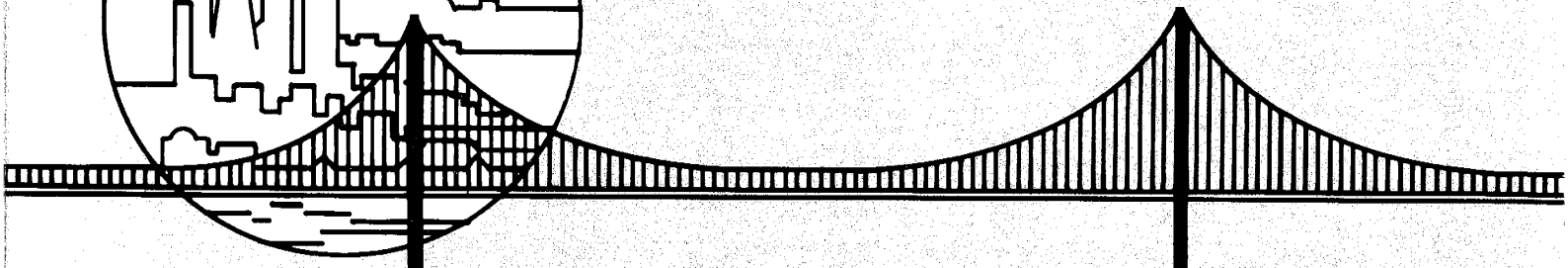

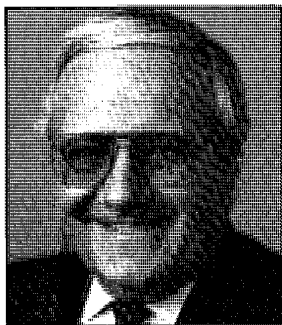
Dear Colleagues and Guests:

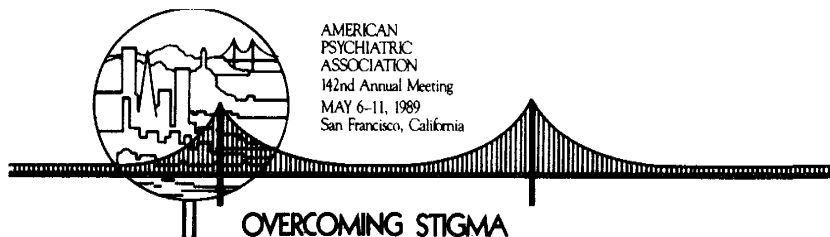

Dear APA Members and Guests:

On behalf of the Scientific Program Committee, I would like to welcome you to the 142nd Annual Meeting of the American Psychiatric Association. The work of the Scientific Program Committee was especially difficult this year, given the record number of submissions for all formats. We have an exciting meeting, with the highest quality presentations, planned for you. The Local Arrangements Committee has also developed an outstanding program of activities to help you take advantage of the splendor of San Francisco and the Bay Area. In order to focus on the theme, "Overcoming Stigma," chosen by our President, Dr. Paul J. Fink, a number of sessions are highlighted in this book. We hope you will take advantage not only of these sessions, but of many others which directly relate to this important issue.

Registration, the Publishers' Bookfair and the Membership Resource Center will open at noon on Saturday, May 6; the Opening Session will be held on Sunday evening, May 7, from 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m.; exhibits will be open until 6:00 p.m., Sunday through Wednesday; scientific sessions will begin Monday; the Business Meeting will be held over the lunch hour on Monday, from 12:30 p.m. to 2:00 p.m.; and the meeting will end at 5:00 p.m., Thursday, May 11.

Based on evaluations from last year's Annual Meeting, we have added a second Continuous Clinical Case Conference. Also, we have made changes in the New Research Program which will allow the posters to remain up for the entire day of their presentation at a central location in the Hilton. We have instituted a Young Investigators' Poster Session, and a new format entitled "Research Consultations With." This will provide new opportunities for junior researchers to meet with senior research colleagues to discuss problem areas in psychiatric research. "Research Advances in Psychiatry: An Update for the Clinician" will be held on Monday morning at 10:45 a.m. This session highlights the latest research findings in psychiatry and will summarize their relevance to clinical practice.

As always, the members of the Scientific Program Committee are interested in the opinions of the members regarding the quality and content of the Annual Meeting program. The most effective way to provide this information is by filling out and returning the evaluation forms. We use the results of the evaluations to plan for the following year's Annual Meeting. I would also be happy to hear from you individually and would welcome your suggestions. I can be reached at the APA through the Office to Coordinate the Annual Meeting.

This is a time of great change in our field. We believe this year's program reflects the excitement and opportunity that these changes portend.

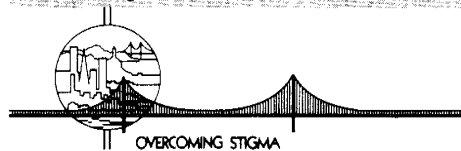

The office for the *American Journal of Psychiatry* and *Psychiatric News* will be located in Room 218, East Mezzanine, Moscone Center. Hours of operation: Sunday, May 7, 10:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m. and Monday, May 8 through Thursday, May 11, 8:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m.

*Psychiatric News* staff will meet daily in the office to discuss news coverage of the meeting. Persons who wish to contact members of the staff may leave messages to arrange appointments or may leave written announcements or letters for possible publication in the newspaper.

*American Journal of Psychiatry* staff will be available to answer authors' questions and to receive papers submitted for publication. The *Journal* publishes only original material that has not been published elsewhere in any form and that is not being considered for publication elsewhere. Four copies are required.

*Hospital and Community Psychiatry* staff will be located in the Membership Resource Center. Hours of operation are the same as the Resource Center. Staff will be available to answer questions about *H&CP* and about writing for publication in psychiatric journals. Authors may submit papers (unpublished material) for publication. Five copies are required, in an electronically scannable format.

## CONTINUING MEDICAL EDUCATION CREDIT

The American Psychiatric Association is accredited by the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education (ACCME) to sponsor continuing medical education for physicians. The APA certifies that the continuing medical education activities, designated as Category I for the 1989 Annual Meeting sessions, meet the criteria for Category I of the Physician's Recognition Award of the American Medical Association and the CME requirement of the APA.

The sessions of the official Annual Meeting program, with some exceptions noted in this program, meet the criteria for continuing medical education Category I credit. The exceptions are awarded Category II credit and designated with an asterisk (\*) in this *Program Book*.

There are several criteria used to designate a session for Category I certification. One important criteria is that a program must be preplanned and explore one topic or a closely related group of topics in depth. Preplanning means defining good learning objectives appropriate for the CME activity, and evaluating how well the session objectives are met.

To claim credit, registrants should claim one hour of credit for each hour of participation. To document that credit, complete the Certificate of Attendance found in the front of the *1989 Annual Meeting CME Syllabus & Proceedings Summary Book* and retain the copy in your files.

## ANNUAL MEETING EVALUATION

The Annual Meeting Scientific Program Committee needs your recommendations and evaluations to plan next year's Annual Meeting. ## TAPE RECORDING POLICY

Registrants are welcome to carry small tape recorders to any session. Larger professional tape recorders, however, are not permitted other than those carried by personnel representing the professional taping firm authorized to tape sessions. The badges of personnel representing this firm will clearly identify them.

## SMOKING POLICY

In December 1986, the APA Board of Trustees approved a no smoking policy for the Annual Meeting. It states that there shall be **NO SMOKING** in any scientific sessions. Smoking will only be permitted in the hallways outside of the meeting rooms.

## CHILD CARE SERVICE

For the convenience of meeting registrants and their families, the APA, with assistance from the Local Arrangements Committee, has made arrangements for child care during the meeting. The child care service will be housed at the San Francisco Hilton, located at 333 O'Farrell Street, in the Taylor and Van Ness Rooms, Sixth Floor. Hours of operation: Sunday, May 7, 8:30 a.m.-7:30 p.m., Monday, May 8 through Thursday, May 11, 8:00 a.m.-6:00 p.m. The cost for each child under 5 years old is \$45 per day or \$6 per hour (2 hour minimum), and for children 5 years and older the cost is \$40 per day or \$5 per hour (2 hour minimum). On-site registration will be handled by the center and they may be reached by contacting the Taylor and Van Ness Rooms at the San Francisco Hilton, 415-771-1400, beginning Sunday, May 7th.

The center will be operated by AmeriKids, a firm established in 1985, providing day care "camps" for tradeshow and conventions and providing service to corporate centers in the local area. The center will be equipped with kitchen facilities, washrooms, cots, cribs and play equipment.

Staffing will consist of one day care monitor per six children under five years of age and one monitor per ten children over the age of five. The center will accept children between the ages of 3 weeks and 16 years. All day care monitors are trained in early childhood education. An experienced day care manager and a cook will serve a morning and afternoon snack and a hot meal at lunch.

Daily activities will incorporate arts and crafts, games and toys.

So it depends on how much you want to think about it...whether it's doing you any good...whether it's putting you in touch with the mystery that's the ground of your own being. If it isn't, well, it's a lie."

Campbell viewed myths and metaphors as essential to the human spirit, to explain the unexplainable and endure the

Campbell viewed myths and metaphors as essential to the human spirit, to explain the unexplainable and endure the unendurable. Along the way, they also provide sense to the individual for the experiences of life and death, male and female. The film examines some of Campbell's many extraordinary contributions to understanding the world's life-giving illusions (mythologies) and their relevance to everyday life. As James Hillman says of Campbell, "no one in our century, not Freud, Jung, Thomas Mann, or Levi Strauss, has so brought the mythical sense of the world and its eternal figures back into our ordinary, daily consciousness."

The Executive Producer, APA Fellow Stuart L. Brown, M.D., along with Producer William Free, arranged for original music scored by contemporary musicians Micky Hart and Rand Weatherwax, as well as great art and symbols to supplement on-camera scenes with Campbell in Hawaii, New York and California. Added Star Wars footage exemplifies "The Hero's Journey," but the power of the film rests in the energy and life force of Campbell and his ideas. This film also serves as the introductory program to a fourteen-part series, "The World of Joseph Campbell," which will be released by PBS in the fall of 1989.

In choosing to emphasize the ability to love as the source of fulfillment, psychiatrists and psychoanalysts are neglecting the other element of Freud's definition of psychological health, the ability to work. That is the conclusion of psychiatrist and noted author Anthony Storr, M.B., who focuses his remarks on the link between solitude and creativity. According to Dr. Storr, the lives of many creative people, including Freud himself, demonstrate that interpersonal relationships often rank second to work as a source of personal fulfillment.

British by birth, Dr. Storr graduated in 1944 from Westminster Hospital Medical School. In 1974, after many

years in the private practice of psychotherapy, he joined the Oxford Health Authority as a consultant psychotherapist and became a clinical lecturer at Oxford University. In 1986 he was named honorary consulting psychiatrist to the Oxford Health Authority. He is also an emeritus fellow of Green College, Oxford.

A psychoanalytic scholar of wide-ranging interests, Dr. Storr is the author of a recently published book, *Solitude: A Return to the Self* (1988). He is also the author of *The Dynamics of Creation* (1972), *The Art of Psychotherapy* (1979), and *The Essential Jung* (1983). Dr. Storr frequently reviews books for the *New York Times*, the *Washington Post*, the *New Republic*, the *Times Literary Supplement*, and the *Musical Times*.

The mental health field is increasingly asked to respond to the vast array of psychosocial problems beyond the traditional sphere of psychiatrists. In Latin America and the Caribbean, the booming population and deteriorating socioeconomic conditions make it imperative for the mental health professions to change program planning, training, and research. Itzhak Levav, M.D., a leader in mental health innovation in Latin America, describes the steps taken by Latin nations to address their evolving mental health needs.

Dr. Levav is regional advisor in mental health for the World Health Organization/Pan American Health Organization. He is a member of the section committee on epidemiology and community psychiatry of the World Psychiatric Association, the international advisory board of McGill University/World Health Organization Collaborating Center in Montreal, and the International Board of the Simon Bolivar Research and Training Center of the University of Illinois.

A native of Argentina, Dr. Levav received medical training at the University of Buenos Aires and psychiatry training at McGill University. He holds a masters of science

in social and community psychiatry from the Columbia University School of Public Health and department of psychiatry. Dr. Levav is on the faculty of the Hadassah School of Public Health and Community Medicine at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem. He was visiting associate professor in the department of psychiatry at Columbia University from 1979 to 1986.

Dr. Levav has written extensively about the relationship between life stress and psychopathology, including psychiatric combat reactions during the Yom Kippur War, the emotional distress of concentration camp survivors, and mortality among bereaved parents. He is also the coauthor of *Community Mental Health in Israel*, published in 1981.

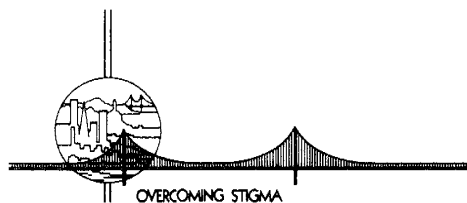

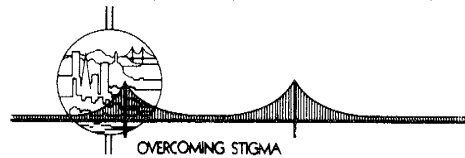

This is a documentary about a New Zealand woman adapting to Multiple Sclerosis, and her cinematographer husband helping her. Genni Batterham has adapted to dimming vision and having to be fed through a tube, and has had several brushes with death. She talks about what it is like having to rely on others to bathe her and carry her. At the beginning her speech is articulate, but movingly deteriorates as time passes, so that near the end subtitles must underlie her speech. Genni maintains a strong sense of self as she is witty, outspoken and dynamic to the point of continuing to live as fully as possible, even if it means taking risks to perform adventures such as journeying with her husband across the desert. This program is not only useful for studying the psychological aspects of a person with a chronic deteriorating medical illness with psychiatric overlay, but is useful for studying how film and videotape can be used as a therapeutic agent to help the acceptance and grieving process.

Dr. Stoller has studied the origins and dynamics of gender identity and erotic excitement for the past 30 years. He is the author of numerous articles on all aspects of sexuality and of several books, including *Sex and Gender* (1968), *Splitting* (1973), *The Transsexual Experiment* (1975), *Perversion: The Erotic Form of Hatred* (1975), *Sexual Excitement: Dynamics of Erotic Life* (1979), *Observing the Erotic Imagination* (1985), and *Presentations of Gender* (1985).

Dr. Stoller is professor of psychiatry at the University of California, Los Angeles School of Medicine, where he has taught since 1954. He graduated from the University of California, San Francisco School of Medicine, and completed his psychiatry residency at the Veterans Administration Hospital in Palo Alto and the Los Angeles County General Hospital. Psychoanalyst and international legal scholar Afaf M. Mahfouz, Ph.D. will examine the myth and the reality of women in the Moslem world. As a citizen of both the United States and Egypt, she brings a unique perspective to understanding the psychological and legal status of Islamic women. Her subject is particularly timely following the election of Benazir Bhutto of Pakistan as the first major female political leader in a Moslem country.

As student, scholar, and diplomat, Dr. Mahfouz has traveled and lived in many parts of the world. She received a Ph.D. in law at the University of Paris, and she became director of research for the Center for Strategic Studies in Cairo. Dr. Mahfouz was cultural and educational counselor with the Egyptian embassy in Washington, D.C. from 1974 to 1978, a period of renewed diplomatic relations between Egypt and the United States. She held a

joint appointment for five years in Cairo and Paris as director of research for the Centre de Documentation et d'Etudes Economiques, Juridiques, et Sociales. In 1985, she returned to Washington, D.C. to begin studies at the Washington Psychoanalytic Institute, where she is now a fourth-year candidate.

Dr. Mahfouz is the 1982 recipient of the Chevalier des Palmes Academiques (Paris), and is the author of *International Relations* (now in its third edition) and *Socialism and Power in Egypt*. She has been associate professor in the School of Commerce and Business at Helwan University in Cairo since 1971. Dr. Mahfouz is currently serving on the executive committee of the governing council of the Society for International Development and is chairperson of the Society's Women in Development Program.

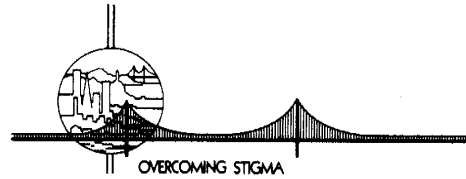

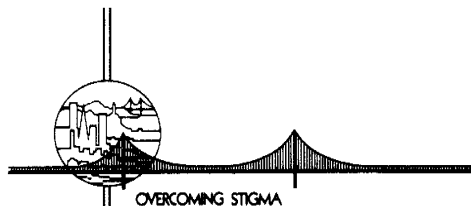

**Relapse Prevention in Manic-Depressive Illness:  
What is Important and What is Not?**

Almost forty years ago, Danish psychiatrist Mogens Schou and his colleagues demonstrated that lithium is effective in the treatment of mania. This discovery stands as one of psychiatry's greatest achievements, and helped usher in the era of biological psychiatry. Despite the subsequent refinements of lithium treatment, many individuals with manic-depressive illness experience relapses. In his lecture, Dr. Schou identifies new findings on steps the clinician can take to better manage the care of manic-depressive patients in order to avoid relapses.

Dr. Schou has written extensively on the use and side effects of lithium therapy and continues to contribute regularly to the professional literature. He has been honored around the world for his outstanding contributions to psychiatry. He is the recipient of many awards, including the Albert Lasker Clinical Medical Research Award (1987). He was co-founder and first president of the Scandinavian Society for Biological Psychiatry.

Dr. Schou graduated from Copenhagen University Medical School in 1944. He trained in psychiatry at hospitals in Denmark, Sweden and Norway. He studied experimental biology at leading institutes around the world, including the Institute of Cyphysiology in Copenhagen, the department of pharmacology of the New York State Psychiatric Institute, the department of psychiatry of Columbia University in New York City, and the Institute of Physiology at Aarhus University in Denmark. Dr. Schou is a professor of psychiatry (biological psychiatry and psychopharmacology) at Aarhus University and is the head of the Psychopharmacology Research Unit at the university's Institute of Psychiatry.

A practicing psychiatrist for more than 50 years, John Romano, M.D. reflects on the pervasive and rapid changes in the field of psychiatry during the half century he has been in practice. Dr. Romano's views are a balance of frank

criticism of what he perceives as the profession's serious errors, and expressions of respect and affection for members of the field.

Dr. Romano is a founding member of the Western New York Psychoanalytic Group and of the Mental Health Council of Monroe County. In recognition of his devotion and achievement, the mental health chapter of the Health Association of Rochester and Monroe County established an award in his name.

Born in 1908 in Milwaukee, Dr. Romano is a graduate of Marquette University School of Medicine. During World War II, he served in the U.S. Army as a consultant to the Eighth Service Command and the European Theater of Operations. For over 25 years, he was professor and chairman of the department of psychiatry at the University of Rochester School of Medicine and Dentistry. He remained distinguished university professor of psychiatry until he retired as professor emeritus.

Dr. Romano holds honorary doctoral degrees from the Medical College of Wisconsin, the Hahnemann Medical College and Hospital, and the University of Cincinnati. A popular lecturer, he was an invited speaker at the 200th anniversary of Harvard Medical School. He is an honorary member of Alpha Omega Alpha and Phi Beta Kappa, and a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. In 1969, Dr. Romano was the first APA-NIMH Seymour D. Vestermark Award Lecturer. He is a Life Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association, which presented him with its Distinguished Service Award in 1979.

*Matter of Heart* is a uniquely involving examination of the relationship between life and art and between the analytic psychology and psychoanalytic perspectives of C.G. Jung and his life. Melvin Sabshin, M.D.

Turning Points in Twentieth Century  
American Psychiatry

As medical director of the American Psychiatric Association since 1974, Melvin Sabshin, M.D. brings a unique perspective to discussion of 20th Century psychiatry. His leadership of organized psychiatry in the U.S. has coincided with dramatic changes in clinical practice, research, and policy. Dr. Sabshin will examine the domination of psychiatry by various therapeutic ideologies after World War II, and the subsequent rise of logical positivism and objectification in the 1970's and 1980's. He predicts that, in the next decade, there will be another turning point that will lead to a challenging but new balance between and among science, clinical practice, and humanism in psychiatry. The relationship of this predicted new phase in the late 1990's to the pre-World War II impact of Adolf Meyer will also be discussed.

Dr. Sabshin came to the APA after a broad career in psychiatric practice, medical education, and research. At the time of his selection, he was acting dean of the University of Illinois College of Medicine in Chicago. He had served as professor and chairman of the department of psychiatry at the medical school between 1961 and 1973.

Active in international affairs, Dr. Sabshin is a distinguished fellow of numerous psychiatric associations in many parts of the world and an honorary fellow of the World Association for Social Psychiatry. He served as a member of the Board of the World Federation for Mental Health and currently serves as an elected officer and member of the executive committee of the World Psychiatric Association.

Dr. Sabshin is the author of more than 100 scientific papers and five books on such topics as normal behavior, clinical phenomena of depression and anxiety, and the competing roles of science and ideology in psychiatry.

Dr. Sabshin received his medical degree from Tulane University School of Medicine in 1948. He trained in psychiatry at Charity Hospital of New Orleans and Tulane University, then held a Public Health Service Fellowship

in Psychiatric Research. In 1967 he took a year's sabbatical to accept a fellowship at the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences in Stanford, California.

## DNA Markers in Neuropsychiatric Diseases

The use of human DNA sequences as genetic markers has revolutionized the study of inherited disease and promises to bring profound change to diagnosis in psychiatry. In the vanguard of this central research program is James F. Gusella, Ph.D., who was involved in isolating the DNA markers for both Huntington's disease and Familial Alzheimer's disease. Dr. Gusella will update the continuing efforts to locate genetic defects in neurological and psychiatric diseases with uncertain and perhaps heterogeneous genetic components.

Dr. Gusella is director of the Neurogenetics Laboratory at Massachusetts General Hospital, associate professor of genetics in the department of neurology, and Bullard professor of neurology at Harvard Medical School. In 1985, *Esquire* magazine named him Outstanding Young Scientist. He is a member of the editorial boards of *Reviews in the Neurosciences*, *Molecular Brain Research*, and *Genomics*.

Dr. Gusella was born in Ottawa, Ontario, Canada, and holds a degree in medical biophysics from the University of Toronto and in biology from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He is the past recipient of the Bennett Award Lecture of the American Neurological Association; the Marjorie Guthrie Memorial Award of the Huntington's Disease Society of America; the Metropolitan Life Foundation Award for Medical Research; and the A. Cressy Morrison Award in the Natural Sciences of the New York Academy of Science.

Journalist, producer, educator, and film director Tony Brown challenges Black America to take the leadership role in deciding its own destiny. For 19 years, Mr. Brown has hosted "Tony Brown's Journal," the longest-running and -ranked black affairs television program. The show is seen weekly on more than 240 public television stations by five million viewers.

Mr. Brown was the founding dean and professor of the School of Communications at Howard University in Washington, DC. To counter the shortage of blacks in the communications industry, he initiated the annual Careers Conference at Howard, which continues to be a very successful program. He writes a column syndicated by more than 100 newspapers. During the crest of the civil rights movement, he coordinated a protest march in Detroit which was attended by more than 500,000 people and which featured a speech by Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr. Mr. Brown is on the board of directors of the Association for the Study of Afro-American Life and History, and of the National Business League. He is also a member of the board of associates of the Harvard Foundation.

Tony Brown was born in Charleston, West Virginia. He received a bachelor's degree in sociology and psychology and a master's degree in psychiatric social work at Wayne State University in Detroit.

Mr. Brown's latest project is a feature motion picture called "The White Girl," which he wrote and directed. About a young black girl addicted to cocaine, the film takes its name from a slang term for the drug and from the heroine's devaluation of her black identity. The film and a music video of the theme song (cowritten by Brown), are scheduled for release later this year.

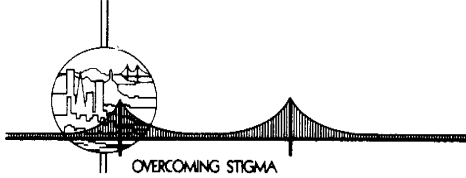

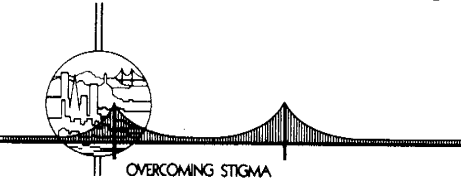

Despite the proliferation of writing about China and the open door policy of the Chinese government, a relative lack of understanding of Chinese psychiatry has continued due to a dearth of culturally standardized instruments, a failure to appreciate the heterogeneity of the Chinese population, and a shortage of studies comparing psychiatric disorders among the Chinese and other Asians.

Felice Lieh Mak, M.D. is professor and head of the department of psychiatry at the University of Hong Kong. Her lecture will trace the changing approach to psychiatric illness among the Chinese and how changes in Chinese society have altered the presentation of psychiatric disorders among this population.

Dr. Lieh Mak has spent most of her professional career in England and Hong Kong. Born in the Philippines, she graduated from medical school at the University of Santo Tomas, Philippines, and spent subsequent years at hospitals in London, Oxford, and Lancashire, England.

Dr. Lieh Mak is a fellow of the Royal College of Psychiatrists (U.K.), the Royal Australian and New Zealand College of Psychiatrists, and the World Association for Social Psychiatry. She currently serves as psychiatric consultant to the Hong Kong Council of Women, and secretary of the Section on Psychiatric Education of the World Psychiatric Association. She is vice-president of the Hong Kong Association for Mentally Handicapped Children, and is a member of the editorial advisory boards of *Holistic Medicine* and *International Journal of Child Abuse*. She is past-president of both the Hong Kong Medical Women's Association and the Hong Kong Psychiatric Association.

Eugene Garfield, Ph.D., founder, president, and chief executive officer of the Institute for Scientific Information (ISI), is a pioneer in the information systems field in medicine. ISI produces the scientific resource *Current Contents*, as well as other publications, services, and systems that monitor and condense the flood of published scientific and technical information. Dr. Garfield will review the management of scientific information and the changing role of psychiatry and psychiatrists in the scientific field.

Trained as a chemist, linguist and library scientist, Dr. Garfield has been an innovator in automated indexing and information science for more than three decades. He has been a member of the American Society for Information Science (ASIS) since its founding and was awarded the ASIS Award of Merit in 1975. Dr. Garfield's essays are collected in nine volumes of *Essays of an Information Scientist*, which won the ASIS award for best information science book of 1977. In 1984, he became the first information scientist to receive the John Price Wetherill Medal, awarded by the Franklin Institute in Philadelphia.

Dr. Garfield has been a member of several committees of the National Academy of Sciences, and was a participant in the White House Conference on International Cooperation. He is a member of the Rockefeller University Council, and sits on the board of directors of *Annual Reviews*.

Dr. Garfield holds a Ph.D. in structural linguistics from the University of Pennsylvania.

Jonathan and Tina Balsler live with their two daughters in a large apartment on New York's fashionable Central Park West. Jonathan (Richard Benjamin) is a Harvard Law School graduate, ex-new frontiersman, now junior law partner in an influential firm, aggressively materialistic, so obsessed over being "with it" (wines, clothes, celebs) as to be hopelessly out of whatever he's into.

In his never-ending quest for "rightness," he goads Tina (Carrie Snodgrass) constantly to be the "right" sort of wife; meaning she must perform on command as household drudge, gourmet chef, gracious hostess, dog-walker, nanny, fashion plate and resident sex-maniac to his repulsive advances ("Teen, how about a leetle old roll in d'hay. . ."). Despite a lifetime of training (including psychoanalysis) towards passive ends, Tina is in the first throes of rebellion, ripe for an affair with a devastatingly attractive writer (Frank Langella).

*Diary of a Mad Housewife*, written by Eleanor Perry from the Sue Kaufman novel, received impressive reviews for its acting (auspicious debuts of Snodgrass and Langella), its ironic feminism, and its unsparing depiction of fast-lane life amongst Manhattan's empty-minded *literati* and *glitterati*. The film wears surprisingly well nineteen years later. The Big Apple is, if anything, more horrendously competitive and soul-denying. Many young Manhattan mothers, supposedly more liberated than Tina, are rendered no less mad, in any sense of the word, juggling both household and career.

The film contains some strong language and brief nudity.

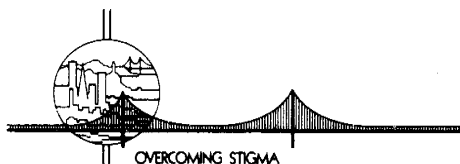

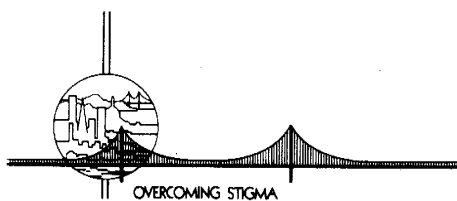

French-American filmmaker Pierre Sauvage accompanies us on a trip back to the village of Chambon, where he and 5,000 other Jews were sheltered from Nazi persecution during World War II. This deeply moving documentary tells a little known story from the holocaust, one of the heroism and sacrifice of ordinary, decent people who refused to surrender in the face of terrifying evil. While many psychiatrists are aware of the characteristic steps of descent into compliance with cruelty, from the work of Robert Lifton on Nazi doctors or from all that has been written about atrocities committed during the Vietnam War, we are far less sophisticated in our understanding of the psychological and community forces that foster altruism and adherence to strong moral standards under extreme conditions. Even while it inspires our deepest admiration for the people of Chambon, *Weapons of the Spirit* opens up broad questions of how human be-

ings can transcend prejudice, fear and deprivation and withstand the destructive forces of tyranny. Mr. Sauvage will attend to describe the experience of delving into his own past to make this film, and will join the discussion in examining the implications of the film for understanding of human behavior.

#### A National Mental Health Agenda: Psychiatry's Role

The director of the National Institute of Mental Health, Lewis L. Judd, M.D., believes that the potential now exists to reverse chronic underfunding and stigmatization of mental illness. Psychiatry, he emphasizes, must lead a renewed effort to place mental illness among the nation's health priorities. Dr. Judd will describe the unique circumstances that allow better funding of mental illness research and the role of psychiatrists in bringing about this change.

Dr. Judd came to NIMH in January 1988 after a distinguished career in academic psychiatry, with special emphasis on clinical psychopharmacology and biological psychiatry. His original research includes work on genetic factors in schizophrenia, neuroleptic treatment of schizophrenia, brain dysfunction in chronic sedative users, effects of lithium in normal populations, lithium-alcohol interactions, and the use of naloxone in treating mania.

Before joining NIMH, Dr. Judd served for ten years as chairman of the department of psychiatry at the University of California, San Diego School of Medicine and as chief of psychiatry services at the UCSD Medical Center. He brings to the NIMH directorship a broad and rich experience with the institute, both as a grantee and as a member of many scientific review and advisory committees, including the Board of Scientific Counselors. He is also a member of the scientific council of the National Alliance for Research in Schizophrenia and Depression. Dr. Judd is a member of the editorial boards of the *American Journal of Psychiatry*, the *Journal of Clinical Psychiatry*, *Psychiatry*, and the *Journal of Neuropsychiatry and Clinical*

*Neurosciences*. He is editor of the recently published volume *The Basic Science Foundation of Clinical Psychiatry*.

#### Psychiatric Aspects of Terrorism

Dr. Franco Ferracuti, professor of criminological medicine and forensic psychiatry at the University of Rome, outlines the role that psychiatrists can play in understanding and controlling terrorism. According to Dr. Ferracuti, psychiatrists can help by describing the "terrorist mindset," assessing the impact of terrorism on the public, assisting victims of terrorism, analyzing the messages of terrorists to evaluate the seriousness of their threats and their potential for carrying them out, and contributing to the resocialization of convicted terrorists.

Dr. Ferracuti graduated from the University of Rome Medical School, and earned a diploma from the University's Postgraduate Training School of Forensic Medicine, and from the "Libera Docenza" in Criminal Anthropology. Affiliated with the University of Rome for almost 40 years, Dr. Ferracuti was professor of criminology in the law school when he became professor on the faculty of medicine. He assumed professorship in the Postgraduate Training Schools of Penal Law, Forensic Medicine and Medical Psychology and was named director of the Postgraduate Training School in Clinical Criminology and Forensic Psychiatry. He was also affiliated with the University of Puerto Rico.

Fluent in Italian, English, and Spanish, Dr. Ferracuti has been active in the work of the United Nations, including service as Social Affairs Officer in the Social Defense Unit at U.N. Headquarters in New York City, where he administered fellowship and technical assistance projects in Latin America and Asia. Cultural and ethnic factors have long been thought to influence the responses to psychopharmacologic treatment, but modern research methodology has been applied to the subject only in the last decade. New findings are emerging concerning research comparing Asians and Caucasians on adverse effects of each of the major categories of psychotropics, pharmacokinetic responses, and attitude toward drug therapy.

Dr. Ching-piao Chien is professor of psychiatry at the Neuropsychiatric Institute and Hospital of the University of California, Los Angeles. He is also the director of the Innovative Ambulatory Care Services, director of Clinical Psychopharmacology, and associate chief in Psychiatry-Neuropsychogeriatric Services. He trained at the College of Medicine of the National Taiwan University and completed a five-year residency in the department of neurology and psychiatry at National Taiwan University Hospital. He has lived in the United States since 1964, when he came for a two-year residency at the Massachusetts Mental Health Center. He was affiliated with Boston State Hospital, and then became professor of psychiatry at Albany Medical College.

Fluent in English, Chinese (Mandarin), Japanese and Taiwanese, Dr. Chien is secretary general and founding fellow of the Pacific Rim College of Psychiatrists. He is the recipient of the Presidents Award of E. R. Squibb & Sons, and the Distinguished Service Award of the Pacific Rim College of Psychiatrists.

The pervading impression that "gay people are white people" dominates the popular consciousness. *Orientations* begins to set the record straight. A dozen men and women of different Asian backgrounds speak frankly, humorously and often poignantly about their lives as members of a minority within a minority. They tell us about coming out, homophobia, racism, cultural identity, sex, and the ways that being gay and Asian have shaped who they are. But these are people who have also begun to shape their reality. They work in organizations which focus on issues both inside and outside the gay community. 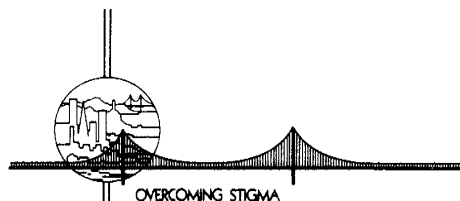

This tape was developed with support of the American Cancer Society, to assist hospitals and nursing homes in meeting the obligation of developing formal guidelines for DNR, and to assist physicians in understanding their own reactions to and problems with carrying out the DNR discussion with a patient. Available since early 1988, it has won three medical film awards. It has wide applicability since it depicts the reactions of the attending physician, the nurse, house officer, ethicist and social worker, while also outlining ways of dealing with troublesome feelings.

Despite sporadic efforts to combat it, stigmatization has always been a problem for the mentally ill. At the turn of the century, because of their technical crudity and because of the low level of sophistication of the working class to whom they principally appealed, movies depicted the popular stereotype in a particularly raw form. In this first presentation, several short films of the first decade of the century will be shown. These portray the mental patient as a comic figure (*Dr. Dippy's Sanitarium*, 1906); as Napoleon (*The Escaped Lunatic*, 1904); as a danger to the middle class (*The Maniac Cook*, 1907); and as the victim of an unscrupulous mind expert (*The Criminal Hypnotist*, 1909). In a research film on epileptic seizures made by Dr. Walter Chase in 1905, we will see an unconscious stereotyping by our own profession. What these films tell us about our society and the mentally ill will be the focus of discussion.

Hostage Negotiation Training for Seattle police negotiation teams have traditionally used role playing between officers as the principal training method. A disadvantage of this method was the apparent predictability of responses of both the officers and "hostage-takers" in this situation. As an alternative training method, the producer, a member of the Division of Community Psychiatry of the University of Washington, in collaboration with designated police officers,

developed a hostage negotiation training strategy which used actors and video playback, along with law enforcement and psychiatric consultation. In recognizing a need for educational videotapes dealing with aggression in psychiatric facilities, Atascadero State Hospital and the Forensic Services Branch of the California Department of Mental Health produced this tape. Specifically, *The Art of Intervention* addresses the psychodynamics involved in the treatment of psychiatric patients with aggressive histories, with a strong emphasis on the preventative aspects of such treatment. The importance of identifying precursors to aggression and appropriate intervention techniques is stressed. The video brings up the significance of the clinician's own attitude and approach in training aggressive clients, with references to issues involving transference and countertransference in treatment settings.

The practical aspect of how to de-escalate a violent patient before he explodes is a valuable component to the video, as is a panel discussion by mental health clinicians from various disciplines on the subject of prevention.

Tonight's presentation is an inquiry into the hidden persuasions of main-stream cinema. In the midst of being richly entertained by *Fatal Attraction*, we may not realize we have been lulled into accepting a questionable ideological/political agenda. Is this foisted upon us deliberately? Or are filmmakers themselves merely unwitting, unconscious transmitters of cultural bias?

*Fatal Attraction* was a spectacular box-office smash, immensely popular with both men and women, nominated for several academy awards, including best picture and actress (Glenn Close). On the surface, it's a classic suspense thriller, with "slasher" movie overtones, about a wayward but decent married man's seduction by a deranged vamp. But Alex Forrest, the film's hyperheroine erotic antiheroine, also may be taken as a tarnished symbol of the health gains achieved through several decades of serious feminist effort.

One of the many questions our presentation will address is the apparent willingness of female audience members, in the context of a conservative political climate, to accept unchallenged a relentlessly degraded vision of their own sex and sexuality.

*Fatal Attraction* will be shown uncut. It contains profanity, explicit scenes of sex and violence, and is *not* suitable for children or young teenagers. It will be discussed by Professor Anne Friedberg, a leading feminist film scholar from the University of California, Irvine, and Dr. Harvey Greenberg.

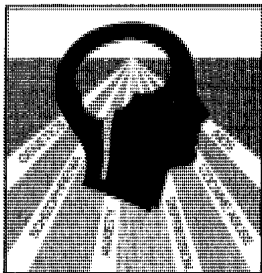

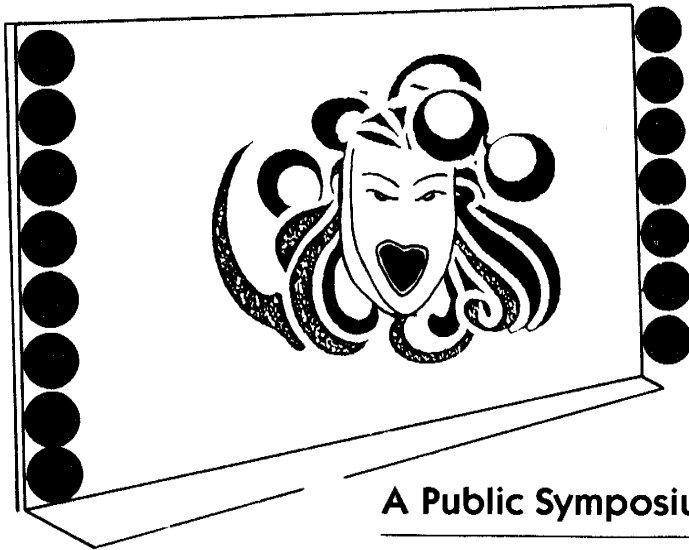

The Maryland Plan is a highly successful program for recruiting university-trained psychiatrists to state service. As the 1989 recipient of APA's Seymour D. Vestermark Award for leadership in psychiatric education, Walter Weintraub, M.D. will describe the development of the Maryland Plan and some of the challenges it has faced.

Dr. Weintraub is the author of two books on verbal behavior, and of numerous articles on psychiatric education, verbal behavior, and psychotherapy outcome. 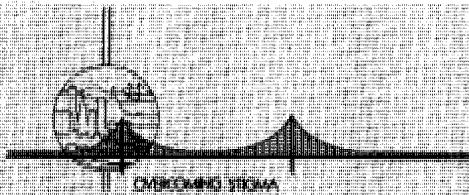
Neuroendocrinologist Seymour Reichlin, M.D. will discuss the effects of brain peptides on anxiety, motivation, excitability, pain, and visceral and homeostatic regulation.

Through his pioneering studies of the neural control of the pituitary, Dr. Reichlin has illuminated the neuroendocrine regulatory mechanisms of the pituitary-thyroid axis, including growth hormone and prolactin secretion. He has also studied the neurobiological significance of somatostatin and vasoactive intestinal peptide, as well as the role of the cytokine Interleukin-1 as a regulator of brain peptide secretion and synthesis.

Dr. Reichlin is chief of endocrinology at the New England Medical Center, director of the General Clinical Research Center at the Tufts-New England Medical Center, and professor of medicine at Tufts University in Boston. He received his medical degree at Washington University School of Medicine. He trained in internal medicine and earned a Ph.D. in physiology at the University of London. Before joining the New England Medical Center in 1972, Dr. Reichlin was chief of the endocrine division at the University of Rochester, and head of medical and pediatric specialties at the University of Connecticut School of Medicine, later becoming chairman of the department of physiology. Dr. Reichlin is past-president of the Endocrine Society and of the Association for Research in Nervous and Mental Diseases.

Although high walls, barred windows, and conspicuously locked doors are gone, psychiatric hospitals may still unwittingly reinforce the stigma of mental illness by limiting contact with the community. Robert W. Gibson, M.D. describes innovative ways in which psychiatric hospitals can transform their public image from a frightening symbol of mental disease to a resource that virtually every person may at some point utilize. Dr. Gibson will discuss the use of community outreach programs, educational efforts, and wellness-oriented activities to fight stigma and improve care.

Dr. Gibson is president and chief executive officer of the Sheppard and Enoch Pratt Hospital in Baltimore, the institution with which he has been affiliated since 1960. Dr. Gibson is past-president of the American Psychiatric Association, the National Association of Private Psychiatric Hospitals, and the Group for the Advancement of Psychiatry. He was a recipient of the Edward A. Strecker Award of the Institute of the Pennsylvania Hospital and the Bowis Award of the American College of Psychiatrists. Former Baltimore Mayor William Donald Schaefer pronounced June 10, 1986, "Dr. Robert W. Gibson Day" in honor of Dr. Gibson's distinguished career at Sheppard Pratt.

Considered one of psychiatry's leading spokesmen, Dr. Gibson has testified before Congress on Medicare and Medicaid policies, health maintenance organizations, health manpower, and national health insurance. Dr. Gibson has published nearly 100 papers on clinical and administrative psychiatry. He is a member of the editorial boards of *Psychiatry*, *American Journal of Psychiatry*, *Hospital & Community Psychiatry*, and the *Journal of Nervous and Mental Disease*.

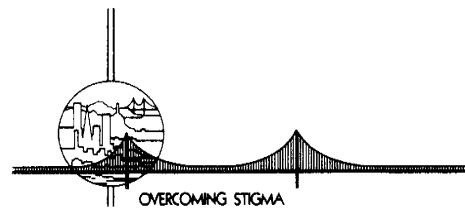

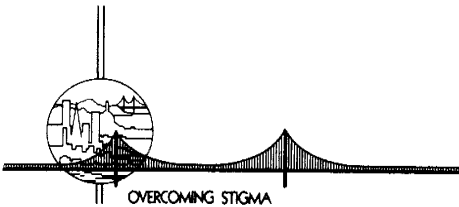

**Russia's First "Madman":  
A Parable for Its Present and Future**

Political journalist I.F. Stone traces Soviet abuses of psychiatry to the psychiatric confinement by Czarist authorities of philosopher Peter Yakovlovich Chaadayev in 1836, years before Marx and Lenin. Chaadayev was released after months of confinement on the condition that he cease to write, but his story has relevance to the contemporary controversy about Soviet misuse of psychiatry.

Isidor Feinstein Stone has been known for insightfulness and political savvy for over 50 years. Born in 1907 in Philadelphia, he was a reporter for the *New York Post* in the 1930's and editor of *The Nation* in the 1940's. In 1953, Mr. Stone began publication of *I.F. Stone's Weekly*, a newsletter staffed only by himself and his wife, Esther, whose subscribers included Albert Einstein, Bertrand Russell and Eleanor Roosevelt. A particularly influential voice in the 1960's, he is now a regular contributor to the *New York Review of Books*.

Mr. Stone has written a number of books, including *The Court Disposes* (1937), about the U.S. Supreme Court, *The*

*First Year of Defense* (1941), about the unpreparedness of U.S. military forces; *Underground to Palestine* (1946), about his involvement in the struggle of Jewish refugees to reach Israel; and *The Hidden History of the Korean War* (1952). His columns have been collected in *The Haunted Fifties* (1963), *In a Time of Torment* (1967), and *Polemics and Prophecies, 1967-1970* (1971). His most recent books are the *Trial of Socrates* (1988) and *The War Years: 1935-1945* (1988).

Dr. Risse is professor and chairman of the department of history and philosophy of health sciences at the University of California, San Francisco. He is currently the president of the American Association for the History of Medicine. Dr. Risse is the author of *Hospital Life in Enlightenment Scotland: Care and Teaching at the Royal Infirmary of Edinburgh* (1986), and edited *Medicine Without Doctors: Home Health Care in American History* (with R.L. Numbers and J.W. Leavitt, 1977) and *Modern China and Traditional Chinese Medicine* (1973). He is also the editor and translator of *History of Physiology*, by K.E. Rothschild (1973).

Dr. Risse graduated from the University of Buenos Aires School of Medicine, and trained in internal medicine in Buffalo, Detroit, and Columbus, Ohio. He received a Ph.D. in history from the University of Chicago. Before joining UCSE, Dr. Risse was professor and chairman of the department of history of medicine at the University of Wisconsin Medical School. He was the recipient of the 1988 William H. Welch Medal of the American Association for the History of Medicine.

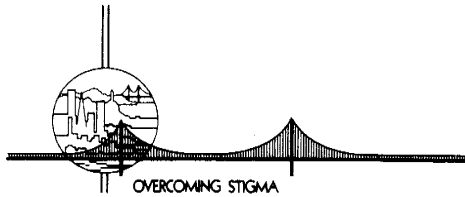

*Attacking Anxiety* is a general audience documentary which 15-20 million Americans will identify with. According to the preliminary results of an NIMH survey, anxiety disorders affect 8 or 9 of every 100 Americans, but only a fraction ask for professional help. *Attacking Anxiety* motivates people with anxiety disorders to get appropriate professional help.

*Attacking Anxiety* gives intimate glimpses into the lives of three people with anxiety disorders: Sandy has been obsessed with anxieties about cleanliness for seven years. Seemingly out of nowhere, Steve has become plagued by a phobia about highways and bridges. Crying jags, heart palpitations and chronic worrying have left Eileen unable to function.

Viewers watch as Sandy, Steve, and Eileen seek help, suffer setbacks, and make progress. Interspersed with private moments from their home lives and their therapy sessions are comments by renowned psychiatrists, psychologists and a neuroscientist. They point out that the causes of pathological anxiety remain unknown. They also offer insights about certain therapies that are effective in treating anxiety disorders.

*Attacking Anxiety* comes with booklets outlining symptoms (of Panic Disorder, phobias, Obsessive Compulsive Disorder, Post-traumatic Stress Disorder, and Generalized Anxiety Disorder), describing effective psychological and drug treatments, suggesting further readings, and proposing strategies for finding good treatment.

Twists of Fate demonstrates the puzzling array of symptomatology and ingenious adaptations of people afflicted with the neurobehavioral syndrome, "The Dystonias." Dystonic reactions are commonly seen as side effects of antipsychotic drugs, but the majority of persistent cases are of unknown etiology. The dystonias may begin at any age and range in severity from a writer's cramp to a malignant form that engulfs the entire body. The clinical presentation at any given time and overall course of the disease for a given individual is unpredictable. A patient's foot may uncontrollably spasm and turn-in while walking forward, but function normally while running or even walking backward. A patient's hand may only contort while typing or writing. The dystonias are thus easily misdiagnosed and misunderstood. Patients are often dismissed as hysterical, consigned to wasted years of self-blame and inappropriate treatments. *Twists of Fate* brings clarity to this clinically confusing phenomenon. It also sensitizes viewers to the doubly difficult plight of dystonia patients who must struggle not only with their aberrant movements, but with the social ostracism the condition, and the medical profession, too often engender.

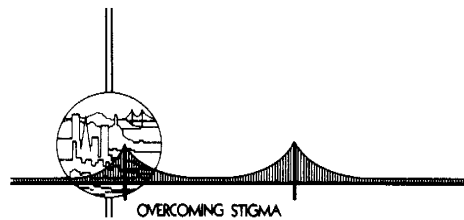

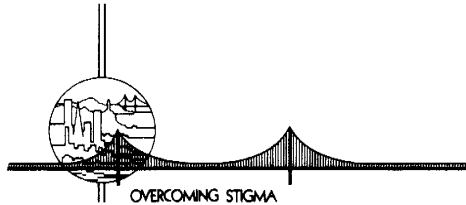

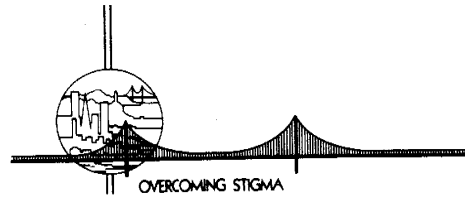

*A Soldier's Story* is a faithful adaptation of the award-winning play by its author, Charles Fuller. It was originally presented by Manhattan's famous "Negro Ensemble Company."

The film takes place on a small Louisiana Army base near the end of World War II. The military services are still almost completely segregated. Black troops are not permitted to fight, only to support; their commissioned officers are white.

Captain Davenport (Harold Rollins, Jr.) a black attorney, and one of the few officers of his race and rank, is dispatched from Washington into this bastion of prejudice. His unenviable assignment, to investigate the roadside shooting of Sgt. Waters (Adolph Caesar), a veteran of many years and unpopular coach of the post baseball team.

At first, it appears Waters may have been shot by the local KKK. Davenport's efforts are none too quietly stymied at every turn, in aid of keeping the peace. But the Captain proceeds relentlessly to uncover the truth. An Agatha Christie-like search for the killer reveals not only the killer, but Sgt. Waters' tormented character, the complexity of his own prejudices. Waters was a light-skinned black who believed he could ultimately succeed by out-whiting his superiors. He loathed and persecuted men he thought of as "geechees" and "Uncle Toms," who he was convinced gave whites a justified ground for their racism. A crypto-Nazi ridden with self-delusion and hatred, Waters also emerges as a pitiable embodiment of identification with the aggressor.

Although its subject matter made smash box-office unlikely, *A Soldier's Story* received unanimously excellent reviews, and strong praise for its stars as well as its ensemble playing. Its Forties milieu is admirably realized.

Recommended for general audiences; however, some strong language.

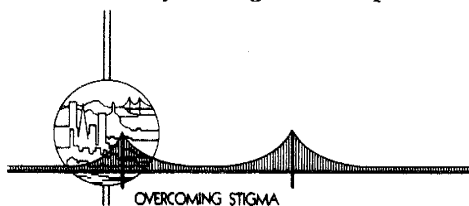

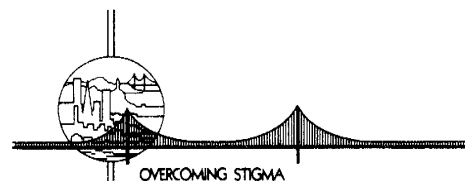

The issue of sexual harassment has begun to be discussed more openly as women have entered the workplace in increasing numbers. Psychiatrist Elissa P. Benedek, M.D. describes emotional consequences of sexual harassment and legal avenues available to victims. She will also review educational programs that have been implemented

by some employers to increase employees' consciousness of sexual harassment.

Dr. Benedek is director of training and research at the Center for Forensic Psychiatry in Ann Arbor. A former vice-president of the American Psychiatric Association, she currently chairs APA's Ethics Appeals Board and is a member of the liaison committee on *DSM-III*. She has been secretary of the APA since 1985 and is former chairperson of both the APA Task Force on Women in Psychiatry and the Committee on Women. Dr. Benedek is currently a member of the board of regents of the American College of Psychiatrists.

Dr. Benedek is a leading expert on children's issues, including child sexual abuse, children as witnesses, and the effects of divorce on children. She is the author of 50 papers, five books, and 30 chapters about forensic psychiatry, training in psychiatry, and women's issues. She is a member of the editorial boards of the *American Journal of Psychiatry*, the *Journal of the American Academy of Child Psychiatry*, and the *Family Law Journal*.

Dr. Benedek was a Ripley Memorial Lecturer at the University of Michigan, where she received her medical training. She has served as a consultant to the American Medical Association on the special problems of children in single parent families, and to the National Institute of Mental Health on the problems of women psychiatric inpatients.

Systematic clinical observations, family histories, and laboratory findings led to a reclassification, by psychopathologist Hagop S. Akiskal, M.D., of certain personality and chronic neurotic disorders into clinically meaningful subtypes of depression. The affective nature of these chronic disorders has become part of the official nomenclature of the American Psychiatric Association, and *DSM-III-R* recognizes residual major depressive and dysthymic categories. Once considered refractory, many patients with these "personality" and "neurotic" disorders are being successfully treated with thymoleptic medication.

Dr. Akiskal is professor of psychiatry and director of the section of affective disorders at the University of Tennessee in Memphis. He is also director of continuing medical education in psychiatry and associate professor of pharmacology. A leader in psychiatric nosology, Dr. Akiskal was an advisor to the APA Work Group to revise *DSM-III* and to the World Health Organization in its preparation of *ICD-10*. In 1975 he organized the first international symposium to examine biological approaches to psychiatric diagnosis.

Dr. Akiskal is the author of more than 200 scientific articles and book chapters and also the editor of two mono-

graphs on affective disorders in the *Psychiatric Clinics of North America* series. He authored, with William McKinney, Jr. and Peter Whybrow the book *Mood Disorders: Toward a New Psychobiology* (1984). He is a past recipient of the Clinical Research Award of the American Academy of Clinical Psychiatrists, and was invited by the Royal Australian and New Zealand College of Psychiatrists to deliver the keynote address at the special celebration of the Australian Bicentennial in 1988.

Born in Lebanon of Armenian parents, Dr. Akiskal attended medical school at the American University of Beirut, and trained in psychiatry at the University of Tennessee and the University of Wisconsin. Dr. Akiskal speaks French and Arabic and has published poetry and short stories in both English and Armenian.

To the producer's knowledge, this video represents the only thorough description of a biological female who has undergone sex reassignment hormone and surgical treatment, and is living as a gay man. This condition warrants closer scrutiny, not only because of its uniqueness, but because of its importance with reference to the relationship between sexual orientation and gender identity.

In Part I, Louis introduces himself as a 36-year-old biological female who pursued sex reassignment at age 28 through male hormone therapy, mastectomy, and genital surgery. In his male role, he responds erotically only to homosexual men, who accepted him as their gay lover. Unfortunately, Louis contracted AIDS some 12 months ago, and he discusses the implications of this fatal disease.

Louis describes "her" childhood and family relations. Her earliest recollection of preferring the male role came at age 3 when she insisted that her younger siblings play "boys." This game became an obsessive fantasy. After puberty, Lois realized that the masculine preference was compounded by a fascination for and sexual arousal toward men.

In Part II, Louis completes his story. He terminates his long-standing relationship with Jim, and pursues sex reassignment hormone treatment, mastectomy, and genital surgery. In graphic detail, he describes the physical and psychological changes while on testosterone. Finally, he discusses his experiences living as a gay man, and contracting AIDS. Obviously, the price he pays for his cherished gay male role is very high. However, he seems to accept the "poetic justice" of his unique status.

Although the production definitely has political overtones, it is very useful to see what these unfortunate men endure when they either reject psychiatric help or are not offered help. It is also phenomenologically interesting to see and hear the events these men experienced leading them toward PTSD, as the program shows what is involved in preparing the minds of these men for war and what the conditions of war are like. Many of these men now live in caves or under logs, and tell horrific stories of what their lives were like when they tried to return to their communities. ## EVENING TRIBUTE TO LES BLANK

This evening of three films pays tribute to one of America's most innovative independent filmmakers, Les Blank, who lives and works in the San Francisco Bay Area. Born in 1935 in Tampa, Florida, Les Blank attended Tulane University in New Orleans, where he majored in English literature and took his Master's Degree in Playwriting. After two years of film school at the University of Southern California, he made his first independent film on Texas blues singer Lightning Hopkins in 1967. His early independent films began a series of intimate glimpses into the lives and music of people who live at the periphery of American society, a series that grew to include Louisiana French musicians, New Orleans Blacks, Bay Area garlic fanatics, Appalachian fiddlers, Polish-American polka dancers, popular rock and roll, and gap-toothed women.

In 1984, Les Blank was the Louis B. Mayer Filmmaker in Residence at Dartmouth college and a fellow at the Sundance Institute in Utah. His work has been supported by the National Endowment For the Arts, the American Film Institute, the National Endowment for the Humanities, the Ford Foundation, and the Guggenheim Foundation. He has been honored by numerous awards and major retrospectives at the Museum of Modern Art in New York and the Cinematheque Francais in Paris, among others.

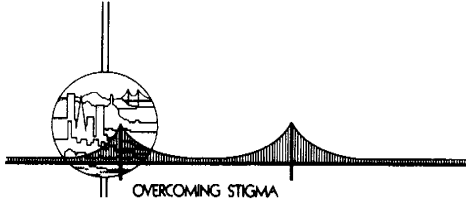

The title of this documentary film refers to the 90 recently discovered lyrical and melancholy poems carved by Chinese immigrants who were detained indefinitely at the Angel Island Immigration Station in San Francisco Bay during the Chinese Exclusion Act and subsequent exclusionary laws (1882-1943). This was the first and only time in the history of American immigration law that a group was excluded solely on the basis of race. The film describes the historical background of these government actions, the demeaning experience of the detainment lasting weeks to years for thousands of Chinese immigrants, and the ways these immigrants eventually overcame their despair. The film integrates recreations of immigration officer interrogations and

barracks scenes with archival footage and recent interviews of both internees and immigration officials. The film translates the impact of public policies into human terms and examines the consequences of exclusion in America.

On June 19, 1982, during the height of an auto recession, Vincent Chin, a 27-year-old Chinese-American draftsman, was beaten to death with a baseball bat by a Chrysler foreman and his stepson on a busy Detroit street; the attackers had mistaken Chin for being Japanese. After a conviction of manslaughter and a sentence of three years probation and a \$3,000 fine, a national movement emerged to protest the trial's results. The film combines newsreel footage with interviews of the survivors, placing this single incident in the larger context of American culture where some of its citizens, fearful of unemployment and other races, express anti-Asian sentiments similarly seen 100 years ago.

## Simple Aspects of "Mind" and "Brain" in Physics

Pioneering physicist John J. Hopfield, Ph.D. describes theoretical models of human synaptic activity, now called "Hopfield Networks," that are revealing how the mind perceives and remembers. They even provide a "simple mathematical description of getting one's mind out of a rut." His work has blossomed into a now large area of research in physics concerning "neural networks." This work may pave the way for use of such networks in computers, and is expected to bring advances in biology, cognitive psychology and computer sciences.

Dr. Hopfield has been twice honored by the American Physical Society, with the Oliver E. Buckley Prize in Solid State Physics in 1969 and with the Biophysics Prize in 1985. He is a member of the National Academy of Arts and Sciences, the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and the American Philosophical Society.

Dr. Hopfield is Roscoe Gilkey Dickinson professor of chemistry and biology at the California Institute of Technology, and has just completed a five-year MacArthur Fellowship. He graduated with highest honors from Swarthmore College, received a Ph.D. from Cornell University, and was professor of physics at Princeton University from 1964 to 1980. He has been a staff member since 1973 at the Bell Laboratories, where he worked with David Tank on neural networks.

Can the Public Psychiatric Administrator be Ethical?

Roger Peele, M.D. contends that, with few exceptions, the public psychiatric sector is inherently unethical. Public psychiatry, he says, reflects and enacts discrimination against the mentally ill in this country, and is burdened by resource limitations, excessive bureaucracy, overly close ties to the judiciary, and political exigencies. Despite his bleak outlook, Dr. Peele emphasizes strategies that public psychiatric administrators may use to reduce the negative impact of the public system on patients. He exhorts administrators to use their positions to encourage policy changes that can benefit public psychiatric patients.

Roger Peele, M.D. is chairman of the psychiatry department, chief clinical officer, and director of the office of training and standards for the Washington, D.C. Commission on Mental Health Services, which includes St. Elizabeths Hospital. While acting superintendent of St. Elizabeths, he oversaw ten urban clinics, six partial hospitalization programs, and an urban hospital with more than 2,000 beds. He is one of a handful of American psychiatrists who are board certified in psychiatry, administrative psychiatry, and forensic psychiatry. Dr. Peele has held several elected positions, including Speaker of the Assembly of the American Psychiatric Association.

Dr. Peele received his medical education at the University of Tennessee. After completing residency training at St. Elizabeths Hospital, he was appointed chief of service of the William A. White Research Unit and later became superintendent. In addition to his posts in the public sector, he is currently clinical professor of psychiatry and behavioral sciences at the George Washington University School of Medicine.

**Chronic Psychotropic Drug Treatment: Potential Toxicity to Learning and Memory**

Eva King Killam, Ph.D., the editor-in-chief of the *Journal of Pharmacology and Experimental Therapeutics*, has studied the behavioral toxicity of psychoactive drugs, administered in chronic treatments, in primates. Learning, memory and performance have been evaluated after long-term administration of chlorpromazine, diazepam and nordiazepam, sodium valproate, and phenobarbital. Simple as well as complex sequential behaviors have been examined, using the highest standards of pharmacologic methodology. Dr. Killam has also studied the effects of female hormones and menstrual cycling on these drug-behavior interactions.

Dr. Killam is professor of pharmacology at the University of California, Davis School of Medicine. Her earlier works, in collaboration with her husband, Dr. Keith F. Killam, were electrophysiological and behavior studies of drug effects in extrapyramidal motor systems and hippocampal circuits, as well as mechanisms involved in sleep and wakefulness. They have also developed a primate model of human epilepsy to study pharmacologic control of paroxysmal brain activity.

Dr. Killam is president-elect of the American Society of Pharmacology and Experimental Therapeutics, and is immediate past-president of the American College of Neuropsychopharmacology. Dr. Killam earned an advanced degree in zoology at Mount Holyoke College and a doctoral degree in pharmacology at the University of Illinois.

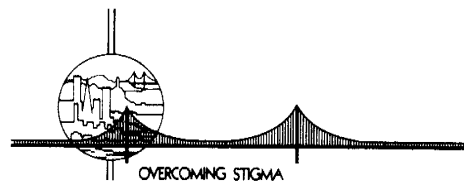
The wry vision of Scottish director Bill Forsyth has quietly been flourishing over the past decade, in films like *Gregory's Girl* and *Local Hero*. *Housekeeping* definitively advances Forsyth beyond the status of talented regional filmmaker, securely placing him in the ranks of our most gifted contemporary cinema artists.

The film's setting is the small western town of Fingerbone, ringed by the Rockies. At narrative center are two teenagers, Ruthie (Sara Walker) and Lucille (Andrea Burchell), orphaned by their mother's suicide, then raised by their grandmother. A caretaking crisis precipitated by the latter's death appears to be resolved with the sudden appearance of their mother's long lost sister, Sylvie (Christina Lahti).

But the aunt proves the oddest sort of surrogate mother. A chronic wanderer, she's serenely unflappable, keeps a disorderly, unscheduled household; snoozes on a park bench in scandalous public view. Ruthie loves Sylvie and increasingly identifies with her itinerant life style. But Lucille, desperately craving a conforming normality, rebels. The townsfolk also grow alarmed at what they perceive as the deteriorating circumstances surrounding Sylvie, precipitat-

ing an inevitable confrontation between two radically divergent world views.

*Housekeeping* received favorable, even glowing reviews, but faded quickly from general distribution. It offers wonderful performances by Lahti, and the two unknown actresses who play the sisters. Forsyth's feeling for his characters is Chikovian-balanced, generous, ironic. This is one of the most compelling accounts of adolescent struggle with issues of identity ever filmed. Recommended for general audiences.

This educational video, targeting urban minority women, provides behavior modeling and information surrounding transmission factors of perinatal AIDS. Through its focus on perinatal issues, the video reviews unprotected sex and the sharing of IVDU apparatus as modes of transmission. Negotiating condom use with sexual partners, cleaning of IVDU apparatus, and HIV testing are explored as well.

The video is designed to include a series of modules, each focusing on a specific issue relating to pregnancy and AIDS. Each module contains dramatized vignettes, e.g., negotiating condom use or HIV testing. A "chorus line" group of women speaking directly to the viewer provides a variety of perspectives in the form of commentary following each vignette. Each module ends with original music and lyrics reiterating major informational points contained within the module. Its modular format provides maximum opportunity for intervention in a variety of settings, e.g., clinic waiting rooms, group and individual counseling sessions, training professionals, and within community organizations providing AIDS related services.

This video presents AIDS education and prevention in a culturally sensitive and empowering manner to urban minority women, thus making it unique among presently available video material.

This presentation is the description of a videotaped body-image confrontation technique which has been used by the author for the past 8 years. Its purpose is to challenge the body-image distortion or dissatisfaction which is typical of

anorexic and bulimic patients. The aim is to provide the viewers with the information required to carry out this intervention if they desire to. The first section presents two clinical cases and their reaction to the confrontation. In general, most anorexics react emotionally with surprise at what they see, then sadness and frustration with themselves. The experience is useful to them as a motivator to keep them in treatment. A smaller group continues to deny their emaciation or their feelings about it even when confronted. As other studies have shown, these patients tend to have a higher rate of relapse. The final section will review before and after treatment images of several patients, highlighting the remarkable changes the bodies of these patients undergo in a relatively short period of time. Since most hospitals have access to the equipment necessary to carry out this procedure, the author recommends that this therapeutic technique be considered as an adjunct to the treatment of most anorexic and/or bulimic patients. However, this can be a powerful experience and it should always be conducted in the presence of a therapist.

This videotape consists of an introduction by the two co-therapists (a male and a female), followed by selected vignettes drawn from two consecutive sessions of a boys' therapy group which were held at the end of the group's second treatment year.

A National Institute of Mental Health report, for the period 1975-1980, shows that there has been a marked increase in the use of group treatment in clinical settings serving young

adolescents. There is an acknowledged need to differentiate among various group modalities employed with adolescents, including the provision of special training for practitioners.

The tape demonstrates the value of an activity discussion model of group therapy as a means of engaging a population of pre-adolescent boys (ages 12-14) in treatment. One-to-one psychotherapy has been found to be of limited usefulness with such youths because of their almost uncontrollable restlessness and need to defend their beginning autonomy against adults. Massive denial, externalization, concrete thinking, and orientation to the present all work against attempts to promote introspection and self-awareness.

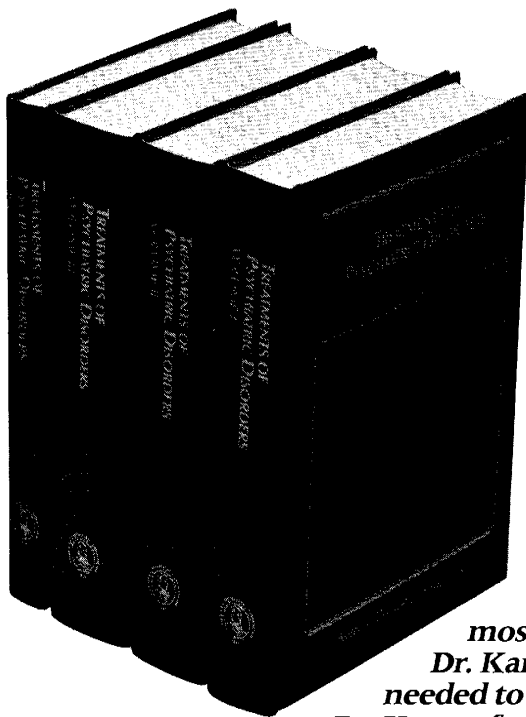

This videotape shows the value of applying cognitive behavioral dynamics in the rapid psychiatric evaluation and correct diagnosis of a black, suicidally depressed woman. Reliance on traditional formulations, without the off-setting emphasis on cognitive behavioral dynamics, might well have resulted in both the misdiagnosis and inappropriate psychotropic treatment of this woman. The therapist in this case demonstration will illustrate how easily clinicians can apply basic principles of cognitive behavioral dynamics and thereby avoid that medicolegal hazard. The therapist on the tape will also demonstrate the clinical usefulness of doing a quick therapeutic trial of cognitive behavioral therapy as part of the evaluational procedure. This maneuver helps therapists determine both the correct diagnosis of the patient, as well as the appropriateness of this patient for drug-free cognitive-behavioral therapy, as opposed to psychotropic medication with little or no prescribed "talk-therapy."

By the end of the session, interested viewers should have sufficient clinical knowledge to use two of the basic therapeutic techniques explained in *Clinically Prescribed Emotional Self-Help*.
