler. During the past three decades, Dr. Axelrod has published more than 630 scientific articles about the biochemistry of the nervous system, metabolism, and drug and hormone actions. He serves on numerous scientific and editorial boards and has received many awards for his outstanding research. In addition, Dr. Axelrod is a frequent international speaker and has given honorary lectures throughout the United States, England, and Japan. During this presentation, Dr. Axelrod will present evidence linking catecholamine neurotransmitters with circadian rhythms in the pineal gland. He also will discuss the release of stress hormones and adrenocorticotropin.

Puerto Rico's leading historian, Arturo Morales-Carrion, Ph.D., has dedicated his career to bridging the gaps between his homeland and the United States. He has published numerous books, articles and book chapters on the history of Puerto Rico, Latin America, the Caribbean, and U.S.-Latin American relations. His most recent edited work, *Puerto Rico: A Political and Cultural History*, is considered the most authoritative source on the island's early and contemporary history. In addition to his writing, Dr. Morales-Carrion served on the Task Force on Latin American Affairs for President Kennedy's transition team and on the Commission on U.S.-Latin American Relations, also known as the Linowitz Commission. The commission set forth recommendations for new U.S. policies toward Latin America. Dr. Morales-Carrion increased his expertise while serving as undersecretary of state for the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico. The same year, Dr. Morales-Carrion became executive director of the Puerto Rican Endowment for the Humanities. Two documentaries, produced by Geoffrey O'Connor, an independent video and film producer, starkly and graphically show the effects of social disruption on different individuals; in one case a refugee, in another a member of a New York street gang. These provocative documentaries, "Postscript to a War" and "Shotgun," raise many issues concerning the devastating effects of the environment on individual and social survival, as well as how individuals victimized by their environments may in turn become the victimizers. "Postscript to a War" takes an in-depth look at the assimilation process and psychological adjustment of some of the 22,000 Lao, Kampuchean, and Vietnamese refugees who have settled in Pennsylvania and shows such issues as conflicts of culture between the host and immigrant communities, changing belief systems, and struggles to overcome exploited living and working conditions. "Shotgun" is a gritty cinema documentary which focuses on the life of an 18-year old unemployed, high school dropout and member of a South Bronx street gang. It follows him through the course of a year of his life on the streets, leading him from petty larceny to the rape and murder of two young girls.
