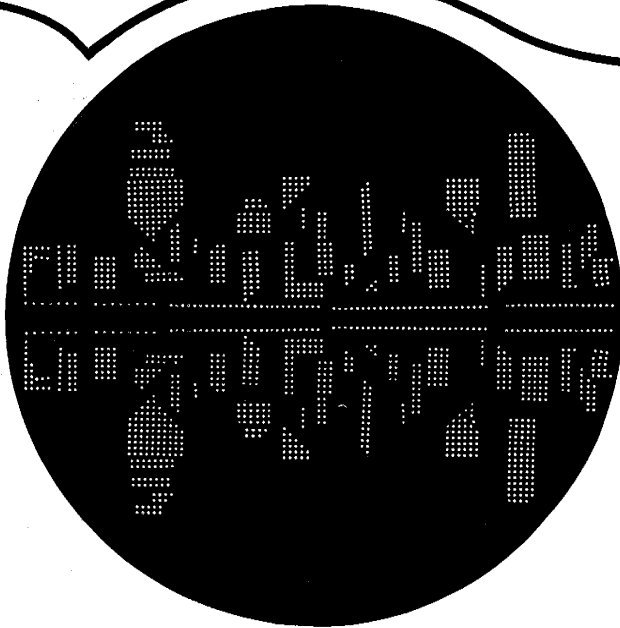

CONTINUING MEDICAL EDUCATION CREDIT

The American Psychiatric Association is accredited by the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education (ACCME) to sponsor continuing medical education for physicians. The official Annual Meeting program, with some exceptions, meets the criteria for continuing medical education, Category I credit. One hour of credit may be claimed for each hour of participation. As an organization accredited for continuing medical education, the APA certifies that the continuing medical education activities, designated as Category I, meet the criteria for Category I of the Physician's Recognition Award of the American Medical Association and the CME requirement of the APA.

All program activities are designated either Category I or Category II. Sessions designated as Category II are marked with an asterisk (*) in this Program Book.

One of the criteria for Category I certification is that a program explore one subject or a closely related group of subjects in depth. To claim credit, registrants should attend a session or course in its entirety and use the Annual Meeting *Syllabus* in conjunction with the Annual Meeting materials.

TAPE RECORDING POLICY

Registrants are welcome to carry small tape recorders to any session they wish. Larger professional tape recorders, however, are not permitted other than those carried by personnel representing the professional taping firm authorized to tape sessions. The badges of personnel representing this firm will clearly identify them.

SMOKING POLICY

In December 1986, the APA Board of Trustees approved a no smoking policy for the Annual Meeting. It states that there shall be NO SMOKING in any scientific sessions. Smoking will only be permitted in the hallways outside of the meeting rooms.

CHILD CARE SERVICES

For the convenience and peace of mind of meeting registrants and their families, APA has made arrangements for child care. The child care services will be housed in specially chosen facilities at the McCormick Center Hotel from Sunday, May 10 through Thursday, May 14. The hotel is conveniently located across the street from the McCormick Place Convention Center where most of the meeting activities will be held. The cost for each child is \$5.00 an hour or \$45.00 a day.

Sitters Unlimited is providing the child care. This well-established firm specializes in child care services for traveling families throughout the country. Individualized attention is the backbone of the service. On the basis of information provided by the parents who preregister their children for day care, *Sitters Unlimited* will design a program tailored to meet the children's needs and ages.

Activities will include arts and crafts, music, dance, toys, and games. In addition, the guaranteed ratio of child care providers to children assures that each child will continually receive careful attention.

Snacks will be available to the children, but parents of children under two years old or with special dietary needs are asked to supply appropriate food. Parents are also asked to provide lunch for their children.

The Role of Experience in Shaping Cortical Circuitry

Nobel Laureate Torsten Wiesel's pioneering work on the cortical organization and neurophysiology of vision indicates that visual experience early in life is necessary to maintain and develop the innate mechanisms of sight. These mechanisms can be modified by environmental influences during a critical period of postnatal development. Dr. Wiesel will discuss current research regarding whether various aspects of brain function, such as language, complex perceptual tasks, learning, memory, and personality, also develop according to specific programs and can be influenced by environment. Dr. Wiesel's interest in psychiatry began early; his father, Fritz S. Wiesel, was chief psychiatrist and head of Beckomberga Hospital, the largest mental institution near Stockholm. As a medical student at the Karolinska Institute in his native Sweden, he studied under Carl Gustaf Bernhard and Rudolf Skoglund. Dr. Torsten Wiesel came to the United States in 1955 to work at the Johns Hopkins Medical School in the laboratory of Dr. Stephen Kuffler, who had just published his now classical study of the receptive field arrangements of cat retinal ganglion cells. In 1959 Dr. Wiesel moved with Dr. Kuffler to Harvard Medical School and became chairman of the Department of Neurobiology there in 1973. He has collaborated with Dr. David Hubel in the landmark studies regarding the cortical organization of visual processing. Since 1983 he has headed a laboratory in neurobiology at Rockefeller University in New York.

Ethel S. Person, M.D. draws on her extensive experience in the field of psychoanalytic medicine to explore the role of romantic love in the lives of adults. Her emphasis will be on the psychological factors that contribute to the ability to achieve happy love and those that lead to self-destructive love, enslavement, and the inability to fall in love. Her other professional interests include fantasies, psychoanalytic and psychiatric education, and psychology of women. Dr. Person is director of the Columbia University Center for Psychoanalytic Training and Research and also serves as one of the Center's training and supervising analysts. She has been associated with the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Columbia University since 1965, when she joined the faculty as an instructor, and became a professor of clinical psychiatry in 1985. Dr. Person's early studies of cross-gender disorders with Dr. Lionel Ovesy stimulated her interest in normal gender development, particularly among females. She is the co-editor of *Women: Sex and Sexuality*, published in 1980, which received an Award for Excellence in the field

Terrorism, Torture and the American Psychiatrist

In recent years, a rise in state-sponsored terrorism and torture has caused tens of thousands of refugees to flee to North America. According to psychiatrist Louis Jolyon West, M.D., they are suffering from mental, emotional, and behavioral consequences that American psychiatrists will find difficult to understand and treat. Dr. West, an expert on the psychic effects of violence, will discuss the psychiatric care of victims of torture and terrorism and how it compares to the care of domestic victims of similar forms of violence. He will place the issue of psychiatric care of victims of terror in historical perspective and highlight the challenges it poses to psychiatric educators. Since 1969 Dr. West has been professor and chairman of the Department of Psychiatry and Biobehavioral Sciences at the University of California, Los Angeles, School of Medicine, psychiatrist-in-chief of UCLA Hospital and Clinics, and director of UCLA's Neuropsychiatric Institute. He has written extensively about his far-ranging interests, which include violence, cult behavior, alcoholism, hallucinogenic drugs, the 1960's counterculture, and hypnosis. Dr. West has been influential in shaping mental health policy in this country and served on advisory committees to the Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare and to the Veterans Administration. He has received numerous awards and honors, including the Benjamin Rush Gold Medal Award, presented to him by the American Psychiatric Association in 1973.

The Trauma-Stress Disorders: An Outline and Overview

Award-winning researcher Lenore C. Terr, M.D. will describe the trauma-stress disorders, a class of conditions precipitated by extreme external events that cause repetitive behavior, fear, and a sense of "futurelessness." The category is broader than that of post-traumatic stress disorders and can be subdivided into three types: Type I, single-blow trauma; Type II, multiple-blow or variable-blow stress; and Type III, glancing-blow trauma. Dr. Terr is a private practitioner of child psychiatry in San Francisco, and a clinical researcher on the effects of psychic trauma. She is clinical professor of psychiatry at the University of California, San Francisco, and a lecturer in law and psychiatry at the Berkeley and Davis campuses of the University of California. Dr. Terr received her medical training at the University of Michigan, and remained in Ann Arbor to complete an internship in pediatrics at the University of Michigan Medical Center, a residency in psychiatry at the University of Michigan Neuropsychiatric Institute, and a fellowship in child psychiatry at the University of Michigan Children's Psychiatric Hospital. Dr. Terr has written extensively on the effects of psychic trauma on children. She has received the Blanche F. Ittle-

son Research Award from the APA for her studies on the victims of the Chowchilla schoolbus kidnapping.

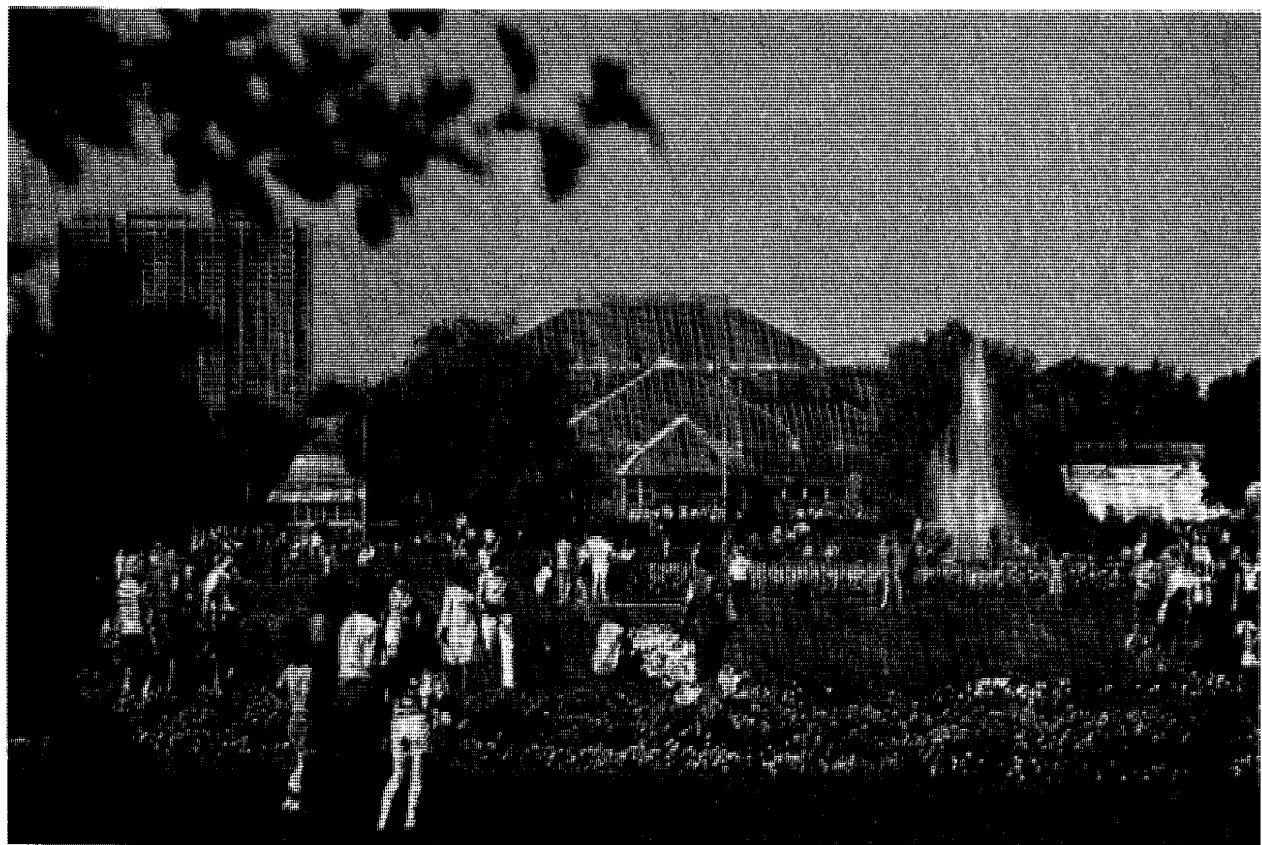
Where Has Adolescence Gone?

Through a Skull Darkly: Seeing the Brain

Nancy C. Andreasen, M.D., a specialist in brain imaging, describes the centuries-old efforts of both artists and scientists to depict the brain. In the last decade, these important but preliminary attempts to comprehend the brain's complexities have given way to a range of revolutionary brain imaging techniques. Dr. Andreasen reports that these techniques allow us to observe the formation of cognitive functions and the transmission of chemical messages between nerve cells and even pinpoint areas of excessive or deficient activity present in mental illness. Since 1981 Dr. Andreasen has been professor of psychiatry at the University of Iowa, where she earned her M.D. in 1970. Prior to her medical training, she received a doctorate degree in English and joined the faculty of the University of Iowa in 1963 as an assistant professor of English. In 1973, she returned to the University of Iowa as an assistant professor of psychiatry. Dr. Andreasen draws on her literary training in her roles as associate editor and book forum editor of the *American Journal of Psychiatry*, associate editor of *Schizophrenia Bulletin*, and editorial board member of several psychiatric journals. She is the author of several books on psychiatry for laymen, including *Understanding Mental Illness: A Layman's Guide* (1974) and *The Broken Brain: The Biological Revolution in Psychiatry* (1984). She is also editor of the schizophrenia section of the *American Psychiatric Association Annual Review: Volume 3*. Winner of the Menninger Award for Psychiatric Research, Dr. Andreasen's current research projects include studies of magnetic resonance imaging in the major psychoses, and of clinical heterogeneity of schizophrenia in monozygotic and dizygotic twins. She is one of the investigators conducting the NIMH Collaborative Study of Depression and immediate past-president of the Psychiatric Research Society.

Miles F. Shore, M.D. takes a critical look at how well psychiatric training and experience prepare psychiatrists for administrative and leadership roles. Dr. Shore believes that psychiatrists' basic understanding of psychological conflict and unconscious motivation, and their knowledge that irrationality is part of everyday life, are assets in administrative and leadership positions. He says, though, that the pitfalls of the psychiatrist/administrator include inappropriately applying clinical concepts in the board room, choosing a passive nondirective stance when authority is called for, and relying on psychodynamic explanations when other frameworks would be more suitable. Born in Chicago, Dr. Shore received his medical degree from Harvard Medical School, and has spent most of his professional career in Boston. Since 1975, Dr. Shore has been Bullard Professor of Psychiatry at Harvard Medical School, and area director and superintendent of the Massachusetts Mental Health Center, while serving as head of its Department of Psychiatry. He was formerly director of Community Psychiatry, and Associate Dean for Community Affairs at Tufts University Medical School. Dr. Shore has served as a consultant to a wide variety of community agencies, clinics and hospitals, including the Tufts-Delta Health Center in Mound Bayou, Mississippi, and is senior program consultant and director of the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's program for the chronically mentally ill. A 1965 graduate and faculty member since 1973 of the Boston Psychoanalytic Institute, Dr. Shore considers applied psychoanalysis to be his primary research interest.

Benjamin Rush: Psychiatrist, Physician, and Social Reformer

To celebrate the 140th anniversary of the American Psychiatric Association's Annual Meeting, physician and historian Ilza Veith, M.D. will profile Benjamin Rush, the founding father of American psychiatry and a signer of the Declaration of Independence. Dr. Veith will chronicle Benjamin Rush's outstanding achievements as a psychiatrist, general physician, and epidemiologist. She will describe Dr. Rush's efforts to reform American society by advancing the causes of peace, abolition, and equal educational opportunities for women, and the antagonism with which his views were often met. Dr. Veith, a native of Germany, attended medical school in Geneva and Vienna, and came to the United States in 1937. In 1947 she was awarded a Ph.D. in the history of medicine from the Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, the first time this degree had been awarded

in the United States. From 1947 to 1957, Dr. Veith served as a consultant in Far Eastern Medicine to the Armed Forces Medical Library, now the National Library of Medicine. From 1949 to 1963 she taught the history of medicine at the University of Chicago, first as a lecturer and later, from 1951 to 1956, as assistant professor, and associate professor, from 1956 to 1963. Dr. Veith was editor of *Medicine and Biology* at the University of Chicago Press between 1951 and 1953. In 1964 she was appointed professor of the history of medicine at the University of California Medical Center, San Francisco, and soon after was named vice-chairman of the Department of the History of Health Sciences. In 1967 she joined the Department of Psychiatry at UCSF as a full professor. Dr. Veith has published eight books and 100 scholarly and scientific articles and is often invited to lecture about the medicine of bygone eras and foreign cultures.

Second, community mental health programs and integrated approaches to health care are gaining organizational support. Professor Sethi will discuss existing trends, and provide guidelines for the future. Dr. Sethi is professor and head of the Department of Psychiatry at King George Medical College in Lucknow, India and director of the Sanjay Gandhi Postgraduate Institute of Medical Sciences, also in Lucknow. He is an active promoter of communication among psychiatrists and has traveled to countries around the world, including the Soviet Union, Switzerland, Japan, Mexico, England, West Germany, Canada, and the United States. Dr. Sethi has considerable familiarity with Western psychiatry, having received his psychiatric training at the University of Pennsylvania, and having served as visiting professor at Downstate Medical Center (SUNY) and at Mount Sinai Medical School in New York. Dr. Sethi is a prolific researcher, and has completed numerous studies of psychotropic drugs for the World Health Organization. He serves as editor-in-chief of the *Indian Journal of Psychiatry*, the official journal of the Indian Psychiatric Society.

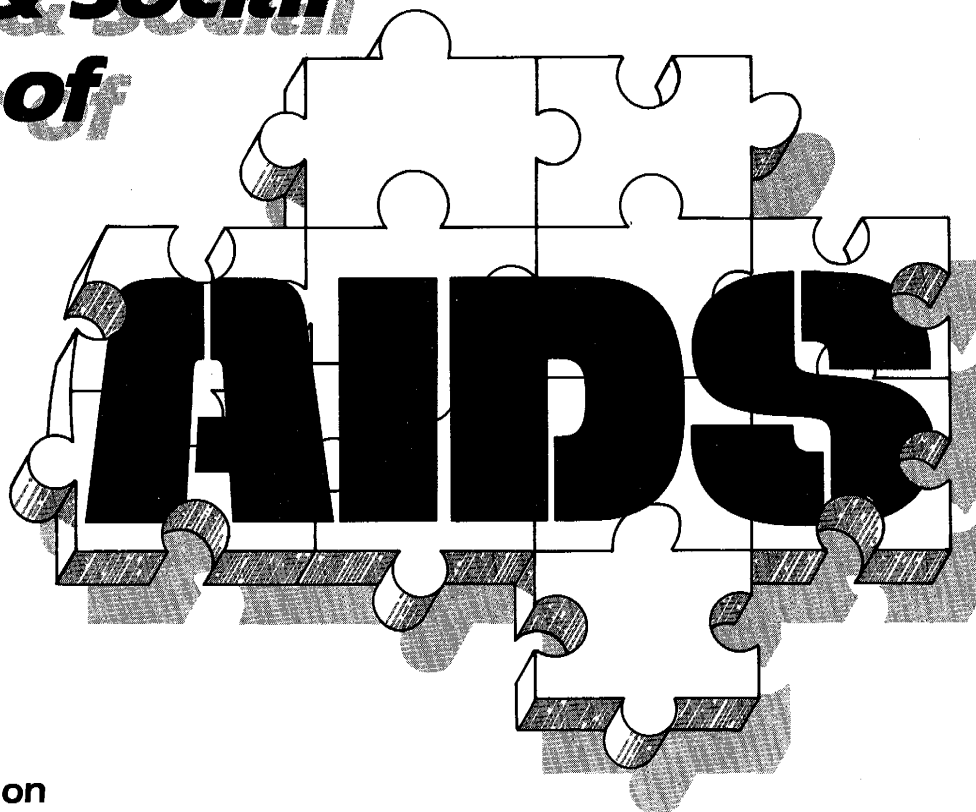

Henry H. Work, M.D., former Deputy Medical Director of the American Psychiatric Association, reflects upon the sometimes stormy relationship between the disciplines of psychiatry and pediatrics. The title of Dr. Work's lecture, "The Menace of Psychiatry: II," is drawn from an article written in 1931 by Dr. Joseph Brennermann, which warned pediatricians of the "menace" posed by the "invasion" of psychiatrists into pediatrics. Soon after the article was published, he matriculated at Harvard Medical School. He went on to play an important role in the maturation of child psychiatry. He is a Life Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association, the American Academy of Pediatrics, and the American Orthopsychiatric Association. Now retired from the APA, Dr. Work is professor emeritus at UCLA School of Medicine, where he had formerly been acting chairman of the Department of Psychiatry. He retains clinical professorships at George Washington University, the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences, and Georgetown University in Washington, D.C., and is past president of the Group for the Advancement of Psychiatry. He is also a consultant to the APA's Scientific Program Committee, and is president-elect of the Washington Council of the American Academy of Child Psychiatry.

**A Critical Look at Psychiatric Diagnosis:
Where Are We and Where Should We Go?**

Chairperson of the American Psychiatric Association's Work Group to Revise *DSM-III*, Robert L. Spitzer, M.D. will examine the current state of psychiatric diagnosis to identify where the most work is needed. This lectureship is being given in the publication year of *DSM-III-R*, the midpoint between the 1980 publication of *DSM-III* and the expected publication of *DSM-IV*. His talk on psychiatric diagnostic classification will discuss the definition of mental disorder, the empirical basis for the operationalization of diagnostic concepts in specified diagnostic criteria, the reliability of psychiatric diagnosis, diagnostic distinctions of questionable validity, the public perception of the process of resolving controversies about diagnosis, and concordance between *DSM-IV* and *ICD-10*. Since 1976 Dr. Spitzer has been chief of psychiatric research in the Biometrics Research Department of the New York State Psychiatric Institute, a branch of the New York State Department of Mental Hygiene. He has been a member of the Department of Psychiatry of the Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons

since 1961 and a full professor since 1979. Dr. Spitzer has contributed to the development of 13 psychiatric assessment instruments, including the widely used Global Assessment Scale, the Schedule for Affective Disorders and Schizophrenia, and the Research Diagnostic Criteria. He has published extensively on issues related to the assessment and diagnosis of psychiatric illnesses, and has served on the World Psychiatric Association Section on Nomenclature and Classification and the Task Force on *ICD-10* of the American College of Surgeons.

Observing Violence: A Latin American View

Psychiatrist and epidemiologist Carlos A. León, M.D. examines the rising tide of violence in Latin America and the bewildering array of social, psychological, economic, and political conditions with which it is connected. He outlines methods for studying the problem of violence in Latin America, which he views as one of the region's most difficult problems, and suggests ways in which psychiatrists can help. Dr. León was born in Guaranda, Ecuador, and received his M.D. at the Universidad Central de Quito. Since 1957 he has been a professor of psychiatry at the medical school of Universidad del Valle in Cali, Colombia, and has been chairman of the Department of Psychiatry there. He is currently director of the World Health Organization Collaborative Centre for Research and Training in Mental Health, also in Cali. Dr. León received a masters degree in epidemiology from the Tulane Medical School, where he is visiting professor of psychiatry. He is a fellow of the American College of Epidemiology and was president of the Colombian Psychiatric Society. Dr. León sits on the Panel of Experts in Mental Health of the World Health Organization. He was awarded the Simon Bolivar Medal by the Ministry of Education of Colombia. Dr. León is the author of 85 publications, including a chapter on the history of psychiatry in Latin America, published in Howell's *World History of Psychiatry*.

Currently president of the Carnegie Corporation of New York, psychiatrist David A. Hamburg, M.D. has been a national leader in medicine, science, and public policy for nearly three decades. Dr. Hamburg was president of the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences from 1975 to 1980. Subsequently, he became director of the Division of Health Policy Research and Education at Harvard University, and was president of the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS). He chaired the Department of Psychiatry at Stanford University throughout the 1960s. He has served on many policy advisory boards, including the Naval Operations Executive Panel, the Advisory Committee on Medical Research of the World Health Organization, and the Board of Trustees of Rockefeller University and Mount Sinai Medical Center. In addition to health policy, his areas of expertise include the psychobiology of stress, conflict, and adaptation and the links between biomedical and behavioral science. Together with Jane Goodall, Dr. Hamburg is the author of two articles on chimpanzee behavior, and was co-editor with M.H. Trudeau of *Biobehavioral Aspects of Aggression* (1981). He recently wrote about the emergent risks of prejudice, ethnocentrism, and violence in *Science*.

"Double Indemnity" depicts a sordid affair between two thoroughly unadmirable characters; a second-rate insurance salesman and a cold-blooded schemer who seduces him into murdering her husband. The film was given little chance of success by Hollywood pundits. No leading man was eager to play such a heel, including Fred MacMurray, who agreed to the role only because he thought his studio wouldn't let him. (They did, hoping it would ruin his career.) The director, Billy Wilder, feuded constantly with the script-writer, Raymond Chandler.

Nevertheless, "Double Indemnity" turned out to be the season's surprise smash hit, and is prized today as one of the first, finest masterpieces of the gritty expressionist genre French film theorists called *film noir*. MacMurray and Barbara Stanwyck are marvelous as the sleazy lovers. Edward G. Robinson excels as a tough fraud investigator with an unexpected soft spot for MacMurray. A cast of excellent character actors and a fine score by veteran composer Miklos Rozsa round out this vintage "existential" thriller.

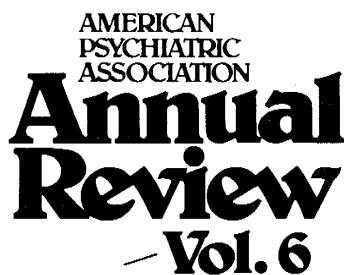

Robert Jay Lifton, M.D. is Distinguished Professor of Psychiatry and Psychology of the City University of New York, John Jay College of Criminal Justice, the Graduate School and University Center, and Mount Sinai Medical Center. He served on the faculty of Yale University School of Medicine, becoming Foundations' Fund for Research Professor of Psychiatry. Throughout his career, he has been particularly interested in the relationship between individual psychology and historical change, and in the problems surrounding the extreme historical events of our era. He has played an active role in the formation of the new field of psychohistory. Dr. Lifton will discuss his recent study of Nazi doctors to show how a psychological approach can be used to expose evil and then to combat it. His book, *The Nazi Doctors: Medical Killing and the Psychology of Genocide* was recently published, bringing to nearly 20 the number of scholarly books he has authored or edited. Dr. Lifton has been widely honored for his efforts on behalf of humankind. 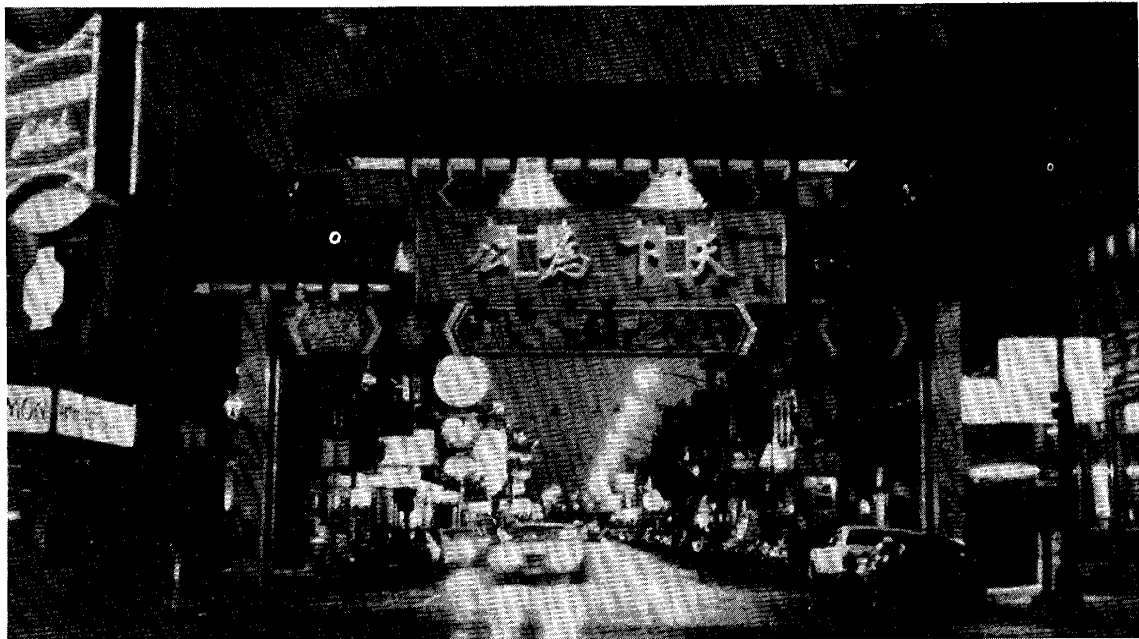

As chief of the Division of Child Development at Boston's Children's Hospital, Dr. Brazelton has developed a method of assessing a child's strengths and deficits, and has used this Neonatal Behavior Assessment Scale, which is in use in over 400 centers around the world. He has been a member on the faculty of Harvard Medical School since 1953, and is currently clinical professor of pediatrics. Dr. Brazelton has been a member of the board of directors of the American Association for Child Care in Hospitals, chairman of the Section on Child Development of the American Academy of Pediatrics, and director of the National Center for Infant Mental Health. He is currently president-elect of the Society for Research in Child Development. He has won numerous awards for his contributions to the field of child development. Dr. Brazelton has his own weekly national cable television show "What Every Child Knows", and writes a regular column for *Family Circle*. He has written several popular books about children and families, including *Toddlers and Parents: A Declaration of Independence* (1974), *Doctor and Child* (1970), and *Working and Caring* (1985).

What sorts of relationships do people form with computers? How do these relationships affect their values, ways of think-

ing about the world, and ways of seeing themselves and others? Sherry Turkle, Ph.D., associate professor of sociology at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT), has investigated these questions about the "subjective side" of people's relationships with technology in her book *The Second Self: Computers and the Human Spirit* (1984). Dr. Turkle, a summa cum laude graduate of Radcliffe College in 1970, joined the faculty of MIT in 1976 after earning a joint doctorate in sociology and personality psychology from Harvard University. Dr. Turkle has also written on the sociology and politics of psychoanalysis. Her book, *Psychoanalytic Politics: Freud's French Revolution* (1978), traces the development of a "French Freud" in the years following the student uprising of 1968. The book recounts how psychoanalytic ideas were poeticized and politicized in a uniquely Gallic manner, reversing long-standing French hostility to psychoanalytic theory. Dr. Turkle has been awarded the Guggenheim Fellowship, the Rockefeller Humanities Fellowship, the Mellon Fellowship of the Aspen Institute for Humanistic Studies, and the Dantforth Fellowship. In January 1985, she was named one of *Ms. Magazine's* Women of the Year for 1984. She was also selected for *Esquire Magazine's* 1985 Registry of "America's New Leadership Class."

Founder and president of the Children's Defense Fund (CDF), Marian Wright Edelman, LL.B., has been an influential and powerful advocate for disadvantaged Americans. The CDF has become one of the nation's most active organizations concerned with the full range of family issues, especially those affecting America's children, whom Mrs. Edelman calls "the poorest Americans." Founded in 1968 as the Washington Research Project, the CDF monitors and proposes improvements in federal and state budgets and develops legislative and administrative policies in the areas of welfare aid, child and maternal health, education, child care, child welfare, adolescent pregnancy prevention, youth employment, and family support systems. She is the first Black woman to pass the Mississippi bar. Mrs. Edelman graduated as valedictorian of Spelman College in 1960, and received her LL.B. from Yale Law School and joined the NAACP Legal Defense and Education Fund as a staff attorney in 1963. Mrs. Edelman has been recognized many times for her exceptional ability and leadership. She was named one of 200 young American leaders by *Time* magazine in 1971.
