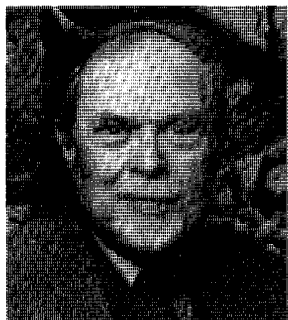

Dear APA Members and Guests:

On behalf of the members and staff of the Scientific Program Committee, I would like to welcome you to the 1988 Annual Meeting of the American Psychiatric Association. The Scientific Program Committee has continued several changes in the overall organization of the meeting which began last year and has placed particular emphasis on several newer formats. Additionally, the Local Arrangements Committee has planned a number of enjoyable activities to capitalize on the beauty and wonder of Montreal.

The Opening Session will again be held on Sunday evening, May 8, from 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m.; scientific sessions will begin at 9:00 a.m., Monday, May 9; the Business Meeting will be held on Monday, from 12:30 p.m. to 2:00 p.m.; exhibits will be open until 6:00 p.m. on Sunday through Wednesday; the Publishers' Bookfair and the Membership Resource Center will open at noon on Saturday, May 7; and the meeting will end at 5:00 p.m., Thursday, May 12. Each of you will receive an *ANNUAL MEETING EVALUATION FORM*. Please take the time to complete this brief questionnaire. In keeping with the Presidential theme, "Opportunities and Challenges for Psychiatrists and Psychiatry: 1988-2000," and the desire of APA members to have more interaction with meeting participants, the Program Committee has organized sessions for clinicians to meet informally with prominent colleagues (Discussion Groups), to discuss difficult cases with experts in the field (Clinical Consultation With Series), to hear how distinguished psychiatrists would assess and treat selected patients (Clinical Case Conferences), and to see experienced clinicians conduct psychotherapy (Continuous Clinical Case Conference).

At 10:45 a.m. on Monday, in the Convention Centre, "Research Advances in Psychiatry: An Update for the Clinician" will be held. This session will highlight new research findings in psychiatry and will summarize their clinical implications. Additionally, the *American Psychiatric Press Review of Psychiatry: Volume 7* will be summarized in Review of Psychiatry sessions being held from Monday afternoon through Wednesday afternoon. You may purchase this book and other publications at the Publishers' Bookfair located in the Exhibit Hall.

Since this meeting completes my fourth and final year as Scientific Program Committee Chairperson, I wanted to thank all of the staff who work on the Annual Meeting, especially the staff of the Meetings Management Office and the Office to Coordinate the Annual Meeting. I specifically want to thank Ms. Cathy Earnest, Director of the Office to Coordinate the Annual Meeting, and my Assistant, Ms. Sandy Landfried, for their enthusiasm and dedicated service. APA PERIODICALS

The office for the *American Journal of Psychiatry* and *Psychiatric News* will be located in Room 317, Third Floor, Convention Centre. Hours of operation: Sunday, May 8, 10:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m. and Monday, May 9 through Thursday, May 12, 8:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m.

The staff of *Psychiatric News* will meet daily in the office to discuss news coverage of the meeting. Persons who wish to contact members of the staff may leave messages to arrange appointments or may leave written announcements or letters for possible publication in the newspaper.

American Journal of Psychiatry staff will be available to answer authors' questions and to receive papers submitted for publication.

The staff of *Hospital and Community Psychiatry* will be located in the Membership Resource Center. Hours of operation are the same as the Resource Center. They will be available to answer authors' questions and to accept papers submitted for publication.

Both journals publish only original material that has not been published elsewhere in any form and that is not being considered for publication elsewhere. Four copies are required for either journal.

CONTINUING MEDICAL EDUCATION CREDIT

The American Psychiatric Association is accredited by the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education (ACCME) to sponsor continuing medical education for physicians.

The official Annual Meeting program, with some exceptions, meets the criteria for continuing medical education, Category I credit. **One hour of credit may be claimed for each hour of participation.** As an organization accredited for continuing medical education, the APA certifies that the continuing medical education activities, designated as Category I, meet the criteria for Category I of the Physician's Recognition Award of the American Medical Association and the CME requirement of the APA.

All program activities are designated either Category I or Category II. Sessions designated as Category II are marked with an asterisk (*) in this *Program Book*.

One of the criteria for Category I certification is that a program explore one subject or closely related group of subjects in depth. To claim credit, registrants should attend a session or course in its entirety, and use the Annual Meeting *Syllabus* in conjunction with the Annual Meeting materials.

TAPE RECORDING POLICY

Registrants are welcome to carry small tape recorders to any session. Larger professional tape recorders, however, are not permitted other than those carried by personnel representing the professional taping firm authorized to tape sessions. The badges of personnel representing this firm will clearly identify them.

SMOKING POLICY

In December 1986, the APA Board of Trustees approved a no smoking policy for the Annual Meeting. It states that there shall be **NO SMOKING** in any scientific sessions. Smoking will only be permitted in the hallways outside of the meeting rooms.

CHILD CARE

For the convenience of meeting registrants and their families, the APA, with assistance from the Local Arrangements Committee, has made arrangements for child care during the meeting. The child care service will be housed in a permanent child care facility located just five minutes from the Convention Centre at 69 Sherbrooke Street, West, and will operate Sunday, May 8 through Thursday, May 12, 8:00 a.m.-6:00 p.m. The cost for each child is \$5.00 (US\$) per hour or \$45.00 (US\$) per day. On-site registration will be handled by the center, and they can be reached by calling 876-4455.

The center will be operated by "garderie l'enfantreluche," a firm established in 1981 to serve corporate employees in downtown Montreal. The center is equipped with a home-style kitchen, washrooms, toys and art materials for different age groups, and mattresses for naps with necessary bed linens.

Staffing will consist of one bilingual day care monitor per four to five children, an experienced day care manager and a cook to serve a morning/afternoon snack and a hot meal at lunch. Luncheon menus are planned by a dietician.

Daily activities will incorporate arts and crafts, music, dance, plays, games, and toys. Additionally, daily educational visits to the planetarium, Olympic stadium, fire stations, etc. will be planned for appropriate age groups.

Psychology of Terror

Retired Colonel Harry C. Holloway, M.D., a member of the U.S. Army Medical Corps for more than 30 years and an expert in human adaptation to stress, discusses in his talk how terror manifests itself in our everyday lives. Managing terror, Dr. Holloway asserts, is a challenge to human life as they attempt to create a human life.

A widely admired physician, educator, and officer, Dr. Holloway graduated with a medical degree from the University of Oklahoma School of Medicine in Oklahoma City in 1958 and completed his residency training in psychiatry at the Walter Reed General Hospital

in Washington, D.C., in 1962. From 1965 to 1969 he was chief of the Department of Neuropsychiatry, USA Component, at SEATO Medical Research Lab in Bangkok. In 1970, he was appointed director of neuropsychiatry at Walter Reed Army Institute of Research (WRAIR). He left WRAIR in 1977 to become professor of psychiatry at the P. Edward Hebert School of Medicine, at the Uniformed Services University in Bethesda. In 1979 he became chairman of the department.

Among his many military honors are the U.S. Army Commendation Medal, which he received in 1969, the Meritorious Service Medal (1971), the Legion of Merit (1973), and the Defense Superior Medal (1987). He became a fellow of the American Psychiatric Association in 1975, and was awarded the William P. Clements Award, given to the outstanding military educator at the Uniformed Services University, in 1983.

Dr. Holloway's wide-ranging expertise is evidenced by his participation on a number of NASA committees and panels, including one to study behavioral aspects of long-term space residence and travel. He also helped review behavioral studies for Space Lab and the space shuttle. He is currently Chairman of NASA's Life Sciences Advisory Board, President of the Washington-Baltimore Center of the A. K. Rice Institute for the study of group relations. Dr. Holloway is an author of more than 30 publications, including several articles about Vietnam veterans.

Varieties of Human Experience

John C. Nemiah, M.D., editor of the *American Journal of Psychiatry* since 1978, reaffirms the importance of Adolf Meyer's fundamental principle that the ultimate understanding of psychiatric illness must be based on the study of the individual's life experiences and how he has used them, whether in success or in failure.

For most of his career, Dr. Nemiah has been affiliated with Harvard Medical School, from which he gradu-

ated cum laude in 1943. Returning to the department of psychiatry in 1948, he became an assistant professor in 1963 and a full professor in 1968. In 1985 he was named professor emeritus. Between 1968 and 1985 he was also psychiatrist-in-chief at Beth Israel Hospital in Boston and is now psychiatrist-in-chief emeritus there. Currently he is professor of psychiatry at Dartmouth Medical School in Hanover, New Hampshire, and a member of the clinical staff at Mary Hitchcock Memorial Hospital in the same city.

Trained in psychoanalysis at the Boston Psychoanalytic Institute from 1951 to 1957, Dr. Nemiah was president of the American College of Psychoanalysts in 1980-81 and of the American College of Psychiatrists in 1981-82. He was vice-president of the Group for the Advancement of Psychiatry from 1973 to 1975 and president between 1975 and 1977. He has been an associate editor of *Psychosomatic Medicine* since 1957 and was book review editor for 15 years ending in 1976. He has been the editor of *Advances in Psychosomatic Medicine* since 1969. He is a fellow of the American Psychiatric Association, the American College of Psychiatrists, the American College of Psychoanalysts, and the Royal Society of Medicine. The recipient of the 1979 Bowles Award from the American College of Psychiatrists, Dr. Nemiah is the author of *Fundamentals of Psychopathology*, published in 1969, and an editor or author of more than 100 other books and articles.

Author, poet, and children's writer, Judith Viorst was born and raised in New Jersey. She received a B.A. in history, Phi Beta Kappa, from Rutgers University. In 1981, after six years of study, she graduated from the Washington Psychoanalytic Institute, where she is currently a research affiliate member. She is a regular columnist and contributing editor for *Redbook* magazine.

Mrs. Viorst is the author of *Necessary Losses*, which has been a national bestseller since its publication in 1986, as well as two other books of prose. She has written nine children's books and six collections of poems, including *The Village Square* (1965), *People and Other Aggravations* (1971), and *When Did I Stop Being Twenty and Other Injustices* (1987).

Her many awards include an Emmy Award in 1970 for poetry used on the Ann Bancroft Show; Holland's Silver Porcell Award in 1973 for *The Tenth Good Thing About Barney*; the Spirit of Achievement Award in 1975, from Albert Einstein College of Medicine, for poetry and journalism; and the American Academy of Pediatrics Award in 1977 for her article on the psychological aspects of hospitalization in *Redbook* magazine.

Professor Sir Martin Roth

Developments in Classification of Mental Disorders and the Scope of Biological Psychiatry

A fellow of Trinity College in Cambridge, and professor emeritus of psychiatry at the University of Cambridge, Professor Sir Martin Roth has studied the

mental disorders of late life for more than 35 years. His investigations have encompassed many aspects of the disorders, from the clinical to the psychometric, epidemiological, and neurobiological. His wideranging research also has included examination of affective disorders and the phobic and anxiety neuroses, especially their classification, course, treatment response, and etiology, as well as the actions of electroconvulsive therapy.

Professor Roth trained in neurology with the late Lord Brain before embarking on his psychiatric training at Maudsley Hospital, where he studied with Eliot Slater and Aubrey Lewis. Later he studied in Scotland with the late Professor W. Mayer-Gross. A good portion of his productive career, 20 years, was spent at the University of Durham and Newcastle-upon-Tyne, where he was chairman of the department of psychiatry and director of the Medical Research Council Group. In 1976 he was elected as the first chair of psychiatry at the University of Cambridge.

Professor Roth is coeditor of the *British Journal of Psychiatry* and serves on the editorial board of a number of psychiatric journals. He was one of the authors, with Drs. Meyer-Gross and Slater, of the textbook *Clinical Psychiatry*, soon to be in its fourth edition. He is a distinguished fellow of the American Psychiatric Association and honorary fellow of the American College of Neuropsychopharmacology, the Canadian Psychiatric Association, and the Royal College of Psychiatrists of Australia and New Zealand.

Knighted by Queen Elizabeth in 1972, he is the recipient of a myriad of awards and honors, including the Salmon Medal of the New York Academy of Medicine (1988), the Kraepelin Gold Medal of the Max-Planck Institute in Munich (1986), the Sandoz Prize of the International Gerontological Association (1985), and the Gold Medal of the Society of Biological Psychiatry (1980).

First president of the Royal College of Psychiatrists between 1971 and 1975 and now an honorary fellow, Professor Roth has served as scientific member of the Medical Research Council of Great Britain and is a member of its Clinical Research Board. He has served the World Health Organization in a number of capacities, most recently as a consultant in its efforts to develop studies of mental disorders in the aged.

**The Many Quests of Psychiatry:
How Can the Future Fulfill Them All?**

Can the psychiatrist continue to gain satisfaction in a world of growing financial and social pressures, increased use of psychiatrists as medical consultants, more and more regulation of professional practices, and an explosion of knowledge in the neurosciences and social sciences? According to Joel Yager, M.D., professor of psychiatry at UCLA, the answer is yes.

Young psychiatric residents, Dr. Yager believes, still have the opportunity to pursue the same intellectual quests their elders did. How psychiatry can fulfill these quests in the future is the subject of Dr. Yager's lecture.

Educating young psychiatrists is an area with which Dr. Yager is quite familiar, having served since 1973 as director of residency education at UCLA's clinical campuses, the Brentwood Veterans Administration Medical Center in West Los Angeles and the Neuropsychiatric Institute. He is also associate chief of staff for residency education at the Brentwood VA. Since 1981 he has been director of the eating disorders clinic at UCLA and has written extensively about those disorders as well as about other subjects, including psychiatry in primary care settings and stress and coping. He is the editor of several books and more than 120 articles and chapters in all.

A native of New York City, Dr. Yager graduated summa cum laude from the City College of New York. Assisted by a Jonas Salk medical scholarship from the city of New York, he attended medical school at Albert Einstein College of Medicine, graduating in 1965. After completing residency training at Bronx Municipal Hospital Center, he served for two years as a staff psychiatrist in the 63rd Army Medical Corps in Fort Ord, California, which prompted him to join the faculty at the University of California at San Diego. There he served as medical director of University Outpatient Services and chief of the consultation-liaison service at San Diego Veterans Administration Medical Center.

A fellow of the American Psychiatric Association since 1982, Dr. Yager was a Ginsburg Fellow of the Group for the Advancement of Psychiatry in 1968-70 and was elected to Phi Beta Kappa in 1960 and Alpha Omega Alpha in 1963. He was president of the American As-

sociation of Directors of Psychiatry Residency Training in 1979-80. He is a consultant to several television studios, including Lorimar Productions and Aaron Spelling Productions and is contributing editor for psychiatry on "Physician's Journal Update," seen on the Cable Health Network.

After being brought back, she talked with her counselors and met with Dr. Harry W. Parad, the director. She responds to his friendly, forthright approach designed to help her realize the background and effect of her behavior, to renegotiate a contract, and establish a new level of commitment. He makes use of normalizing some of her reactions, setting short-term goals and agreeing on support and payoff. His use of the desert metaphor helps reorient Priscilla's outlook and motivation.

The arrival of 20th century technology has rendered the "gentleman bandit's" trade obsolete. After an abortive attempt to go straight, Bill sees *The Great Train Robbery* at a local nickelodeon, and heads for the last frontier, Canada, to update his old profession in greener territory.

Based on actual events, *The Grey Fox* contains a lovely evocation of the turn-of-the-century Canadian Northwest. It features shrewdly observed performances by the estimable Richard Farnsworth as the aging, courtly thief; Kate Flynn as his unexpectedly feisty ladylove; as well as a host of salty minor characters.

The film played to excellent worldwide reviews, and reasonable box office, but never received the attention it deserved. Possibly its dry wit and low-keyed anti-heroics failed to attract a wider audience in the age of *Star Wars*. Some violence and sexual innuendo make *The Grey Fox* only marginally acceptable for children.

Professor Jules Angst

Similarities and Differences Between Unipolar and Bipolar Disorders: Premorbid Personality, Course, and Outcome

Swiss psychiatrist, Professor Jules Angst, describes in his lecture the results of 25 years of research comparing the premorbid personality, clinical course, and family history of patients with major depressive disorder and those with bipolar affective disorder. These data, he believes, can help clinicians working with patients with these conditions to make decisions about maintenance medication and genetic counseling.

Dr. Angst is professor of psychiatry and head of the research department at the Psychiatric University Hospital Burghoelzli in Zurich. He graduated from the University of Zurich School of Medicine in 1952 and received the degree of Doctor of Medicine in 1953. In 1961 he completed his training in psychiatry and psychotherapy. He has been affiliated with Zurich's Psychiatric University Hospital since 1953, when he began residency training there. A senior staff member since 1961, he became an assistant professor of clinical psychiatry in 1967 and assumed his present positions in 1969.

Dr. Angst is a founding member of the International College for Psychosomatic Medicine and of the World Federation of Societies of Biological Psychiatry. He is a corresponding member of the American Psychiatric Association, the American College of Neuropsychopharmacology, and the German Society of Psychiatry and Neurology. He holds an honorary membership in the American Psychopathological Association and the Royal College of Psychiatrists and is a member of 13 other Swiss and international professional organizations.

Managing editor of *European Archives of Psychiatry and Neurological Sciences*, Dr. Angst is also editor of the *Journal of Affective Disorders*. He also serves on several advisory and editorial boards. Honored at home and

abroad, he is the recipient of many awards, including the Otto Naegeli Award for Advancement of Medical Research (1983). Dr. Angst was also awarded a medal from the Akademia Medica Wratislavenensis (1975), a diploma from Mexico's La Legion de Honor Nacional (1977), and an Honorary Doctorate from the University of Heidelberg (1988). In 1985 he was the recipient of a medal and the Andrew Woods professorship at the University of Iowa.

**The Gender of the Therapist as a
Parameter in the Transference**

Dr. Lester, professor of psychiatry at McGill University in Montreal, explores the significance of gender in the unfolding of the therapeutic process. A close study of the role of gender in psychoanalysis, she contends, indicates that the vicissitudes of transference differ significantly depending on the gender of the therapists and the patients. Her talk will concentrate on two particular aspects of transference between the female therapist and the female patient.

Born in Greece, Dr. Lester graduated with distinction from Athens University Medical School in 1953. She received a Fulbright Scholarship from the United States in 1954 and the next year began her training in psychiatry at McGill University, from which she received a diploma in psychiatry in 1959. She became a fellow in psychiatry of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada in 1963. She trained in psychoanalysis at the Canadian Institute of Psychoanalysis between 1962 and 1968.

In addition to teaching at McGill, Dr. Lester is director of the child and adolescent service at Allan Memorial Institute. She is associate editor of the *Canadian Journal of Psychiatry* and a member of the editorial board for North America for the *International Journal of Psychoanalysis* and the *International Review of Psychoanalysis*. She also serves on the editorial board for the *International Journal of Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy*. A past president of the Canadian Psychoanalytic Society, Dr. Lester is an author of more than 30 articles published in scientific journals and six book chapters.

Anatoly Koryagin, M.D.

Medicine Used Against Man: Psychiatry's Role

Anatoly Koryagin, M.D., was imprisoned in the Soviet Union for six years because of his outspoken stance against the use of psychiatry for political purposes in that country. Because of his strong belief that the physician's first loyalty should be to his or her patients rather than to the State, he was severely punished and discredited in the country of his birth. There is potential for medicine to be used against man in any country, but Dr. Koryagin shows how, in the Soviet Union, the physician's view of the world is formed in the process of his or her training from childhood. He describes the conditions under which they must carry out their professional duties and how harmoniously the two identities, that of the doctor and that of the citizen, are combined in each individual. The Soviet propaganda apparatus forms a special sort of person, according to Dr. Koryagin, and he explains why Soviet physicians serve humanitarian ideals in such different ways.

Dr. Koryagin graduated from Krasnoyarsk Medical Institute in 1963 and worked for four years as a psychiatrist in Abakan. In 1970, he completed graduate studies at the Research Institute for Neurology and Psychiatry in Kharkov and became Deputy Head Doctor of the Krasnoyarsk Regional Psychiatric Hospital in Kyzy. In 1978, he became the Psychiatric Consultant at the Kharkov Regional Psychiatric Clinic. In 1979, he offered his services as the Psychiatric Consultant to the Moscow Working Commission to Investigate the Use of Psychiatry for Political Purposes and gathered evidence that "mentally sane people in the Soviet Union are declared to be mentally ill and condemned to live as such." In February 1981, Dr. Koryagin was arrested and spent the next six years in prison and labor camps where he was brutally beaten and underwent months of hunger strikes to protest conditions in these facilities.

Just prior to his arrest, Dr. Koryagin wrote, "... I have not committed any criminal acts. My arrest and prosecution I regard as a predictable act in a logical chain of reprisals by the authorities, as their revenge for my participation... in the Working Commission. The diagnosis of mental illness is my professional duty and can be discussed only by competent professionals, not by the KGB, the Procuracy or a court. The outcome of the investigation and trial is predetermined. I refuse to take part in them as examples of blatant illegality..."

Dr. Koryagin was released from prison on February 18, 1987 and emigrated to Switzerland in April, 1987. Two months later he was stripped of his Soviet citizenship by the authorities of that country.

The Role of Behavioral Scientists in Understanding and Controlling Terrorism

Dr. Ferracuti, professor of criminological medicine and forensic psychiatry at the University of Rome, outlines the role he believes psychiatrists can play in understanding and controlling terrorism. According to Dr. Ferracuti, psychiatrists can help in describing the "terrorist mindset," assessing the impact of terrorism on the public, analyzing the messages of terrorists to evaluate the seriousness of their threats and their potential for carrying them out, and assisting victims of terrorism. He believes they can even contribute to the resocialization of convicted terrorists.

Dr. Ferracuti graduated cum laude from the University of Rome Medical School in 1951, earned a diploma from the University's Postgraduate Training School of Forensic Medicine in 1955 and the "Libera Docenza" in Criminal Anthropology, in 1960. Affiliated with the University continuously since 1951, Dr. Ferracuti was professor of criminology in the University's law school between 1966 and 1973, when he became professor on the faculty of medicine. In 1982 he also assumed professorship in the Postgraduate Training Schools of Penal Law, Forensic Medicine and Medical Psychology and was named director of the Postgraduate Training School in Clinical Criminology and Forensic Psychiatry. Between 1956 and 1977 he was also affiliated with the University of Puerto Rico.

Fluent in Italian, English, and Spanish, Dr. Ferracuti has been active in the work of the United Nations on several occasions, beginning as early as 1963 when he worked for more than a year as Social Affairs Officer in the Social Defense Unit at U.N. headquarters in New York City, administering fellowship and technical assistance projects in Latin America and Asia. From 1968 to 1973 and again in 1980, he served as consultant to the United Nations Social Defense Research Institute in Rome, and from 1980 to 1981, he consulted on U.N. projects related to drugs and crime and to kidnapping in Sardinia.

A corresponding fellow of the American Psychiatric Association and a fellow of the American Psychological Association, Dr. Ferracuti is an author of nearly 200 scientific publications about criminal behavior, violence, terrorism, and other topics in human behavior. He has served his native Italy in several capacities, including as an instructor in forensic psychology and criminology for state police officers from 1965 to 1981 and as a consultant to the Ministry of the Interior on anti-terrorism and social science from 1978 to 1981.

The Joys, the Sorrows, and Other Challenges**

Medical Director of the American Psychiatric Association since 1974, Melvin Sabshin, M.D., highlights some of the special problems and opportunities faced by those who administer large medical associations. Among the keys to success, he believes, is reasonable control of narcissism, aggressivity, and flexibility. Furthermore, he emphasizes some unique aspects of national medical associations which require special attention.

As chief executive of APA, with a membership of more than 34,000, Dr. Sabshin is responsible for the day-to-day administration of a wide range of educational, government relations, and service programs that seek to improve the quality and availability of psychiatric care. Dr. Sabshin became medical director of APA after a full career in psychiatric practice, medical education, and research. He was professor and head of the department of psychiatry at the University of Illinois Abraham Lincoln School of Medicine from 1961 to 1974 and acting dean of the medical school in 1973-1974. In 1967, while on sabbatical, he was a fellow at the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences in Palo Alto, California.

A native of New York City, Dr. Sabshin received his medical degree from Tulane University School of Medicine in 1948. He continued at Tulane throughout his residency training, from 1949 to 1952, and while completing a Public Health Service Fellowship in Psychiatric Research, in 1952-1953. He was trained in psychoanalysis at the Chicago Institute for Psychoanalysis from 1955 to 1961.

Active in international psychiatry, Dr. Sabshin is a distinguished fellow of the psychiatric associations of Egypt, Hong Kong, and Australia and New Zealand, and an honorary fellow of the World Association for Social Psychiatry. He was a member of the board of the World Federation for Mental Health and in 1983 was elected to serve on the executive committee of the World Psychiatric Association. He also served as president of the American College of Psychiatrists in 1973-1974. The author or coauthor of more than 100 scientific articles and five books, Dr. Sabshin was the recipient, in 1981, of the Currier Foundation's Fifth Annual Nolan D.C. Lewis Award for Outstanding Contributions to the Field of Mental Health. In 1986, the American Psychiatric Association honored him with the Distinguished Service Award, established in 1964 by the Board of Trustees to honor members whose distinguished careers have ennobled the profession of psychiatry.

The Help Novelists Offer Us

Story tells us of the complexity of life (its ironies and ambiguities) by capturing its fullness, rather than reducing it to one-dimensional formulations, according to psychiatrist and author Robert Coles, M.D. Throughout his career, Dr. Coles has demonstrated a commitment to both psychiatry and literature, as well as to numerous social causes, including race relations, early childhood education, literacy, rural housing, and medical education for South African Blacks. A native of Boston, Dr. Coles has been a research psychiatrist at Harvard University Health Services since 1963. He gives a course at Harvard Medical School on *Medicine and Literature*. He is also a favorite lecturer of undergraduates at Harvard University, where he earned an undergraduate degree himself in 1950. He has received over 30 honorary degrees from various universities and colleges across the country.

Major Affective Disorders: Towards a Psychobiology of Recurrence

Recent longitudinal studies have confirmed what Krapelin and his predecessors observed long ago: ma-

for affective disorders are, by nature, recurrent. In his lecture, Frederick K. Goodwin, M.D., scientific director of the National Institute of Mental Health and director of the Institute's Intramural Research Program, explores three current approaches to investigating the biology of recurrence in the affective disorders: one, the "pharmacological bridge," based on the amine-depletion hypothesis of depression; another on the postulated analogy between rapidly cycling bipolar illness and the neurophysiological phenomena of kindling and sensitization, and the third concerning the regulation of circadian and seasonal rhythms.

Dr. Goodwin received an M.D. from St. Louis University School of Medicine in 1963. In 1965, after completing psychiatric residency training at the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill, he joined the Intramural Research Program at NIMH. He was named chief of the clinical research unit of the Laboratory of Clinical Sciences' section on psychiatry in 1968, and chief of the section in 1973. He was appointed chief of the clinical psychobiology branch in 1977 and director of the Intramural Research Program in 1982.

As director of NIMH's Intramural Research Program, the largest of its kind in the world, Dr. Goodwin directs a staff of approximately 500, nearly half of whom are researchers. The program is comprised of 20 branches or laboratories at three campuses and operates with an annual budget of nearly \$52 million. Since 1986 Dr. Goodwin has increased the program's involvement in AIDS research, particularly in the areas of psychopathological risk factors and the activity of the AIDS virus in brain and its interactions with neuropeptides. In 1986 he was appointed AIDS coordinator of the Alcohol, Drug Abuse, and Mental Health Administration, and chairman of the subgroup on behavior, neuroscience, and addiction of the Public Health Service's executive task force on AIDS.

An accomplished investigator in his own right, Dr. Goodwin has focused most of his research on biological and psychological factors in major depressive illness and in manic-depressive illness, and he was the first to report the antidepressant effects of lithium in a controlled study. He is the recipient of several major research awards in his field, including the A. E. Bennett Award from the Society of Biological Psychiatry (1970), the Hoffwimer Prize for Research from the American Psychiatric Association (1971), the International Anna-Monika Prize for Research in Depression (1971), the Taylor Manor Award (1976), and the Edward A. Strecker Award (1983). He is a member of the editorial boards of *Acta Neurologica*, *Archives of General Psychiatry*, *Neuropsychobiology*, and the *Journal of Clinical Psychopharmacology*. He is also the founder and

coeditor-in-chief of *Psychiatry Research*. He is the author of more than 350 publications, is one of only five psychiatrists on the *Current Contents* list of the most frequently cited scientific authors in the world, and is one of only 12 psychiatrists listed in *The Best Doctors in the U.S.*, by John Peckham.

During his lecture, medical historian Charles E. Rosenberg, Ph.D. will describe the evolving view of late nineteenth century practitioners toward the emerging category of nervous conditions: neurasthenias, phobias, and varied states of depression and anxiety. These conditions challenged earlier convictions in the relationship between body and mind, according to Dr. Rosenberg, and led to the development of "a varied set of responses and elaborations" to explain the new category of illnesses.

A professor at the University of Pennsylvania since 1968, Dr. Rosenberg was chairman of the department of history during 1974 and again between 1979 and 1983. He has been affiliated with the university since 1963. He is the editor of several multi-volume collections, including *Medical Care in the United States: The Debate Before 1940* (33 volumes, 1984); *The History of Hereditarian Thought* (32 volumes, 1984); *Sex, Marriage, and Society* (35 volumes, 1974, coedited with Carroll Smith-Rosenberg); and *Medicine and Society in America* (47 volumes, 1972). The author of more than 50 published articles, Dr. Rosenberg is currently serving in the last year of a three-year appointment as editor of *Isis*.

Dr. Rosenberg earned an M.A. from Columbia University in 1957 and a Ph.D. in 1961. He was fellow of the Johns Hopkins University Institute of the History of Medicine in 1960-61, Guggenheim Fellow in 1965-66, recipient of the Senior Fellowship of the National Endowment for the Humanities in 1972-73, Rockefeller Humanities Fellow in 1976-77, fellow of the Institute for Advanced Study in 1979-80, and fellow of the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences in 1983-84. Other honors include receiving the William H. Welch Medal from the American Association for the History of Medicine in 1969 and serving as president of the Society for the Social History of Medicine in 1981.

These two powerful and compassionate films present complimentary views about the experiences and concerns of the mentally ill. *Four Lives* is a documentary about patients seeking treatment for manic depressive disorder. We become intimately involved with them and their families as they wrestle with symptoms, with the acceptance of the diagnosis, the vicissitudes of treatment and the ongoing problems of living with a chronic illness, however well-controlled. The vivid capturing of their pain and hope in the setting of a modern clinic will help professionals and others respond to patients with greater empathy.

The second film, *Not Crazy Like You Think*, blends documentary and dramatic art, as members of Solidarite Psychiatrie, a mutual support group for patients, meet to re-enact and discuss scenes from their own past lives. The technique provides exquisite insight into the experience of patients, who too often have their feelings discounted as symptoms and their behavior reduced to illness. The group members' courage in remembering and reliving pivotal moments in their lives makes a strong statement about human dignity that the viewer will not forget.

The discussion will focus on the importance of the merging patient self-help movement for improving the lives of patients and influencing professionals and makers of health policy.

lecture whether reforms undertaken under the policy of "glasnost" will enable Soviet psychiatry to reenter the world psychiatric community. Much will depend, according to Dr. Koryagin, on whether new laws protecting the rights of the mentally ill are enforced.

Dr. Koryagin was born in 1938 in Kansk, USSR. He graduated from Krasnoyarsk Medical Institute in 1963 and worked for four years as a psychiatrist in Abakan. In 1970 he completed graduate studies at the Research Institute for Neurology and Psychiatry in Kharkov and became deputy head doctor of the Krasnoyarsk Regional Psychiatric Hospital in Kyzyl. In 1978 he became a consultant at the Kharkov Regional Psychiatric Clinic.

In 1979, while working as psychiatric consultant to the Moscow Working Commission to Investigate the Use of Psychiatry for Political Purposes, Dr. Koryagin gathered evidence that "mentally sane people in the Soviet Union are declared to be mentally ill and condemned to live as such." His study, entitled "Unwilling Patients," was published in 1981 in *The Lancet*.

In February 1981 Dr. Koryagin was arrested. Following his conviction, he was sentenced to seven years of imprisonment and five years of exile. After one year in Perm labor camp, he was transferred to Chisol Prison, where he remained for three years. In 1985, his health declining, he was sentenced to two more years imprisonment at Perm for "resisting the authorities." Upon his return, he was immediately taken to the camp hospital. In February 1987, he was released, largely due to pressure from a host of individuals and organizations around the world, including the American Psychiatric Association. Dr. Koryagin emigrated from the Soviet Union on April 26, 1987, and now resides in Switzerland.

Only a select group of scientists can boast of being the sole author of a paper published in *Science*, and fewer still of accomplishing it in the same year they received their Ph.D., but those are among the many distinctions held by John R. Sladek, Jr., Ph.D. Dr. Sladek is professor and chairman of neurobiology and anatomy at the University of Rochester School of Medicine, a position he has held since 1987. In 1987 he was named the University's Killian and Caroline Schmitt professor.

Dr. Sladek graduated from Carthage College with a degree in biology and chemistry in 1965. At Northwestern University Medical School he studied biostructure and anatomy, graduating with a master of science degree in 1968. In 1971 he received a Ph.D. in anatomy from the University of Health Sciences/Chicago Medical School. He joined the University of Rochester School of Medicine as an assistant professor of anatomy in 1973 and has remained there ever since.

Dr. Sladek is editor-in-chief of *Experimental Neurology*, editor of *Brain Research Bulletin*, and a member of the Editorial Advisory Board of *Neurobiology of Aging*. Throughout his career his peers have recognized him as a scientist of unusual merit. He was named in Sigma Xi's *Outstanding Young Men and Women of America* in 1972, and *American Men and Women of Science* in 1981. In the same year, he was also named in *Who's Who in the East*. The Society for Neuroscience named him Grass Visiting Scientist in 1984 and Grass Traveling Scientist in 1987. He was the Burton Baker Memorial Lecturer at the University of Michigan in 1985, Jahnke-Peole Memorial Lecturer at Duke University in 1986, Annual Distinguished Neuroscience Lecturer at the University of Cincinnati in 1986, and Lecturer of Note in Neuroscience at Ohio State University in 1987. He received the Carthage College Distinguished Alumni Award in 1983.

Dr. Sladek has written more than 100 scientific articles and is coeditor with D. M. Gash of the book *Neural Transplants: Development and Function*, published by Plenum Press.

The Unique Case

Clinical examination of patients with the same neurological disorders, especially ones that are more complex, reveals that no two conditions are the same. In neurologist Oliver W. Sacks, M.D., "this must mean that higher cerebral functions themselves become personalized, ... and are determined by historical, no less than inborn, determinants." The way in which our brains become our own has been illuminated by some very recent findings which will be the subject of Dr. Sacks' remarks.

Clinical professor of neurology at Albert Einstein College of Medicine in New York, Dr. Sacks has achieved prominence as a physician, writer, and humanist. His book *Migraine: Evolution of a Common Disorder*, published in 1970, questioned the prevailing medical view of migraine headaches and established Sacks as an important and unconventional thinker. In *Awakenings*, published in 1973, Sacks chronicled his attempts to treat patients in a New York charity hospital who had contracted sleeping sickness during the pandemic of 1916-17 and who had been all but forgotten in the ensuing years. More recently he has published *A Leg to Stand On*, a 1984 book recounting his recovery from a leg injury and paralysis, and *The Man Who Mistook His Wife for a Hat and Other Neurological Tales*, published in 1985. He has also written about the uses of L-DOPA and about unusual neurological phenomena.

Born in London to two physicians, Dr. Sacks studied medicine at Queens College in Oxford, and at Middlesex Hospital in London, graduating in 1958. After a two-year internship at Middlesex, he completed residency in the United States, training at Mt. Zion Hospital in San Francisco in 1961-62 and at UCLA from 1962 to 1963, one year of which was spent studying pathology and neuropathology. Affiliated since 1963 with Albert Einstein College of Medicine, Dr. Sacks told *Current Biography* that his "essential work (and habitat) is in chronic hospitals, charity hospitals, asylums, homes, etc." For more than 20 years he has been a consultant in neurology at Beth Abraham Hospital, Bronx State Hospital, and several clinics and homes for the aged and chronically ill.

Various critics have recently addressed a fundamental and possibly durable deterioration in the Hollywood film. David Denby states that "American movies, the liveliest in the world a decade ago, have become an object of contempt."

This paper anatomizes an arch-signifier of Hollywood's compromised quality, the "McMovie." It constitutes the industry's major output today. It is a film hallmarked by a

monumental vacuity; a central impoverishment of means, ends, and ideology which cuts across genre. Like the selling of the "Big Mac," merchandising the "McMovie" is privileged over its content. The shortfall between huckster promise and product bankruptcy is correspondingly blatant.

The "McMovie's" characteristics are discussed at length, then the possible reasons for its ascendance are explored, including relentless commodification in the context of the search for enormous profits; the influence of rampant narcissism within and outside the industry; and the impact of television practice, cocaine, and mounting cultural illiteracy.

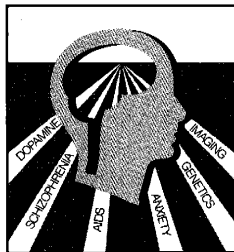

1. To explore the kinds and extent of medical evidence needed by the Social Security Administration for making determinations of disability.
2. To examine how the Social Security Administration processes a disability claim and makes a decision that a person meets the definition of disability as outlined in the Social Security Act, using the medical information provided by the treating physician.
3. To inform interested physicians how their medical records can assist their patients who apply to the Social Security Administration for disability benefits.

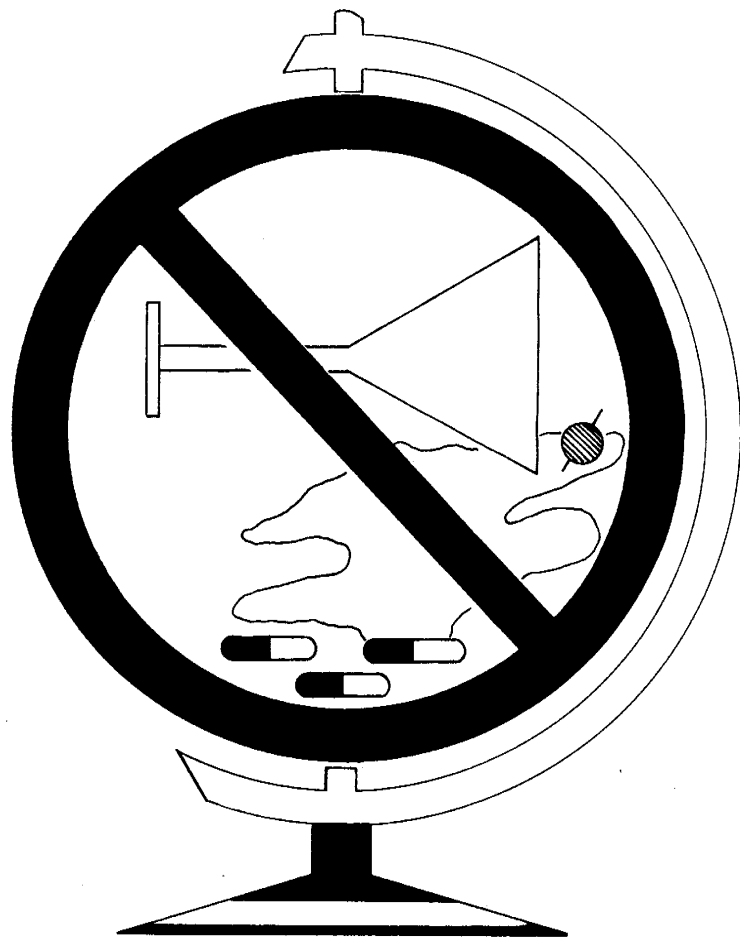

Professor Serge Lebovici

Contribution of the Psychopathological Approach of the Infant to General Psychiatry

Professor Lebovici's remarks will focus on the interactions between infants and their parents, an area of clinical practice and research that he believes deserves to be better known by psychiatrists. Disharmony in the interactions between infants and their parents may entrench the relationship in vicious circles, says Professor Lebovici. If identified in therapeutic consultation, these cycles can be interrupted through practical, preventive actions.

Dr. Lebovici is director of the department of biological and social psychiatry of the child and his family at the Medical School of Bobigny, University of Paris, North. He was a full professor in child and adolescent psychiatry at the University between 1978 and 1985, when he became professor emeritus. From 1972 until 1978 he was associate professor of child psychiatry at the University Marie et Pierre Curie in Paris. He is founder of the Centre Alfred Binet for community health psychiatry, located in Paris. Beginning in 1978 he was psychiatrist-in-chief for eight years at University Hospital Avicenne.

Honorary president of the International Society of Adolescent Psychiatry, Dr. Lebovici is president-elect of the World Association of Infant Psychiatry and Allied Disciplines. He was president of the International Association of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry and Allied Professions between 1966 and 1970 and president of the International Psychoanalytical Association for a four-year term beginning in 1973.

Dr. Lebovici is currently coordinator of the Clinical Researches Network on Early Interactions and their Vicissitudes at the French National Institute for Health and Medical Research. He is the author or editor of several books and close to 500 papers about the child and adolescent. His books have been translated into English, German, Spanish, and Portuguese.

Balance Versus Integration

Renowned clinician and educator Richard I. Shader, M.D., argues that despite significant advances in the understanding of mind, brain, and behavior, the clinical practice of psychiatry remains torn by competing or sectarian camps advocating either a biological or a psychosocial approach to mental illness. Dr. Shader speaks today about how psychiatric training programs can overcome the polarization within psychiatry by integrating, rather than balancing, these therapeutic models.

Dr. Shader is professor of psychiatry and chairman of the department at Tufts University School of Medicine and psychiatrist-in-chief at New England Medical Center Hospital, positions he has held since 1979. He is also clinical professor of psychiatry at Tufts University School of Dental Medicine. Broadly trained in many aspects of psychiatric practice, including psychopharmacology, Dr. Shader graduated from the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute in 1970. He received an M.D. from New York University School of Medicine in 1960 and undertook residency training at the Massachusetts Mental Health Center in Boston in 1961-62 and 1964-65. Between appointments at the mental health center, he trained at the National Institute of Mental Health in Bethesda. He was a member of the Harvard Medical School faculty from 1964 to 1979, for the last nine years as associate professor of psychiatry.

Dr. Shader is a fellow of the American Psychiatric Association and the American College of Neuropsychopharmacology. From 1976 to 1984 he was director of the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology and in 1984 went on to serve as president. Between 1984 and 1987 he was a member of the National Advisory Mental Health Council of NIMH and ADAMHA. He currently sits on APA's Task Force on the International Education Project and the Psychiatry Test Committee (Part II) of the National Board of Medical Examiners. He is also a member of the National Advisory Committee of the Veterans Administration Cooperative Studies Program.

Editor-in-chief of the *Journal of Clinical Psychopharmacology* since 1980, Dr. Shader was named by *Boston Magazine* as a "Superdoctor" in 1981 and a "Shrink's Shrink" in 1984. He is the author, coauthor or editor of more than 400 scientific articles and 11 books, including *Clinical Handbook of Psychopharmacology* (coedited with A. DiMascio, 1970), *Psychiatric Complications of Medical Drugs* (1972), and *Manual of Psychiatric Therapeutics* (1975), which was reprinted in Portuguese and Italian.

Altered Sleep in Somatoform Disorders

Chronic fatigue and diffuse musculo-skeletal pain, in the absence of contributing organic pathology, are poorly understood but all too common complaints, according to sleep disorders expert Harvey Moldofsky, M.D., FRCPC. In his lecture, Dr. Moldofsky describes some of the evidence supporting the role of disordered regulation of sleep-wake functions of the central nervous system in the emergence of this syndrome.

A native of Toronto, Dr. Moldofsky is professor of psychiatry and professor and research associate in the department of medicine at the University of Toronto. Since 1979 he has been psychiatrist-in-chief at Toronto Western Hospital, now a division of the Toronto Hospital. From 1971 to 1985 Dr. Moldofsky was chief

of the department of clinical neurophysiology at the Clarke Institute of Psychiatry in Toronto. In 1975 he established the Institute's Psychosomatic Medicine Unit and was chief for four years. During that period, the unit focused on eating disorders, occupational neuroses, Gilles de la Tourette's Syndrome, and electrophysiologic studies on sleep and rheumatic pain disorders.

Dr. Moldofsky earned an M.D. from the University of Toronto in 1959, studied medicine during a senior internship at Shaughnessy Veterans Hospital in Vancouver in 1960-64, and received a diploma in psychiatry in 1965. He completed postgraduate work at Middlesex Hospital in London in 1963-64 and at Mt. Sinai Hospital in Toronto from 1964 to 1966. He was a research fellow at Langley Porter Neuropsychiatric Institute at the University of California, San Francisco, in 1960-71.

A fellow of the American Psychiatric Association, Dr. Moldofsky is vice-president of the International College of Psychosomatic Medicine. He is the author of 73 publications, ranging from a 1965 article about writer's cramp to a recent chapter about the rheumatic disorder fibrositis. He has received several awards throughout his distinguished career, including a Wellcome fellowship to the Royal Society of Medicine (London) in 1963, the R.S. McLaughlin Travelling Fellowship in 1970, the McNell Award in 1975 (shared with Drs. P. Garfinkel, G.M. Brown, and H.C. Stancer), and the Schering Travelling Fellowship Award of the Canadian Society of Clinical Investigation in 1987.

Dr. Goldman-Rakic, a prominent contemporary investigator of the prefrontal cortex and an expert in neurobiology and the development of cognition in the primate, is professor of neuroscience in the section of neuroanatomy at Yale School of Medicine. In the course of her career, Dr. Goldman-Rakic has contributed significantly to the literature on neurobiology, publishing more than 100 articles in the most highly respected journals in her field.

When Dr. Goldman-Rakic joined the faculty of Yale in 1979, she brought with her nearly 20 years of research experience, most of them spent at the National Institute of Mental Health in Bethesda, Maryland. She began her association with NIMH in 1965, as a staff fellow in the section of neuropsychology, and went on to be chief of the section on developmental neurobiology in 1978. She earned a Ph.D. from the University of California, Los Angeles, in 1963. Her postdoctoral training was completed between 1960 and 1965 in the departments of psychology and psychiatry at UCLA and the department of psychiatry at New York University.

Dr. Goldman-Rakic was the recipient of the Health, Education, and Welfare/ADAMHA Administrators Award for Meritorious Achievement in 1978 and the Senior Scientist Award from NIMH for two, five-year periods between 1980 and 1985 and between 1985 and 1990. She has delivered honorary lectures at Columbia University, Brown University, and the University of North Carolina and before the Union of the Swiss Societies for Experimental Biology.

Dr. Goldman-Rakic is a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and the American Psychological Association, and is a prominent member of the Society for Neuroscience. She has served as an advisor to a number of policymaking bodies and is currently a member of the NIMH Science Advisory Board and the External Advisory Commissions of the Western Psychiatric Institute of the University of Pittsburgh and of the University of Illinois' Beckman Institute.

Racism Revisited

A special section on racism in the December 1970 issue of the *American Journal of Psychiatry* called attention to racist attitudes and beliefs among psychiatrists, as well as a structuralized pattern of racism within organized psychiatry. Eighteen years later, Jeanne Spurlock, M.D., Deputy Medical Director of the American Psychiatric Association, examines what psychiatry has done in the ensuing years to address racist practices.

Dr. Spurlock received a medical degree from Howard University in 1947 then undertook postgraduate training in Chicago at Provident Hospital, Cook County Hospital, and the Institute for Juvenile Research. She completed psychoanalytic training at the Chicago Institute for Psychoanalysis in 1962. From 1960 to 1968 she was chief of the child psychiatry clinic and attending psychiatrist at Michael Reese Hospital in Chicago and clinical assistant professor of psychiatry at the University of Illinois College of Medicine. In 1968 she was named chairperson of the department of psychiatry at Meharry Medical College, a position she held until 1973.

In addition to directing the Office of Minority and National Affairs at APA since 1974, Dr. Spurlock is clinical professor of psychiatry at both George Washington University and Howard University Medical Schools and maintains a private practice in Washington, D.C. She is a member of the editorial boards of *The Phases*, the *Journal of Psychiatric Education*, and *Women in Context: Development and Stresses*. She sat on the board of directors of the National Urban League from 1970 to 1978 and again from 1979 to 1985 and of the Carnegie Corporation from 1973 to 1980. In 1983, she was the recipient of the Distinguished Service Award from Howard University College of Medicine and of an honorary doctor of science from Spelman College.

Since 1983 he has served as research director of the Scottish Rite Schizophrenia Research Program, a position he also held from 1972 to 1976.

The recipient of both a bachelor of science degree and a bachelor of arts degree from Yale University, Dr. Matthysse earned a Ph.D. in clinical psychology from Harvard University in 1967. From 1966 to 1969 he was assistant professor of psychology at Pitzer College in Claremont, California. He joined the faculty of Harvard Medical School in 1970, having completed a research fellowship there the year before. He is very active in the medical school's intramural programs and is a member of the steering committee of the Harvard Program in Psychiatric Epidemiology.

Involved in a variety of research and scholarly pursuits, Dr. Matthysse has been a member of the scientific advisory board of the Hereditary Disease Foundation since 1972. He was a member of the Foundation's Fund for Research in Psychiatry from 1977 to 1981 and was their chairman of the board in 1979-80. From 1981 to 1983 he was advisor to the health committee of the MacArthur Foundation. He is a member of the editorial boards of *Psychiatry Research*, *Journal of Psychiatric Research*, and *Biological Psychiatry*. Since winning first prize in the New York Metropolitan Area Physics Contest in 1954, Dr. Matthysse has garnered a host of honors. President of the Yale Math Club and the Yale Political Union in 1958, he was the recipient of the Honorary Woodrow Wilson Fellowship in 1961, the National Endowment for the Humanities Younger Scholar Fellowship in 1968, a fellowship from the Intensive Study Program of the Neuroscience Research Program in 1972, and the Research Career Development Award from NIMH for the years 1976 through 1982.

Dr. Caplan is director of the Center for Biomedical Ethics and professor of philosophy and surgery at the University of Minnesota in Minneapolis. His intelligent analyses of highly complex and controversial medical issues have made him a popular speaker and a frequent guest on several national news programs, including *Nightline*, *ABC's World News Tonight*, the *CBS Evening News*, and National Public Radio's *All Things Considered* and *Morning Edition*.

Dr. Caplan received a Ph.D. in philosophy from Columbia University in 1979. He first joined the Hastings Center in 1976 as a postdoctoral fellow. He was associate director of the Center from 1985-1987 and was an associate for the humanities from 1977 to 1984. In 1983 he was a Mellon Fellow at the Aspen Institute. Dr. Caplan has taught at the University of Pittsburgh, the Columbia University School of Journalism, the Poynter Institute for Media Studies, and the Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons. He is a member of the Minnesota Center for Philosophy of Science.

Dr. Caplan is an author or editor of 11 books, including *The Sociobiology Debate: Readings on Ethical and Scientific Issues* (1978), *Concepts of Health and Disease: Interdisciplinary Perspectives*, coedited by H. Tristram Engelhardt and J. I. McCartney (1981), *In Search of Equity*, coedited by Ronald Bayer and Norman Daniels (1983), *Which Babies Shall Live?*, coedited by Thomas Murray (1985), and *Scientific Controversies*, coedited by H. T. Engelhardt, Jr. (1987). He is also the author of the forthcoming book *The Philosophy of Medicine* and of more than 100 articles in the fields of philosophy, medicine, and the biological sciences.

Dr. Caplan is a member of the Committee on Philosophy and Medicine of the American Philosophical Association, the professional ethics committees of the New York State Department of Health and the American Psychological Association, the Advisory Board of the National Bone Marrow Donor Registry of the American Red Cross, and the Task Force on Organ Transplantation of the State of New Jersey.

Max Hernandez, M.D.

A Childhood Memory: Narrative, Fact
and Subjective Experience

In his talk, psychoanalyst Max Hernandez will explore a child's memory of events surrounding the Spanish Conquest of the Incan Empire in 1533, the "almost mythical" passage in history that, in his opinion, continues to influence all of Latin America. The child was Garcilaso Inca de la Vega, a Peruvian writer and son of a Spanish conquistador and an Inca princess. Written while the Spaniards were fighting among themselves for control of the land and the Incas were continuing to resist Spanish domination, Dr. Hernandez says, Garcilaso's reminiscences convey his fear, curiosity, and excitement and help us to understand the child's confused identificatory participation in the event.

Dr. Hernandez has been in private practice in his native Lima, Peru, since 1974. He earned a bachelor in medicine degree from the University of San Marcos in Lima in 1964 and received a diploma in psychological medicine from the Royal College of Physicians (London) in the same year. After pursuing postgraduate studies at the University of San Marcos in 1966, he left to continue his education in London, where he studied at the Institute of Psychiatry at the University of London and at the School of Community Psychiatry and Mental Health of the Tavistock Institute. He has been a full member of the Royal College of Psychiatrists since 1973 and received a doctor in medicine degree from the University of San Marcos in 1976.

Dr. Hernandez is vice-president of the International Psychoanalytical Association and is a member of the British Psychoanalytical Society. He is director of the Seminario Interdisciplinario de Estudios Andinos and chairman of the Asociacion para el Estudio Interdisciplinario de la Familia, known as INTERFAM, both in Lima. He was president of the Peruvian Psychoanalytic Society from 1983 to 1985 and has been a consultant to the country's Ministry of Foreign Affairs and to the Mental Health Department of the Ministry of Health.

This year Dr. Hernandez was honored by two prominent organizations, the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars, which bestowed on him a U.S.A. Guest Scholarship, and the American Psychiatric Association, which selected Dr. Hernandez as the recipient of the Simon Bolivar Award.

A leader in the field of psychiatric rehabilitation, Dr. Liberman and colleagues Charles J. Wallace, Ph.D., Gayla Blackwell, R.N., and Thad Eckman, Ph.D. have created a model for treatment and rehabilitation of chronic mental patients that employs skills training as protection against stress-linked relapse. During his presentation, a videotape will demonstrate a validated method for providing skills training.

Dr. Liberman is professor of psychiatry in residence at the University of California, Los Angeles School of Medicine, where he has been a faculty member since 1970. He is also Chief of the Rehabilitation Medical Service at the Veterans Administration Medical Center in Brentwood, California.

Since 1977 Dr. Liberman has been the director of the NIMH-funded Clinical Research Center for Schizophrenia and Psychiatric Rehabilitation, headquarters for 25 scientist-practitioners from a variety of disciplines. Dr. Liberman is also director of the 11-bed clinical research unit at Camarillo State Hospital, which treats only highly refractory patients with severe and chronic mental disorders.

Educated in the public schools of Newark, New Jersey, Dr. Liberman graduated summa cum laude from Dartmouth in 1959. He earned an M.S. in pharmacology from the University of California, San Francisco School of Medicine, in 1961 and an M.D. from the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine in 1963. He completed a four-year psychiatric residency at the

Massachusetts Mental Health Center in Boston between 1964 and 1968 and was a fellow in the Research Training Program in Social Psychiatry at Harvard Medical School between 1966 and 1968.

Dr. Liberman is a distinguished author with more than 150 articles, books, and chapters to his credit. In 1986 the book entitled, *Psychiatric Uses of Sedation and Restraint*, edited by Kenneth Tardiff, won the American Psychiatric Association's Manfred S. Guttmacher Award for Outstanding Literature in Forensic Psychiatry, in which Dr. Liberman cos authored a chapter. In 1983 he received the Distinguished Service Award from the California Alliance for the Mentally Ill and in 1986 the Silvano Arieti Award in Schizophrenia from the American Academy of Psychoanalysis.

Initiating as the director's senior thesis at Harvard, Peggy Stern returned to examine Stephanie's senior year at high school. The film portrays the transformation of Stephanie from a perky, pouty, alert thirteen-year-old who sees herself destined to become a ballerina into a creative young woman who finds it impossible to negotiate the system.

Sitting in Limbo depicts a coming to maturity within a different culture and in a city, Montreal, in which Haitians are both incorporated into and alienated from the prevailing culture.

Discussion after the film will focus on the protean nature of the choices available to the adolescent, the role of organized authorities in providing structure to the adolescent in transition, and the importance of family structures in mediating between the demands of a society which imposes procrustean decisions on the adolescent and the adolescent's need for creative fulfillment.

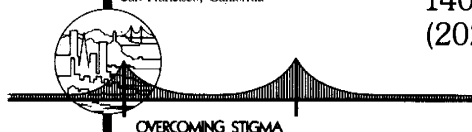

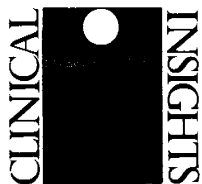
