Dear Colleagues and Guests:

I am so pleased to welcome you to the 144th Annual Meeting of the American Psychiatric Association. The theme of this meeting is "Our Children: Our Future."

We now know that between 7.5 million and 14 million children and adolescents suffer from a mental or emotional disorder, and less than one-fifth receive appropriate treatment. Of those who do receive treatment, even by the best clinicians, many fail to recover because their illnesses are not adequately understood. The result is a child or adolescent whose well-being is seriously undermined, if not destroyed, and who, as an adult, will be unable to lead a fulfilling, productive life. This nation is now at a crossroads where either we must commit the resources necessary to enhance public hospitals, establish a network of community-based mental health services for children and adolescents, and expand research in this area or we will pay a terrible price in human suffering and the future of our country. Fortunately, because of dramatic advances in child and adolescent mental health research in recent years, we now have real hope that continued work in this area will lead to a greater understanding of causes, risk factors and prevention methods. Still, the research means little if patients are denied access to its fruits.

At this meeting you will have the opportunity to attend numerous sessions planned specifically around the meeting's theme that will expound on and bring you up-to-date on the most recent breakthroughs in our understanding of child and adolescent mental disorders, as well as important issues relating to child development and family life. These are in addition to the usual wide array of sessions touching on virtually every topic important to psychiatry today.

I am very proud of the hard work that APA's Scientific Program and Local Arrangements Committees have expended in planning this meeting and special activities for children and families. It is a marvelous conclusion to an exciting year for the Association, a year in which I hope I succeeded in at least some small measure to bring to the forefront of our profession the plight of children whose mental health needs have been shamefully neglected for far too long.

I hope you will join with me in continuing the drive for more and better mental health services for our nation's children, as well as for the many others who are victimized by stigma and find the door to mental health care stubbornly locked.

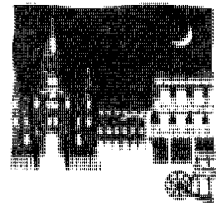

This has become an excellent way to start off the Annual Meeting's research programs, in conjunction with the Young Investigators' Poster Session, on Monday morning. In addition you will find an expanded number of small group sessions, which include the Discussion Groups and Clinical and Research Consultations With.

This year, our Round Table Discussion, on Wednesday, will be on Managed Care. I know that you will not want to miss this exciting new format which will focus on an issue of tremendous importance to all clinicians. You will also note in the *Program Book* that we are instituting noon forums this year. This format allows us to schedule sessions which may not fit in the usual formats or which may focus on late-breaking topics of importance to the field. These forums will be held Tuesday through Thursday.

I strongly encourage you to fill out and return the evaluation forms for this meeting. The members of the Scientific Program Committee are interested in the opinions of the members regarding the quality and content of the Annual Meeting, and use the information provided to plan for next year's program. I would also be happy to hear from you individually and would welcome your suggestions. I can be reached at the APA through the Office to Coordinate the Annual Meeting.

*Psychiatric News* operates its news gathering and reporting activities from this office. Persons who wish to contact editors or reporters may make arrangements for appointments here, or may leave written announcements, suggestions for articles, or letters to the editor for the newspaper's consideration.

*American Journal of Psychiatry* staff will be available to answer authors' questions and to receive papers submitted for publication. The *Journal* publishes only original material that has not been published elsewhere in any form and that is not being considered for publication elsewhere. Five copies are required.

*Hospital and Community Psychiatry* staff will be located in the APA Resource Center. Hours of operation are the same as the Resource Center. Staff will be available to answer questions about H&CP and about writing for publication in psychiatric journals. Authors may submit papers (unpublished material) for publication. Five copies, in an electronically scannable format, are required.

## CONTINUING MEDICAL EDUCATION CREDIT

The American Psychiatric Association is accredited by the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education (ACCME) to sponsor continuing medical education for physicians. The APA certifies that the continuing medical education activities designated as Category I for the 1991 Annual Meeting sessions meet the criteria for Category I of the Physician's Recognition Award of the American Medical Association and the CME requirement of the APA.

The sessions of the official Annual Meeting program, with some exceptions noted in this program, meet the criteria for continuing medical education Category I credit. The exceptions are awarded Category II credit and designated with an asterisk (\*) in this *Program Book*.

There are several criteria used to designate a session for Category I certification. One important criteria is that a program must be preplanned and explore one topic or a closely related group of topics in depth. Preplanning means defining good learning objectives appropriate for the CME activity, and evaluating how well the session objectives are met.

To claim credit, registrants should claim one hour of credit for each hour of participation in sessions. To document that credit, participants should record the session(s) attended on the back page of the *Certificate of Attendance* found in the front of the *1991 Annual Meeting CME Syllabus & Proceedings Summary Book*. Please note: physician psychiatrists are required to maintain their own record of CME hours throughout the three-year reporting cycle. Documentation of all CME credit is done "on the honor system." Once an APA member has accumulated 150 hours (60 in Category I), he/she should report that to the APA Office of Education, on the Continuing Medical Education Form or a postcard, both of which may be obtained by contacting the Office at the APA. The *Certificate of Attendance* (or copy of) may be forwarded to other organizations requiring verification of participation in the APA Annual Meeting. Staff will be available in the Office of Education booth in the APA Resource Center to answer any of your questions about CME.

## ANNUAL MEETING EVALUATION

The Annual Meeting Scientific Program Committee needs your recommendations and evaluations to plan next year's Annual Meeting. A par-

Both of these films are darkly comic family portraits made by Australian director Jane Campion. Campion has made several award winning shorts, including *Peel*, which won the Palme d'Or Award at the Cannes Film Festival in 1986. *Peel*, a short Campion appetizer, quickly engages the viewer in an intriguing family dispute. In its brief nine minutes, the film holds several surprises.

*Sweetie* at first appears to be a deceptively simple film with affable, mildly eccentric characters, but the complexity of the film and characters evolves as the plot unfolds. The film centers on the conflicts between Kay, a depressed, inhibited woman, and her sister, Sweetie, who is severely emotionally disturbed. Sweetie, with her boyfriend, Bob, make a surprise visit to Kay and her boyfriend, Louie. Sweetie's parents, who are in the process of a separation, are also drawn into the turmoil between Kay and Sweetie. All of the characters' strengths and weaknesses are empathically depicted. Campion neither celebrates nor judges the characters as they struggle with their own conflicts and limitations. Despite the numbing daily grind of the characters' lives, the film maintains a sense of humor and hopefulness. Among the few clues to the film's inherent celebration of life are the beautiful a cappella songs that provide an uplifting emotional backdrop at several points in the film.

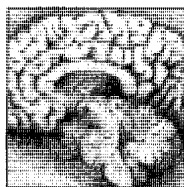

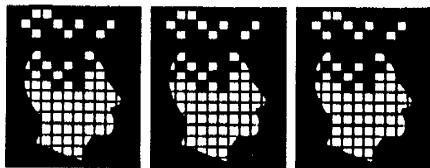

Yet, consideration of the history of biological issues in psychiatry shows that research questions and strategies in the study of disease and those it affects have not shifted fundamentally from Freud and Meyer to modern molecular biology. Daniel X. Freedman, M.D., Judson Braun Professor of Psychiatry and Pharmacology at the University of California, Los Angeles, will examine this history and its implications for a Meyerian future of psychiatry.

Dr. Freedman, a pioneering researcher in biological psychiatry, discovered the link between hallucinogens and brain neurohormones. He has clarified the effects of environmental stress on the brain and identified hyper-serotonemia in autism. While a medical student, he began the first American research on brain mechanisms in allergy. He is currently Acting Chairman of the Department of Psychiatry and Biobehavioral Sciences at UCLA and Acting Director of the UCLA Neuropsychiatric Institute.

Dr. Freedman is Editor of the *AMA Archives of General Psychiatry*, author of more than 200 articles on mental illness and drug research, and coauthor of 15 books. He is a member of the editorial boards of several journals, including the *Journal of the American Medical Association*, the *Journal of Nervous and Mental Disease*, and the *Journal of Clinical Psychopharmacology*.

A past president of the American Psychiatric Association, the American Association of Chairmen of Departments of Psychiatry, and the Society of Biological Psychiatry, Dr. Freedman has served on or chaired several international, national and local committees concerned with science and policy, particularly in the area of drug abuse prevention. He chaired the Research Task Panel of President Carter's Commission on Mental Health and was influential in shifting the research priorities of the National Institute of Mental Health to the major mental illnesses. A member of the Institute of Medicine and Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, Dr. Freedman has received numerous awards, including the APA's Seymour D. Vestermark Award for his role in educating many leaders in psychiatric research, and the APA's Distinguished Service Award for his contributions to American psychiatric research, health policy and education.

Dr. Freedman completed his medical degree and psychiatric residency at Yale University School of Medicine and graduated from the Western New England Institute for Psychoanalysis.

During the past decade, educators and law enforcement officials have attempted to teach young children to resist and to report their sexual abuse by adults. Educational programs about sexual abuse have been based on the assumptions that children can learn to distinguish good from bad touching, that they should report bad touching to a trusted adult, and that they always tell the truth if asked about adults' sexual activities on or with them. Increasing clinical experience and research on child sexual abuse have shown that these assumptions should not be taken for granted. Young children often cannot distinguish activities that constitute sexual abuse, and they often cannot answer questions about sexual abuse truthfully, either because they do not understand the questions or because they feel compelled to say what they believe the interviewer wants to hear. Albert J. Solnit, M.D., will discuss the significance of these findings for understanding the experience of the child as witness.

Dr. Solnit is Sterling Professor Emeritus of Pediatrics and Psychiatry at Yale University School of Medicine and Child Study Center, and a training and supervising analyst at the Western New England Institute for Psychoanalysis and the New York Psychoanalytic Institute. His contributions to the prevention of childhood emotional disorders have been recognized with numerous awards, including the Agnes Purcell McGavin Award from the American Psychiatric Association, the William C. Menninger Award from the Menninger Foundation, and the C. Anderson Aldrich Award in Child Development from the American Academy of Pediatrics. Dr. Solnit is a fellow of the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Science and a member of the Institute's Committee on Human Rights. He is Chairman of the Advisory Council of the Department of Children and Youth Services for the State of Connecticut.

Dr. Solnit is the author of nearly 200 articles and book chapters and several books, including *In the Best Interests of the Child* and *Divorce and Your Child*. He is the managing editor of *The Psychoanalytic Study of the Child* and a member of the editorial advisory board of the *Interdisciplinary Review of Children's Rights*. He is a past

president of the American Psychoanalytic Association, the American Academy of Child Psychiatry, the Association for Child Psychoanalysis, and the International Association for Child and Adolescent Psychiatry and Allied Professions.

A graduate of the University of California at Berkeley and San Francisco, Dr. Solnit was a fellow in child psychiatry at Yale University Child Study Center. He completed his psychoanalytic training at the New York Psychoanalytic Institute.

In this lecture, Professor Mingdao Zhang will focus primarily on the current methods employed to provide better mental health services for the 12 million people of Shanghai in the People's Republic of China. In the 1960s, the city began to develop a three-tiered system of services that is considered a model for the country. Professor Zhang will describe services at each of the system's three levels: the city, the county or district, and the grassroots. The grassroots level includes psychiatric outpatient services provided by township hospitals, psychiatric work-therapy stations, psychiatric home care units, care of mental patients in factories, and psychiatric rehabilitation stations. Nonpsychiatric medical and paramedical personnel play significant roles in service delivery at all levels. Public education about mental health is a priority. While emphasizing these service systems, Professor Zhang will also discuss issues (including problems) of implementing recent research findings.

Professor Zhang is Professor of Psychiatry at Shanghai Second Medical University and Assistant Director of the Shanghai Municipal Health Bureau. He is Vice-Director of the Shanghai Institute of Mental Health and of the World Health Organization Collaborating Center for Research and Training in Mental Health in Shanghai. He is the author of nearly 100 publications on various topics in neurophysiology, psychopharmacology, and genetic aspects of psychiatric disorders.

A graduate of Shanghai Medical School and Shanghai Second Medical University, Professor Zhang has been a visiting scholar at the National Institute of Mental Health and a Kellogg International Fellow in the Program in Health at Michigan State University.

Where does the genius of great artistic invention spring from? *High Wire* and *Vincent* both examine this question. *High Wire* is a riveting portrait of Philippe Petit, a tightrope artist, whose death-defying wizardry is displayed high above the streets of New York City, outside Manhattan's St. John The Divine Cathedral. *High Wire* introduces us to the personality of this remarkable performer. Close-ups of face and body reveal the incredible intensity of his efforts.

*Vincent* is a touching portrait of Vincent Van Gogh who died on July 29, 1890 at the age of 37, unknown and a pauper, having sold only one of the approximately 1,800 works he produced in less than a decade. The film is told through Vincent's letters to his brother, Theo, from 1872 until the time of his death. With these records, we gain some insight into the man, his motivations and his unique humanity. Australian filmmaker Paul Cox, a remarkable artist in his own right, made this film a personal contribution towards the centenary (in 1990) of Vincent's death and as an homage to Vincent himself.

**The American Academy of Pediatrics' National  
Agenda: A Blueprint for Action**

The American Academy of Pediatrics' six major goals for improving child health care include reducing financial and other barriers to comprehensive health care, and reducing morbidity and mortality from intentional and unintentional injuries, especially those associated with abuse of alcohol and other substances. The Academy also supports efforts to promote healthy adolescent lifestyles and to institute comprehensive health education in schools. Other goals include bringing reimbursement of pediatricians to a level that is more equitable with that of other physicians and developing a quality assurance initiative in the Academy. Antoinette Parisi Eaton, M.D., President of the 39,000 member Academy, will discuss efforts to meet these goals and describe the Academy's role in shaping policy and public opinion for a broad range of child health care concerns.

Dr. Eaton is Professor Emeritus of Pediatrics and Preventive Medicine at Ohio State University in Columbus. She is Director of Governmental Affairs and a member of the medical staff at Children's Hospital, and Medical Director of the Easter Seals Rehabilitation Center, both in Columbus. She was formerly Chief of the Division of Maternal and Child Health of the Ohio Department of Health.

Dr. Eaton has been a member of several national and state advisory bodies, including the National Advisory Committee on Care of the Chronically Ill Child, sponsored by Vanderbilt University; the University of Connecticut Pediatric Rehabilitation Research and Training Center Advisory Committee; and the Governor's Commission on Health Care Costs in Ohio. She chaired the Governor's Task Force on Adolescent Sexuality and Pregnancy, work recognized by a Special Achievement Award from the Ohio Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics.

*Caring for the Mentally Ill Offender* shows how the illness of a young man with schizophrenia leads him into trouble with the law, yet is not sufficient to trigger the dangerousness criteria of the Mental Health Act. He is arrested and placed into a remand center where he comes in contact with the Forensic Services of the Alberta Hospital in Edmonton. In northern Alberta, this organization is responsible for psychiatric services to the mentally ill offender, and offers these in the three crucial locations: the hospital (inpatient treatment), the community (outpatient treatment) and in the jail. The tape explores the principles of the service organization necessary to care for what is often a very noncompliant group of patients who are shared between more than one agency or government department. The necessity of a high degree of cooperativeness between the principal players

\*Offers Category II

(Corrections and Health) is noted. The need of each patient for accurate diagnosis and services, which can vary by clinical condition, is discussed, and the fundamental requirement of a service structure that enhances continuity of care between each service location is emphasized. Finally, we note that care cannot be confined to the treatment of a single episode, but must involve a long-term relationship to either prevent future recurrences or catch them early.

Reproductive Rights and the Future of America**

Early in her career, while a graduate student in nurse-midwifery, Faye Wattleton saw firsthand the desperation and suffering caused by unintended pregnancy and illegal, unsafe abortions. Those experiences contributed to her determination to bring reproductive health care within reach of all individuals, particularly the poor and the young.

In 1978 Ms. Wattleton assumed leadership of Planned Parenthood Federation of America, the nation's oldest and largest voluntary reproductive health organization. Almost immediately, her vision and courage catapulted the agency into international prominence.

Ms. Wattleton holds a bachelor's degree in nursing from Ohio State University and a master's degree in maternal and infant care from Columbia University. For seven years prior to assuming the presidency of PFFA, she was executive director of Planned Parenthood's affiliate in Dayton, Ohio.

In addition to several honorary doctoral degrees, Ms. Wattleton has received numerous awards from prominent medical, civic and humanitarian groups. She appears frequently in major media outlets and consults on family planning issues with business and political leaders in the U.S. and abroad.

The availability of family planning and legal abortion has proven essential to Americans' mental and physical well-being. Yet these vital services have come under unprecedented attack in recent years. Ms. Wattleton's lecture will explore current threats to reproductive freedom, their ramifications for America's public health and the importance of preserving every individual's right to decide whether or when to have a child.

**The Dual Personalities in Therapists and Patients**

Charles A. Pinderhughes, M.D., has developed a psychophysiological theory of stereotyping and differential bonding that has relevance for the pathological paranoid in clinical psychiatry, and for prejudices found in the world at large. Brain physiology and its relationship with subsystems of personality are highly complex, but thought content tends to be based on relatively simple pairs of oppositions, such as man/woman, we/they, and black/white, in which one member is valued more highly than the other. Because of this biological basis, human beings tend to function as unobjective, paranoid animals with dual personalities who require the corrective use of scientific principles to recognize and manage their innate tendency to falsify reality. Dr. Pinderhughes applies these concepts to interactions between clinicians and patients and offers guidelines for achieving more reliable clinical results.

Dr. Pinderhughes is Associate Chief of Staff for Education at the Edith Nourse Rogers Memorial Veterans Hospital in Bedford, Massachusetts, and Professor of Psychiatry at the Boston University School of Medicine. A Life Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association, he is Chairperson of the Selection and Advisory Committee for the APA/NIMH Minority Fellowship Program. He was formerly Chief of the Psychiatry Service at the Boston VA Medical Center, and for many years he was on the faculties of Harvard Medical School and Tufts University School of Medicine. He has served on the governing boards of the APA, the Group for the

Advancement of Psychiatry, and the American College of Psychoanalysts. The APA recognized his contributions to improving the quality of life for Black people by awarding him the Solomon Carter Fuller Award in 1982. He is also a recipient of the Distinguished Senior Scholar Award from the National Medical Association.

A graduate of Dartmouth College, Dr. Pinderhughes received his medical degree from Howard University School of Medicine and his psychoanalytic training at the Boston Psychoanalytic Institute.

**The Clinical Impact of the Psychotherapist's View of Human Nature**

Concerned clinicians always monitor the theoretical assumptions that guide their therapeutic work, but their deeply ingrained, privately held views about human nature are rarely subject to scrutiny. These unexamined views readily become amalgamated with theoretical assumptions and accepted as scientific facts, adversely affecting psychotherapeutic practice. Paul H. Ornstein, M.D., discusses commonly held notions about human nature that may intrude into clinical work and suggests some antidotes to their "toxicity."

Dr. Ornstein is Professor of Psychiatry at the University of Cincinnati College of Medicine, Co-Director of the International Center for the Study of Psychoanalytic Self-Psychology, and a training and supervising analyst at the Cincinnati Psychoanalytic Institute. A former associate editor of *Comprehensive Psychiatry*, Dr. Ornstein has written extensively on psychoanalytic psychotherapy and the interpretive process in psychoanalysis, often in collaboration with his wife, Anna. He also edited and wrote an introduction for a four-volume collection of Heinz Kohut's writings on the psychoanalytic psychology of the self.

A graduate of the University of Heidelberg in Germany, Dr. Ornstein completed his psychiatric residency at Cincinnati General Hospital and received his psychoanalytic training at the Chicago Institute for Psychoanalysis.

## The Moral and Spiritual Life of Children

Robert Coles, M.D., whose special interest is field work in social psychiatry, is a research psychiatrist for the Harvard University Health Services and Professor of Psychiatry and Medical Humanities at Harvard Medical School. His contributions to understanding children's attitudes toward moral and political stress and toward ethical and spiritual questions are built on prolonged encounters with children in their everyday lives. Dr. Coles will discuss how children from a variety of backgrounds acquire moral and religious values, and explore the sources of their spiritual direction, including the influences of home, neighborhood, school, and family involvement in religious activities. He will also discuss the traditional psychoanalytic view of religious faith as illusion and examine recent modifications of that perspective.

During the early 1960s, Dr. Coles served as research psychiatrist to the Southern Regional Council on psychiatric aspects of desegregation in the South and since 1963 has served as a consultant to the Council. He has been a member of the National Advisory Committee on Farm Labor since 1965, and is currently a member of the National Sharecropper's Fund. He also is co-founder and a member of the Board of Directors of the newly established Center for Documentary Studies at Duke University.

Dr. Coles has published more than 1,000 articles, reviews and essays. His many books include *The Moral Life of Children*, *The Political Life of Children*, and *Children of Crisis*, a documentary study of children coming to grips with their ethnic and class heritage in the 1960s. He received numerous awards for *Children of Crisis*, including the Ralph Waldo Emerson Prize of Phi Beta Kappa, the McAlpin Medal of the National Association of Mental Health, the Hofheimer Award of the American Psychiatric Association, and the Pulitzer Prize. His most recent book, *The Spiritual Life of Children*, was published in 1990.

A contributing editor to *The New Republic*, *Literature and Medicine*, and *American Poetry Review*, Dr. Coles sits on

the editorial boards of several publications, including *The American Scholar*, *Child Psychiatry and Human Development*, and the *Journal of American Culture*. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the American Orthopsychiatric Association.

The recipient of more than 40 honorary degrees, Dr. Coles is a graduate of Harvard University and The Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons in New York City. He completed psychiatric residencies at Massachusetts General Hospital and McLean Hospital and a residency in child psychiatry at Judge Baker Guidance Center of Children's Hospital in Boston.

**The Listening Healer in the History of Psychological Healing**

As part of a project on the history of psychological healing, Stanley W. Jackson, M.D., examines the healer's listening as an aspect of caring and curing. Over the centuries, psychological healing has included efforts to advise, to persuade, to console, to suggest, and to explain, all with the aim of influencing the troubled person toward a better state. Acquiring the information on which to base therapeutic efforts surely entailed listening for details about the sufferer's condition, yet the need to listen and the nature of the listening activity were rarely mentioned in accounts of these interventions. Even in considerations of confession, the effect of the listening confessor is rarely addressed. In the latter half of the nineteenth century, however, data on the role of listening began to emerge. Only then began the

study of care in listening, listening beyond the words themselves, and the power of the interested listener as a soothing, empathic force.

Dr. Jackson is Professor of Psychiatry and the History of Medicine at Yale University and a faculty member at the Western New England Institute for Psychoanalysis, of which he is a past president. A Life Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association, he is APA's liaison to the American Association for the History of Medicine.

Dr. Jackson's many publications include the book, *Melancholia and Depression: From Hippocratic Times to Modern Times*. He recently edited and wrote an introduction for William Pargeter's 1792 *Observations on Maniacal Disorders*, a volume in the Tavistock series of classics in the history of psychiatry. Dr. Jackson is editor-designate of the *Journal of the History of Medicine and Allied Sciences* and a member of the editorial advisory boards of *History of Psychiatry* and the Classics of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences Library.

Dr. Jackson received his medical degree from McGill University in Montreal and completed psychiatric residencies at Provincial Mental Hospital in Essondale, British Columbia, and at Pinel Hospital in Seattle, Washington. He is a graduate of the Seattle Psychoanalytic Training Center and the San Francisco Psychoanalytic Institute.

#### Psychobiology and Communication: Psychiatry and the Future of Medicine

Adolf Meyer's comprehensive view of psychiatry envisions a biological continuum of brain, body, thought and behavior: human use of symbols is an aspect of general biology. Long before the rise of modern molecular biology and cybernetics, Meyer saw communication as the heart of psychobiology. Joel J. Elkes, M.D., reaffirms Meyer's theories in light of recent scientific advances. Psychiatry is about communication: at the intercellular level; between the brain and other organ systems; and between the brain and the world, including the world encoded in symbols. Restoring communication at the molecular, verbal and metaverbal levels remains psychiatry's core task. Attention to the person

(values, attitudes and meaning) makes deep biological sense within the body of knowledge psychiatry offers. With this focus, psychiatry has the potential to be a catalyst in humanizing health care practices and institutions.

Dr. Elkes is Distinguished Service Professor Emeritus at Johns Hopkins University, and Director of the Division of Attitudinal and Behavioral Medicine and Professor Emeritus of Psychiatry at the University of Louisville Health Sciences Center in Kentucky. Between 1963 and 1975 he was Henry Phipps Professor and Director of the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Science at Johns Hopkins University and Psychiatrist-in-Chief at Johns Hopkins Hospital. He has also served as Director of the NIMH Clinical Neuropharmacology Research Center and as Chairman and Director of the Department of Experimental Psychiatry at the University of Birmingham, England.

Dr. Elkes has been instrumental in establishing a number of important psychiatric organizations. He was the founder and former Director of the Clinical Neuropharmacology Research Center (now the Center for Neuroscience) at NIMH. He was also founding first president of both the American College of Neuropsychopharmacology and the American Institute of Stress, and a founding council member of the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization's International Brain Research Organization. He is past president of the American Psychopathological Association.

A founding member of the editorial board of *Psychopharmacologia* (now *Psychopharmacology*), Dr. Elkes was founding associate editor of the *Journal of Psychiatric Research*. He has been a member of the editorial boards of several journals, including *International Journal of Neuropharmacology*, the *International Review of Neurobiology*, *Altered States of Consciousness*, and *Biosystems*. He was educated at Birmingham University in England and received his psychoanalytic training at Tavistock Institute in London.

Although there is considerable disagreement about just what neuropsychiatry comprises, fundamental to any definition is the indelible inseparability of brain and thought, and of mind and body. In their joint presentations, Drs. Stuart C. Yudofsky and Robert E. Hales will provide a brief history of neuropsychiatry, present epidemiological data concerning the prevalence of common neuropsychiatric disorders and summarize important clinical, training and research findings. Drs. Yudofsky and Hales have been instrumental in promoting the reemergence of the field of neuropsychiatry through the publication of their highly acclaimed *American Psychiatric Press Textbook of Neuropsychiatry* in 1987 and the initiation of the *Journal of Neuropsychiatry and Clinical Neurosciences* in 1989.

Stuart Yudofsky, M.D., is Professor and Chairman of the Department of Psychiatry at the University of Chicago. Prior to his current position, he held numerous posts at Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons, including Associate Director of Psychiatric Services at Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center, and Vice Chairman of the Department of Psychiatry. Dr. Yudofsky has also served as Clinical Director and Deputy Director of the New York State Psychiatric Institute, Director of the Department of Psychiatry at Allegheny General Hospital, and Director of Psychiatric Research at the Allegheny Singer Research Institute in Pittsburgh. Dr. Yudofsky's area of academic interest is on psychiatric concomitants of such neurological illnesses as head injury, Alzheimer's Disease, stroke, and seizure disorders. He is Chairperson of the American Psychiatric Association's Task Force on Traumatic Brain Injury and Editor of the *Journal of Neuropsychiatry and Clinical Neurosciences*.

Robert E. Hales, M.D., is Chairman of the Department of Psychiatry at Pacific Presbyterian Medical Center and a Clinical Professor of Psychiatry at the University of California, San Francisco. He previously served as Chairperson of the American Psychiatric Association's Scientific Program Committee and was Director of Psychiatry Residency Training at Walter Reed Army Medical Center, Washington, D.C. Dr. Hales is President of the Association for Academic Psychiatry and Vice President of the American Association of General Hospital Psychiatrists. He is a member of the editorial boards of *Academic Psychiatry*, *The Journal of Hospital and Community Psychiatry*, and the American Psychiatric Press (APPI). Dr. Hales is Deputy Editor of the *Journal of Neuropsychiatry and Clinical Neurosciences* and Editor of the Concise Guide Series books for APPI. Dr. Hales is also a member of the APA Task Force on DSM-IV and the APA Task Force on Traumatic Brain Injury.

James M. McPherson, Ph.D., graduated magna cum laude and Phi Beta Kappa from Gustavus Adolphus College and earned his doctoral degree with Highest Distinction from Johns Hopkins University working under C. Vann Woodward. He has taught at Princeton University since 1962, where he is now Edwards Professor of American History. His book, *Battle Cry of Freedom: The Civil War Era*, part of the Oxford History of the United States, was published to universal acclaim in 1988, became a national bestseller, and went on to win the Pulitzer Prize in History for that year. It has been hailed as the best one-volume history of the Civil War ever written.

Professor McPherson has been the recipient of numerous fellowships, among them the Woodrow Wilson, Danforth, Guggenheim and Huntington-Seaver. His previous books include *The Struggle for Equality: Abolitionists and the Negro in the Civil War and Reconstruction*, winner of the Anisfield-Wolf Prize, *The Abolitionist Legacy: From Reconstruction to the NAACP* and *Ordeal by Fire: The Civil War and Reconstruction*. His most recent effort, entitled *Abraham Lincoln and the Second American Revolution*, was published earlier this year. McPherson has also written numerous articles, essays and contributions, and has edited and co-edited several volumes on slavery and reconstruction.

In the climax of the video, the young man confronts himself as a boy, trying to make sense of wasted years of anger, hate and confusion. The videotape is designed to promote discussion among patients and health professionals about the effects that linger into adulthood from having grown up in an alcohol-abusing family. It also discusses how this videotape has been useful in adult and adolescent patient groups.

*Voluntary Restraint in the Treatment of MPD* is an edited tape of three voluntary restraint psychotherapy sessions, including editorial comments about the process of considering the use of this procedure, patient and staff preparation, and descriptions of the psychotherapeutic considerations during the therapy sessions. It focuses on how to prepare a general hospital psychiatric ward staff who have not specialized in the treatment of MPD. Careful consideration is given to the use of hypnosis as a primary form of restraint, with both leather and manual restraints as backup systems to insure safety. Additionally, hypnotic suggestions are demonstrated for ego strengthening and conflict resolution. The importance of the clinician pacing the intensity and depth of the patient's psychotherapeutic work is emphasized.

*Understanding Psychological Trauma* is a one-hour video documentary presented in two, half-hour segments. Part I of this program will be shown this afternoon at 2:00 p.m. (V26). Traumatizing events, such as homicide, suicide, community or workplace violence, natural disaster, terrorism and war, frequently have devastating effects on the emotional well-being of those who survive. By destroying their assumptions about the safety or integrity of their living and working environment, such events can, and often do, lead survivors to an agonizing sense of helplessness and isolation that can trigger an array of post-traumatic stress reactions. It has only been in the last decade that significant research has helped us to gain insight into the psychobiological effects of trauma. Unfortunately, those most likely to suffer from and be affected by post-traumatic stress reactions are frequently neither recognized nor treated. They are left to cope on their own, without benefit of professional intervention or appropriate support. Even survivors who are evaluated by health professionals are often not questioned about their personal experiences of trauma. Thus,

what are very normal reactions to abnormal events may be seen as bizarre behaviors and thoughts indicative of severe mental illness.

**The Hispanic-American Substance Abuser:  
 Problems and Perspectives**

Drug abuse and addiction are major problems in segments of the Hispanic population of the United States. Our knowledge of the relationship between addiction and its sociocultural context for Hispanic-Americans is limited, but treatment often fails to address it. Pedro Ruiz, M.D., discusses current trends in addiction among Hispanic-Americans, explores its sociocultural characteristics relevant to their addiction patterns, and evaluates the effectiveness of available treatments. He suggests ways this knowledge can be incorporated in planning programs and services for Hispanic-American substance abusers.

Dr. Ruiz is Professor of Psychiatry at Baylor College of Medicine and Chief of the Psychiatry Service at Ben Taub General Hospital in Houston. He was previously

Assistant Dean of Albert Einstein College of Medicine in the Bronx, New York, and Director of the Bronx Psychiatric Center.

Dr. Ruiz has been a member of several American Psychiatric Association committees and task forces. He chaired the APA Council on National Affairs and the Selection Advisory Committee of the APA/NIMH Minority Fellowship Program. He is a member of the APA Institute on Hospital and Community Psychiatry's Program Committee. He also serves on the Group for the Advancement of Psychiatry's Board of Directors.

Formerly a member of the President's Commission on Mental Health, Dr. Ruiz serves on the Council on Graduate Medical Education of the Health Resources and Services Administration of the Department of Health and Human Services. He is the author of more than 100 articles and book chapters and the author or editor of several books. He is a member of the editorial boards of *Medico Interamericano*; the *American Journal of Addictions*; and *PRITE*, a publication of the American College of Psychiatrists.

Dr. Ruiz received his medical education at the University of Havana School of Medicine and the University of Paris Medical School. He completed his postgraduate psychiatric training at the University of Miami Medical School and affiliated hospitals.

#### The Rise and Decline of the American Cocaine Epidemic: A Psychiatrist and Policymaker's Perspective

Herbert D. Kleber, M.D., is Deputy Director for Demand Reduction at the Office of National Drug Control Policy. His office is responsible for the efforts within the National Drug Control Strategy to reduce the demand for illegal drugs. Dr. Kleber will address recent signs of abatement in the cocaine epidemic that has plagued America for the past 15 years. He will examine why the epidemic began, why it appears to be declining, what remains to be done, and how government and private efforts have aided or impeded solutions to the problem.

A pioneer in the research and treatment of narcotic and cocaine abuse, Dr. Kleber was formerly Professor of Psychiatry at Yale University School of Medicine. While at Yale, he was also Director of a clinical research center, which developed new treatments for opiate and cocaine abuse and of a training center for research careers in substance abuse. He was Chief Executive Officer of APT Foundation, the major treatment site for drug abusers in the New Haven area, and Director of the Substance Abuse Treatment Unit at Connecticut Mental Health Center. Dr. Kleber has played a major role in policy development for substance abuse at local and state levels in Connecticut, and nationally, as a member of advisory councils to the National Institute on Drug Abuse and the National Institute of Mental Health.

Dr. Kleber's scientific achievements and public service have been recognized with numerous awards, including the Foundations' Fund Prize for Research in Psychiatry, presented by the APA, for his role in the development of clonidine as a treatment for opiate withdrawal. In 1968 he founded the Substance Abuse Treatment Unit of the Connecticut Mental Health Center, which received the American Psychiatric Association's Gold Achievement Award in 1975. Dr. Kleber is Associate Editor of the *American Journal of Drug and Alcohol Abuse* and a member of the editorial boards of *Addictive Behaviors* and the *British Journal of Addiction*.

A graduate of Jefferson Medical College in Philadelphia, Dr. Kleber completed his psychiatric residency at Yale University School of Medicine.

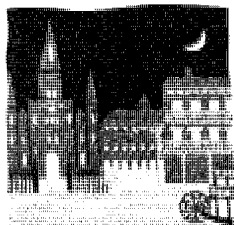
Tahseen Basheer is former Ambassador to Canada from Egypt. His career as a diplomat has spanned more than 30 years, during which he has been Acting Director of the League of Arab States in London, Official Spokesman for Egypt under Presidents Nasser and Sadat, and Official Spokesman for the Egyptian delegation to the Geneva Middle East Peace Conference in 1973. In addi-

tion, he has been an Egyptian delegate to the Arab Summit Conferences in 1973 and 1974, a delegate to the United Nations General Assembly Special Session on Palestine in 1980, and a participant in the First Arab Strategic Conference in 1987. He is currently Lecturer on Foreign and Middle East Affairs at the Egyptian Diplomatic Institute.

Ambassador Basheer will discuss the internal dynamics of the Persian Gulf region as they have emerged in relations between the various peoples of the area, including Arabs, Iranians, tribes, and clans, and in relations between the rich and the poor, and the powerful and the weak. He will also address the effect on the region of external factors originating in the international community and will explore the social psychology of the Arab world within the political context. He will point out some psychological dimensions of Saddam Hussein, analyze the effects of the war, and suggest what may come next in the region. At hand is the task of building the future with the participation of the people, not just the regimes, and of working toward stability through constructive human development.

A graduate of Alexandria University in Egypt, Ambassador Basheer also studied at Princeton and Harvard Universities in the United States. He is a recipient of the Egyptian Order of Merit, First Degree, and has been decorated by the governments of France, Austria, Saudi Arabia and Mexico.

This stunning documentary is long overdue, especially considering the fact that there are 27,000 women in prisons, 80% of whom are mothers who have 40,000 children directly affected by incarceration. The video initially emphasizes that when men go to prison their women take care of the children, but when women are incarcerated there is no one to take care of the children, and they are shunted from agency to agency, from foster care to foster care, and often in the end put up for adoption. Without outside intervention, mothers in prison have little or no control over their children's lives. In their own words, children voice their feelings.

In this segment of the video, survivors of trauma recount their experiences and their journeys toward recovery. The survivors include the parents of a murdered daughter, a college student whose roommates were killed on Pan Am flight 103, a combat veteran of the Vietnam War, survivors of genocide, survivors of a brutal assault, and a clinician who was shot by a patient. 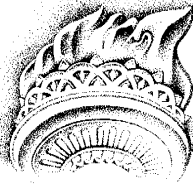

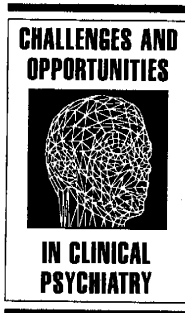

### Genetic and Epigenetic Control of Cortical Specialization

Comprehensive analysis of neurogenesis and synaptogenesis in the diverse areas of the primate brain provides insight into the epigenetic regulation of the cytoarchitectonic parcellation, the pathogenesis of certain cortical disorders in humans and cerebral evolution. Immunocytochemistry and in vitro binding autoradiography are used in the developing and experimentally altered neocortex to map the distribution of neurotransmitters and their receptors and to study formation of cortical "chemoarchitecture." Electron microscopic studies of neuronal migration have led to the radial unit hypothesis and the concept of surface-mediated glial guidance to explain how some classes of neurons move and acquire their final positions in the brain.

Pasko Rakic, M.D., is Professor of Neuroscience at Yale University School of Medicine and Chairman of the Section of Neurobiology at Yale University. A member of the National Academy of Sciences, Dr. Rakic is the recipient of several awards, including the Pattison Award in Neuroscience, the Karl Spencer Lashley Award of the American Philosophical Society, and the Francois I Medal of the College de France. He is a member of the Kuratorium of the Max-Planck Institute in Germany and Chairman of the United States National Committee for the International Brain Research Organization. He is a member of the Scientific Advisory Board of the British Neurological Research Trust and a trustee of the Neuroscience Institute at Rockefeller University. Dr. Rakic is co-editor of *Cerebral Cortex* and a member of the editorial boards of several journals, including

*Brain Research, the Journal of Cognitive Science, and Neuroscience.* He was educated at the Belgrade University Medical School in Yugoslavia.

Dr. Rakic has written over 150 papers on developmental neurobiology, including six articles which have been selected by the Institute of Scientific Information as "Citation Classics."

**Psychooncology: Cancer's Newest Subspecialty**

Interest in psychiatric, psychosocial and behavioral issues in cancer has produced the subspecialty of psychooncology, which addresses the two major psychological dimensions of cancer: the psychological responses of patients, family members and caregivers at all stages of the disease, and the biopsychosocial factors that may influence tumor initiation and progression. The subspecialty also provides standards and leadership in education, training and research, and represents a potential new model for consultation-liaison psychiatry. Jimmie C. Holland, M.D., discusses research findings from the 1980s that offer exciting leads for new directions in treatment.

Dr. Holland has been Chief of the Psychiatry Service at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center and Professor of Psychiatry at Cornell University Medical College in New York City since 1977. In 1989 she was appointed to the Wayne E. Chapman Chair in Psychiatric Oncology in the Memorial Sloan-Kettering Department of Neurology. She formerly was Associate Professor of Psychiatry at Albert Einstein College of Medicine and Assistant Director of Consultation/Liaison Psychiatry at Montefiore Hospital in the Bronx, New York. Between 1972 and 1973 she was a Consultant in the Soviet Union for the National Institute of Mental Health Joint Schizophrenia Research Study.

The current President of the American Society of Psychiatric Oncology/AIDS, Dr. Holland is a founding fellow of the Academy of Behavioral Medicine Research

and a founder of the International Psychooncology Society. She is a member of the Committee on Rehabilitation of the American Cancer Society and a member of the New York State Commission on AIDS in Prisons. From 1988 to 1989 she was Chairman of the Task Force on Psychosocial Oncology at the European School of Oncology in Venice, Italy. She received a Special Citation for Outstanding Contribution from the Society for Liaison Psychiatry in 1989. A member of the editorial boards of *Cancer Nursing Journal* and *Cancer*, she is the author of more than 150 articles, chapters and monographs, and the editor of two books.

A graduate of Baylor University School of Medicine, Dr. Holland completed residencies at Malcolm Bliss Health Center of Washington University School of Medicine in St. Louis, Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston and Edward J. Meyer Memorial Hospital in Buffalo, New York. She is a former Teaching Fellow at Harvard University.

**Psychiatry in the 1990s:  
Leadership for Medicine and Biomedical Science**

The rapid evolution of psychiatry's scientific base and the profession's extensive experience in grappling with social, political and scientific controversy have poised the field to assume a leadership role in medicine in the 1990s. The psychopharmacology revolution, pioneered largely by psychoanalytically trained researchers who developed disease models that respect individual differences, represented the first systematic attempt to create methodologies for obtaining and validating data on psychiatric phenomena. The resulting diagnostic systems permitted epidemiological research that established the high prevalence of mental illness in our society. Psychiatry's rigorous scientific standards have provided a model for research in many other specialties and have placed psychiatry at the leading edge of emergent fields such as behavioral medicine. Psychiatry's science base has equipped the field to respond to an array of challenges, including: attacks on animal



research; attempts to cynically exploit the stigmatization of mental and addictive disorders; reimbursement biases that have devalued time-intensive patient care; and reluctance to acknowledge the pervasive impact of behavior on health and illness. To realize its leadership potential, the field must adhere to its fundamental principles of scientific expertise for all psychiatrists, interactive patient-oriented skills and team-level leadership.

Frederick K. Goodwin, M.D., is the Administrator of the Alcohol, Drug Abuse and Mental Health Administration. He directs federal efforts toward scientific solutions to the public health problems associated with mental illness, alcoholism and drug abuse. Internationally recognized as an authority in research and treatment of major depression and Bipolar Disorder, Dr. Goodwin is one of only five psychiatrists on *Current Contents'* list of the most frequently cited scientists in the world. He is the author of more than 375 publications, including a comprehensive textbook on manic-depression, which he recently completed in collaboration with Kay R. Jamison, Ph.D. He is on the editorial boards of *Archives of General Psychiatry* and *Advances in Neuropsychiatry and Psychopharmacology*, and is Associate Editor of the *Journal of Neuropsychiatry and Clinical Neurosciences*. He is also founder and Co-Editor-in-Chief of *Psychiatry Research*.

Dr. Goodwin has received many psychiatric honors, including the Hofheimer Prize from the American Psychiatric Association, the A. E. Bennett Award from the Society of Biological Psychiatry, and the International Anna-Monika Prize for Research in Depression. In 1986, he received the Presidential Distinguished Executive Award, the highest honor available to a member of the career federal service. Last year, he received the Service to Science Award from the National Association for Biomedical Research and the Public Service Award from the Federation of American Societies for Experimental Biology. He is the first recipient of the Fawcett Humanitarian Award from the National Depressive and Manic-Depressive Association.

Dr. Goodwin received his medical degree from St. Louis University and completed his psychiatric residency at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill.

## Why is America Failing Our Children?

Children endure more deprivation than any other segment of society. More than one of five children in the United States live in households with incomes below the poverty level. U.S. infant mortality is worse than that of some Third World countries. About one million teen-agers become pregnant each year, and as many as 18 percent of newborns have been exposed to alcohol, cocaine and other hard drugs. Needy children have the greatest health problems and the least access to care. T. Berry Brazelton, M.D., will describe a variety of approaches that are currently under consideration as solutions to these urgent problems. He will discuss the findings of the National Commission on Children, a group appointed by the President and Congress in 1989 to assess the status of American children.

Dr. Brazelton is Clinical Professor of Pediatrics at Harvard Medical School and Founder and Chief of the Child Development Unit at the Children's Hospital in Boston. He is also Professor of Psychiatry and Human Development at Brown University in Providence, Rhode Island. One of Dr. Brazelton's foremost achievements in pediatrics was the creation of the Brazelton Neonatal Behavioral Assessment Scale. Commonly known as "the Brazelton," this procedure is used worldwide to test not only the physical and neurological responses of newborns, but also the psychological well-being and individual differences of babies at birth.

The author of more than 180 articles on child development, Dr. Brazelton has published 20 books, including *Infants and Mothers*, which has been translated into 18 languages, and *Working and Caring*, which offers advice for working parents on raising children. His latest book, *Family, Crisis and Caring*, was published in 1989. Dr. Brazelton is a regular contributor to *Family Circle Magazine*, and he writes a weekly column syndicated by the *New York Times*. He was appointed to the National Commission on Children in 1989. A former President of the Society for Research in Child Development and of the National Center for Clinical Infant Programs, Dr. Brazelton has testified frequently before Congressional committees on behalf of bills addressing day care and parental and medical leave. In 1972, he instituted the Child Development Unit, a training and research center at Children's Hospital in Boston. More than 60 researchers trained at this unit now conduct their own research and training programs in pediatric departments throughout the United States. Dr. Brazelton received the Woodrow Wilson Award for public service from Princeton University in 1989.

A graduate of Columbia University School of Physicians and Surgeons in New York City, Dr. Brazelton completed residency training in pediatrics at the Children's Hospital in Boston and in child psychiatry at Massachusetts General Hospital and the James Jackson Putnam Children's Center.

**The Thyroid Axis in Depression:  
Pathophysiological and Clinical Implications**

The thyroid axis has long been believed to be involved in the pathophysiology of affective illness. Charles B. Nemeroff, M.D., reviews findings that suggest some depressed patients have subclinical hypothyroidism associated with "asymptomatic" autoimmune thyroiditis; whereas other depressed patients exhibit TRH hypersecretion which results in TRH receptor down-regulation and a blunted TSH response to TRH.

Dr. Nemeroff is Chief of the Division of Biological Psychiatry, Professor of Psychiatry and Pharmacology, and a member of the faculty of the Toxicology Training Program at Duke University Medical Center. His research on the biological basis of major neuropsychiatric disorders, including affective and anxiety disorders, Alzheimer's Disease, and schizophrenia, has been recognized with several awards, among them the Kempf Fund Award for Research Development in Psychobiological Psychiatry from the American Psychiatric Association.

The author of more than 300 research reports and reviews, Dr. Nemeroff is President-Elect of the International Society of Psychoneuroendocrinology. He is a member of the scientific advisory boards of the National Center for Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder and the National Alliance for the Mentally Ill.

Dr. Nemeroff is Associate Editor of *Psychopharmacology Bulletin* and a member of the editorial boards of *Synapse, Hormones and Behavior* and the *Journal of Neuropsychiatry and Clinical Neurosciences*. He received his medical degree and doctoral degree in neurobiology from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, and trained in psychiatry at North Carolina Memorial Hospital and Duke University Medical Center.

**Paradoxal Effects of Adrenal Steroids on the  
Brain: Plasticity Versus Degeneration**

Hormones of the adrenals, thyroid and gonads mediate the effects of the psychological and physical environment on the brain during early development and in adult life. They do so by modulating the expression of genes, as well as having direct effects on processes at the cell membrane. The adrenal glucocorticoids are among the most interesting and puzzling of these hormones because they are essential for survival, especially during stress, and yet they produce damaging effects on the brain and other organs when they are secreted over long time periods. Bruce S. McEwen, Ph.D., will discuss the actions of adrenal hormones on the brain and their role in the body's natural defense system against depressive illness.

Dr. McEwen is Professor and Head of the Laboratory of Neuroendocrinology and Associate Dean for Graduate and Postgraduate Studies at Rockefeller University. His research on the hormonal processes underlying the function of nerve cells has clarified the biology of growth, differentiation and aging. It has also clarified the abnormalities of brain function and behavior, including depressive illness, Alzheimer's Disease and Parkinson's Disease. Dr. McEwen has written or collaborated on more than 400 scientific papers, reviews and book chapters. He is Associate Editor of the *Journal of Neuroscience* and a member of the editorial boards of *Brain Research* and the *Journal of Neuroendocrinology*. He is a member and former chair of the NIMH Intramural Research Program's Board of Scientific Counselors.

Dr. McEwen graduated from Oberlin College and received his doctorate in cell biology from Rockefeller University.

**Alcohol Related Problems Across the Border**

Juan Ramon de la Fuente, M.D., of the National University of Mexico, will discuss data from a multicenter study of problem drinking in Mexico and will describe preventive and therapeutic strategies based on the findings. Recent studies of trends in alcohol-related problems in Mexico have shown that problem drinkers are likely to be men between 30 and 49 years old, although a subgroup of young people under age 18 also shows worrisome drinking patterns. The rate of death from alcoholic cirrhosis in Mexico is higher than in the United States, and yet, the rate of alcohol dependence in Mexico may be lower than in the United States. Subjects in the United States tend to drink more frequently but less on each occasion, compared with Mexican subjects, who tend to drink less frequently but may consume larger quantities of alcohol on each occasion and may have more legal and social problems as a result.

Dr. de la Fuente is Vice Chancellor for Science and Professor of Psychiatry and Mental Health on the Faculty of Medicine at the National University of Mexico. He is a member of the Board of Governors of the National Institute of Nutrition in Mexico City, the Drug Evaluation and Therapeutics Committee of the National Academy of Medicine in Mexico City, the International Advisory Board of the DSM-IV Task Force, and the Ethics Committee of the World Psychiatric Association. The author of more than 100 papers in international journals and books, Dr. de la Fuente has been the principal investigator in Mexico for collaborative multinational studies sponsored by the World Health Organization to investigate the biology and treatment of alcohol dependence. His contributions to the understanding of affective and alcohol-related disorders have been recognized with several awards, including the Laughlin Award of the National Psychiatric Endowment Fund and the Natural Sciences Prize of the Mexican Academy for Scientific Research.

He is a member of the editorial boards of *Revista Salud Mental* and *Revista de la Facultad de Medicina* of the National University of Mexico and Associate Editor of *Acta Psiquiatrica y Psicologia de America Latina*. Former Chairman of the Commission on Education and Research within the Secretariat of Health and Assistance in Mexico City, Dr. de la Fuente formerly headed the Division of Clinical Research at the Mexican Institute of Psychiatry and directed the Health Research Program at the National University of Mexico.

Dr. de la Fuente received his medical degree from the National University of Mexico and completed his psychiatric residency at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Min-

nesota. He completed graduate study in psychiatry at the University of Minnesota.

Psychology and psychiatry depend to a large extent on subjective self-reports. However, methods for providing reliable and useful accounts of inner experience are few. Mihaly Csikszentmihalyi, Ph.D., describes one such technique, the Experience Sampling Method, which uses repeated responses to pager signals to describe accurately the content of consciousness in everyday life. Applications of this method range from a description of the inner life of normal and of talented adolescents to clinical studies of eating disorders, drug and alcohol dependencies, MPD, depression and chronic schizophrenia.

Dr. Csikszentmihalyi is Professor of Human Development and Education in the Department of Psychology at the University of Chicago. A former Senior Fulbright Fellow in Brazil and New Zealand, he is the author of more than 120 scholarly articles and book chapters and eight books, including *Beyond Boredom and Anxiety*. His latest book, *Flow: The Psychology of Optimal Experience*, is being translated into six languages. He has been a member of the Child Labor Advisory Committee of the U.S. Department of Labor and of the Center for Giftedness of the U.S. Department of Education. Dr. Csikszentmihalyi received his doctorate from the University of Chicago in 1965.

This poetic, insider's view of Umbanda, Brazil's fastest growing religion, shows the cult's raucous pageantry and public festivals, as well as its more esoteric, exotic and rarely-seen ceremonies. A blending of Catholicism with traditional African and American-Indian spiritualism, Umbanda (sometimes called Macumba) is characterized by ritualistic sacrifices and offerings and altered states of consciousness described by devotees as possession by supernatural beings. Shot on location in Rio de Janeiro, Sao Paul, Brasilia, and Fortaleza, *Hail Umbanda* includes commentary by numerous authorities and practitioners. The tape focuses on one renowned Umbanda priest, or *Pai de Santo* (Father of the Gods), who introduces and explains many different aspects of Umbanda. The *Pai de Santo* is a petite, androgynous-looking man who has been a medium for more than forty years. In the community in which his Umbanda Center is located his role combines the functions of priest, doctor, counselor and psychotherapist. The tape shows possession trances of the *Pai de Santo*, his close devotees and members of the community. The *Pai de Santo* recalls that, in his youth, he and other Umbanda worshipers were shunned or punished for their beliefs. At that time Umbanda was a religion of the poor and a form of cultural resistance against the dominant European classes of Brazil. Today, though, Umbanda followers number in the millions and come from every strata of Brazilian society.

Set in 1963, *Peppermint Soda* describes one year in the lives of Anne and Frederique, 13- and 15-year-old Jewish/Parisian sisters, who live with their chronically distracted divorced mother and summer with their rather dull father. They attend a traditionally strict all-girl high school; its educational aim seems to be stifling the students' native high spirits. Anne and her friends fight back with small, but important rebellions, discuss sex in the school yard, and sneak off to a local cafe to sip nonalcoholic "diabolo menthe" (peppermint soda). Frederique develops a crush on an older man, acts for the school's drama club, joins a group that discusses radical politics and endures her first experience of anti-Semitism. Deceptively little seems to happen in *Peppermint Soda*, yet it offers one of the most engaging, witty and psychologically true depictions of feminine adolescence ever filmed, inviting inevitable comparison with Truffaut's *400 Blows*. Amidst an outstanding cast, especially fine performances are given by Eleanore Klarwein and Odile Michel as Anne and Frederique. The finely nuanced autobiographical script was written by the director, Diane Kurys, who would later go on to *Entre Nous*. *Peppermint Soda* was a prize-winning smash hit in France, but despite excellent reviews, never commanded the attention it deserved in America. Highly recommended for all ages.

Adriana is so beautiful that nurses call her the Gerber baby. But she spent the first weeks of her life writhing and shrieking in agony from the indescribable pain of heroin withdrawal. Adriana may never have a normal life. Another baby, in an intensive care ward at a cost of some \$3,000 a day, will suffer permanent disabilities from the congenital venereal disease with which she was born. "A \$3.00 shot of penicillin to her mother would have prevented this," says her doctor. But her mother, like millions of others in this country, received inadequate prenatal care or, more likely, none at all. The number of babies born premature, with very low birthweight, and with many other serious and life-threatening health problems is overwhelming the resources of American hospitals. This compassionate and revealing documentary, filmed in San Diego, takes an in-depth look at the causes of this growing crisis and examines its social and economic effects on society as a whole. *Victims at Birth* explores three important trends that contribute to America's appalling infant mortality rate and the tremendous increase in babies born needing immediate intensive care: the denial of prenatal care to poor expectant mothers; the growing rate of drug and alcohol abuse among pregnant women; and the surge in the numbers of teen-agers, some barely in their teens, who give birth.

Described by some as a loosely-based religion and by others as a cult, the movement includes many who claim to "channel" spirits and have supernatural healing powers. *The New Believers* takes a darkly comic look inside the world of the New Age movement by focusing on the lives of a handful of "healers" and "channelers," including Master Ho, a self-styled crystal sex therapist who claims to be an alien; Margaret, a psychic healer who professes to channel Jesus Christ; Neville, who purports to channel a school of dolphins and feels that Adolf Hitler was a great spiritual master; and Shawn, a New Age entrepreneur who markets crystals through a mail order company she operates from her living room. In profiling these people, *The New Believers* explores the psychological underpinnings of their beliefs while capturing the controversial practices of the movement. **Violence and the American Scene: 1990 to 2000**

Violence has become officially recognized as a public health problem. National objectives to reduce the incidence of fatal and nonfatal injuries due to interpersonal violence and suicide have been established since 1980, but despite impressive gains in other areas of public health, these objectives have still not been achieved. Indeed, the incidence of violence has increased in many urban areas of the United States during the past five years. New objectives have been set for the present decade, and a more vigorous campaign is envisioned. Felton J. Earls, M.D., appraises the current campaign's likelihood of success. Strategies for controlling violence require coordination of efforts at the levels of public policy, science policy and basic research. Links must be established among health, mental health, human welfare and criminal justice systems, and training for individuals who work in these systems must promote effective use of these linkages. Interdisciplinary research must encompass human biology, developmental psychology, psychiatry and sociology.

Dr. Earls is Professor of Child Psychiatry at Harvard Medical School, Professor of Human Behavior and Development at Harvard School of Public Health, and Director of the Developmental Epidemiology Unit at Judge Baker Children's Center in Boston. He directs the Program on Human Development and Criminal Behavior, an interdisciplinary research project studying biological, behavioral and social factors associated with the development of conduct disorder, serious delinquency and persistent criminality. The program is sponsored by the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation and the National Institute of Justice. He is a member of the NIMH National Advisory Council and of the Panel on the Understanding and Control of Violence at the National Academy of Sciences. He formerly chaired the Advisory Panel on Adolescent Health at the Office of Technology Assessment of the United States Congress and the Panel on Violence Prevention at the Centers for Disease Control.



Dr. Earls is the author of more than 80 articles and book chapters and the author or editor of four books. He is a member of the editorial boards of the *Journal of Child Psychology and Psychiatry*, the *Journal of Research on Adolescence*, and *Crime and Justice: A Review of Research*. He received his medical degree from Howard University and trained in adult psychiatry at Massachusetts General Hospital and in child psychiatry at Children's Hospital in Boston.

#### The Effects of Political Realities on Psychiatry in the USSR

Soviet psychiatrist Semyon F. Gluzman is internationally renowned for his opposition to the political use of psychiatry. He suggests that Western media tend to see the destruction of totalitarian regimes as a result of the dynamics of political forces, groups and personalities. However, other factors, such as the laws of totalitarianism as a system, also determine the existence and destruction of a regime. The present and the future of psychiatry, as an institution that is part of this system, depend on both the virtues of individual activists and the activities of those who are working against reform.

After graduating as a medical doctor in 1969, Dr. Gluzman worked in regional psychiatric hospitals in the Ukraine. When he was later offered a post at the Dnepropetrovsk Special Psychiatric Hospital, he declined, knowing that sane people were interned there solely because of their dissenting views. As a result of his refusal, Dr. Gluzman encountered considerable difficulty obtaining a job, but eventually found work in an emergency clinic in Kiev. He later refused to cooperate when summoned to testify in the case of an Ukrainian dissenter, which culminated in his arrest on May 12, 1972. He was eventually sentenced to seven years in a labor camp, followed by three years of exile in a remote area of the Soviet Union. While in prison, Dr. Gluzman, with human rights activist Vladimir Bukovsky, wrote a manual instructing dissenters who may be subject to psychiatric examination how to avoid

being diagnosed as mentally ill. In May 1982, Dr. Gluzman was released and returned to his home in Kiev.

Dr. Gluzman was one of the three anonymous authors of *An In Absentia Forensic 20-Page Psychiatric Report on P.G. Grigorenko*, which was originally circulated in 1971. The document analyzed the two official and conflicting psychiatric case reports on General Grigorenko, a leading figure in the Soviet human rights movement, and denounced the use of psychiatry as a tool of repression.

#### Mental Illness, Stigma and the Failure to Achieve Parity: What Psychiatry Should Do

Lewis L. Judd, M.D., is Professor and Chairman of the Department of Psychiatry at the University of California, San Diego School of Medicine. From 1988 to 1990 he was Director of the National Institute of Mental Health. His lecture focuses on the profound effects of the stigma experienced by persons with mental illness in contemporary America. The effects of stigma are evident in the fundamental and increasing disparity between the nation's responses to citizens with mental and physical illnesses. Only one in 20 health insurance policies provides the same coverage for outpatient treatment of mental disorders as for physical disorders; only one of five persons with a mental disorder even receives treatment. At a time when psychiatry has much to offer the mentally ill, psychiatrists are being prevented from providing optimal and even adequate care. Dr. Judd presents a systematic plan of action for organized psychiatry, with a specific role for the individual psychiatrist. National health insurance, a major goal of the current Congress, provides the opportunity to correct past inequities by creating full parity for patients with mental disorders and for the psychiatrists who treat them.

As a clinical research scientist, Dr. Judd has made significant contributions to many areas of psychopharmacology. His scientific and public service work has been recognized with numerous awards, including the Distinguished Service Award from the National Alliance

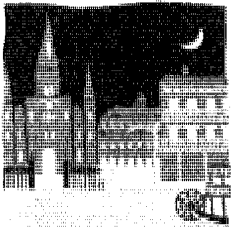
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for the Mentally Ill, the Award of Distinction from the Linda Pollin Foundation, and the Award of Distinction for National Leadership in Child and Adolescent Mental Disorders from the National Mental Health Organization.

Dr. Judd is a member of the Scientific Council of the National Alliance for Research in Schizophrenia and Depression and of the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences. He is the editor of *The Psychobiological Foundations of Clinical Psychiatry* and serves on the editorial boards of the *American Journal of Psychiatry*, *Psychiatry* and the *Journal of Neuropsychiatry and Clinical Neurosciences*.

A graduate of the University of California, Los Angeles School of Medicine, Dr. Judd completed residencies and a fellowship in psychiatry and in child and adolescent psychiatry at the UCLA Center for the Health Sciences in Los Angeles.

*Family Mesh* tells the story of Caca's liberation, a nineteen-year-old who is strongly attached to his mother and, after attempting suicide, leads his parents to take up family therapy. The father, Colonel Medeiros, a military man now in the reserve, is a business man going through a crisis. The mother, Helena, after 20 years dedicated to the children, has recently graduated from college and is trying to start a career as a psychologist. The relationship between the couple has been stale for quite a while, and Caca himself is, in fact, the only remaining link. The Colonel transfers all the authoritarianism from his military training to his family, and he has always counted on his wife for confirmation and protection. Caca, in the middle of an identity crisis (emotional, sexual and professional), cannot face his father and inflicts harm on himself, resorting to the use of drugs. The video shows how the family is interpenetrated by social and political happenings besides its own psychological drama. Thus the therapist articulates these several influences and exposes his opinions clearly, not restricting himself only to the psychological world, since this does not exist by itself. The treatment is synthesized into 65 minutes of action, held in the therapist's consulting room, where Caca's oldest sister and maternal grandmother help to shape a new system of forces that enables Caca, his mother and his father to develop fully as individuals. The father finally realizes the need to decentralize the power by dividing rights and wrongs among all the family members.

Debbie, a beautiful four-year-old, has cut herself off from the world around her. She will not allow eye contact with other people and has fierce temper tantrums. He is in an autistic unit at a nearby school where he shares play time and music classes with "normal" children. This experience has allowed him to develop social skills. through the diligent efforts of those around them, but special programs are scarce and many autistic children are being denied these opportunities.

**V39 A Case of Need: Media Coverage and Organ Transplants**

Of the 21,000 Americans each year who are in need of vital organ transplants, at least 30% will die either because they do not have the insurance or funds to pay for the insurance, or funds to pay for the operation, or because a suitable organ isn't available in time. Donated organs are scarce and the cost of a transplant operation, usually upwards of \$150,000, is beyond the means of most families. But for those lucky enough or savvy enough to become the focus of news media attention, funds can pour in from around the country. In some cases, donated organs may even be specifically designated for a patient whom a family member saw in a newspaper or television story. *A Case of Need* documents the coverage of six-year-old Norma Lynn Peterson, whose case was taken up by the media in Maine and who, within a few months, was the recipient of over \$100,000 and a new liver. In contrast, another patient in the same area did not come to the media's attention and, therefore, did not receive the organ she needed in time to save her life. The program raises disturbing ethical questions about media responsibility in these cases, and about whether society should allow access to any vital resource to be influenced by publicity. This is a hard-hitting documentary for journalists, ethicists, medical professionals and all of us concerned about how our nation allocates risks and benefits.

**V40 Discontinuation of Dialysis: Raising the Questions**

Approximately 10% of the deaths in the Baystate Medical Center dialysis program are preceded by a decision to discontinue dialysis. In *Discontinuation of Dialysis*, excerpts are presented from psychiatric consultations with two middle-aged women who developed diabetic end-stage renal disease and who were maintained by hemodialysis. Neither patient felt that she had a depression, but both experienced great distress at the prospect of becoming an increasing burden on their families. Perhaps most importantly, neither believed that discontinuing dialysis was an option that her physician or family would sanction. As a result, both of these patients took matters into their own hands; one refused to leave home for dialysis treatments, while the other attempted suicide. The interviews graphically demonstrate how two strong and proud individuals reached the end of their struggle with a progressively deteriorating disease. The purpose of this videotape is to ask questions relating to the individual's right-to-die, diagnosis of depression in the medical setting, and patient autonomy versus the rights of families. The videotape does not answer these questions, but is a stimulus for discussion. Consultation psychiatrists and nephrologists need to arrive at their own conclusions in preparation for working with patients who wish to terminate dialysis.

There is a five-fold increase in the risk of becoming psychiatrically ill in the year following a child's birth. Childbirth related psychiatric illnesses can be difficult to diagnose and treat. *Childbirth Related Psychiatric Disorders* demonstrates a variety of postpartum psychiatric disorders which include obsessional disorder, pseudocyesis, postpartum depression, postpartum psychosis, and infanticide. Following the tape there will be a discussion of the issues related to the onset, course and management of these specific groups of disorders unique to childbirth.

A profound awareness of the articulation between the Holocaust experience and preexisting personality/conflict, hallmarks the sensibility of *Enemies: A Love Story*, the wonderfully satisfying film Paul Mazursky directed from Isaac Bashevis Singer's novel. Set in 1949, its unheroic protagonist, Herman Broder, is a womanizing Polish intellectual who was away on business when a Nazi death squad invaded his town and executed his family. Broder was hidden in a barn during the occupation by Yadwiga, a Catholic family servant. After the war, he wed her and emigrated to America. He works as an underpaid ghostwriter, lives in Brooklyn, and travels to the Bronx for steamy trysts with Masha, a camp survivor whose withering nihilism about everything, save sex, matches her alarming beauty. Yadwiga wants a baby; Masha wants more commitment. Then, the ultimate complication: Tamara, his wife is suddenly resurrected! Two bullets in her hip, she managed to climb out of an SS mass grave and journey to Russia, thence to Manhattan's lower East Side. After Paul Mazursky's unprofound accounts of American midlife angst (*An Unmarried Woman* and *Down and Out in Beverly Hills*), *Enemies* comes as a revelation. Each sequence of the film is a jewel. Singer's characters are considerably deepened, and the 1940s New York milieu is captured with mellow accuracy. Casting of major and minor parts is impeccable (Anjelica Huston an elegant, witty Tamara; Lena Olin as an impatiently lustful Masha; Ron Silver, a weak, shady, yet sympathetic Broder). Underneath Broder's frenzied, often hilarious attempts to extricate himself from his tangled web of deceit, *Enemies* has

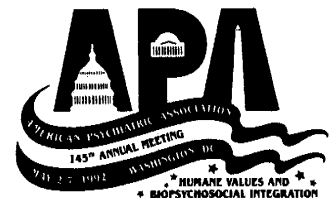

**Our Children: Miles to Go, Promises to Keep:  
The Future is Now**

Evelyn K. Moore, M.A., is the Executive Director and a founding member of the National Black Child Development Institute, a network of affiliate chapters in 40 localities in the United States dedicated to improving the quality of life for African-American children. One half of African-American children live in poverty, and millions face devastating circumstances each day of their lives, encountering barriers to their development in the areas of health, welfare and education. Crime and the violence that has accompanied the recent drug epidemic are realities that threaten their very lives. Ms. Moore addresses the possibility of building a safe, secure and enriching environment in which children can grow,

learn and maximize their individual skills and abilities. Her emphasis is that concern for the welfare of children should be the cornerstone of social policy, and the time to decide the future of America's children is now.

Founded in 1970, the National Black Child Development Institute has recruited and trained thousands of volunteers to ensure that parents and concerned citizens in African-American communities play leading roles in the development of policies affecting African-American children. Under Ms. Moore's leadership, the Institute started a nationwide tutoring program, assisted in establishing curricula and securing federal funding for child development programs in 45 African-American colleges, and initiated programs conducted in the work place aimed at improving parenting skills. In addition, the Institute initiated and monitored a three-year study of the nation's foster care system. The study's findings and recommendations, contained in a report entitled, *Who Will Care When Parents Can't*, have influenced the development of legislation regarding practices in the nation's child welfare system.

Ms. Moore serves on many policy making panels, and is an advisor to several federal and private agencies. She has served on the board of the Head Start 25th Anniversary Blue Ribbon Panel, the American Bar Association's National Legal Resource Center for Child Advocacy and Protection, and the Institute for Responsive Education. Her leadership abilities and community service efforts have merited national attention. Among other honors, she has received the 100 Black Business and Professional Women in the U.S. Award, the Sarah S. Scott Services to Youth Award from LINKS Incorporated, and the first Ossie Award from the National Black Leadership Roundtable.

Ms. Moore was educated at Eastern Michigan University and holds a master's degree in education from the University of Michigan.

**A Weekend with 2,000 Chief Residents:  
Implications for Training**

For the past 18 years, Jack F. Wilder, M.D., has directed a three-day training program in leadership for incoming psychiatric chief residents. Over the years, more than 2,000 residents have attended. The program's objectives are to help new chief residents accept the middle-management role and the legitimate use of authority the position entails, to increase confidence among the participants by encouraging them to draw strength from each other, and to help them acquire the knowledge and skills they will need as leaders. Dr. Wilder will discuss challenges of organizing the program, including decisions on balancing didactic and experimental aspects of the curriculum, small versus large group exercises, and enhancing presentation of role models. He will comment upon changes in the characteristics and expectations of program participants over the years, and explore implications of the program for teaching in administrative psychiatry in academic departments.

Dr. Wilder is Professor of Psychiatry and Director of the Mental Health Education Program at the Albert Einstein College of Medicine at Yeshiva University in the Bronx, New York, and Senior Psychiatrist at Bronx Municipal Hospital Center. He is also Clinical Preceptor in the Program in Hospital and Health Care Administration at the University of Minnesota. He has lectured frequently to professional, business and lay groups. Dr. Wilder is best known for his innovations in organizing and managing mental health services, in improving the efficacy of partial hospitalization and rehabilitation programs for patients with chronic illness, and in preventing staff burnout. He is President and co-founder of the Pibly Fund, a nonprofit corporation that operates a full range of community residences for more than 130 psychiatric patients.

Dr. Wilder is a member of the American Psychiatric Association's Special Committee on Psychiatric Education. He has served on the editorial board of the *Journal of Hospital and Community Psychiatry* and is currently a member of the editorial boards of *Who's Who in Health Care*, the *International Journal of Partial Hospitalization*, and the *International Journal of Therapeutic Communities*. He is a member of the Resident Training Committee for the New York State Department of Mental Hygiene and a consultant to the Psychiatry Education Branch of the National Institute of Mental Health.

A graduate of New York University College of Medicine, Dr. Wilder completed his psychiatric residency at the Bronx Municipal Hospital Center.

### **The Evolution of DNA: From Double Helix to the Human Genome Project**

James D. Watson, Ph.D., is best known for his discovery of the structure of DNA, for which he shared with Francis Crick and Maurice Wilkins the 1962 Nobel Prize in Physiology and Medicine. Their research launched a revolution in biology that culminated in the development of modern recombinant-DNA techniques.

Formerly Professor of Biology at Harvard University, Dr. Watson became the full-time Director of the Cold Spring Harbor Laboratory on Long Island, New York in 1976. He steered the Laboratory into the field of tumor virology, from which emerged much of our present understanding of the molecular basis of cancer. In 1989 he was appointed Director of the National Center for Human Genome Research at the National Institutes of Health.

Dr. Watson will discuss the activities of the Human Genome Project in constructing genetic and physical maps of human chromosomes. A new initiative is underway to construct a "framework" linkage map consisting of about 300 evenly spaced, high-quality markers among the human chromosomes. In the next two years, this map will be useful to scientists who are searching for the genes that are responsible for diseases and biological traits. Other projects include mapping of large contiguous expanses of human chromosomes, the development of new technologies to store and analyze genome research data, and mapping of the mouse genome and genomes of other model organisms to facilitate comparative studies of gene structure and function. The Human Genome Project's ethical, legal and social issues program anticipates, through scholarly and critical assessment, the impact of new genome technology on personal freedoms and social and clinical responsibilities.

Dr. Watson is the author of five books, including *Molecular Biology of the Cell* and *The Double Helix*. He has received the Albert Lasker Prize, the John J. Carty Gold Medal of the National Academy of Sciences, and the Presidential Medal of Freedom. He is a member of the National Academy of Sciences and the American

Academy of Arts and Sciences. He received his degrees from the University of Chicago and Indiana University.

A secret isolation unit for female prisoners in the United States? This is the question explored in the documentary, *Through the Wire*. It looks at a controversial high security unit located at the federal prison in Lexington, Kentucky. Isolated underground for two years under 24-hour surveillance, the women suffered physical and psychological deterioration, vividly captured by the on-camera interviews. Investigations by Amnesty International and other human rights groups led to a federal court challenge. Found not to meet "elemental standards of decency," the unit was ordered closed. But when the ruling was overturned on appeal, the unit continued, with plans to build 16 more. Produced by Nina Rosenblum and narrated by Susan Sarandon, the film won several awards, including "Best Film," 1990 Documentary Film Festival of New York. Viewers will explore the question of whether the U.S. government is using knowledge of human behavior to punish political dissension.

Autistic Child to Adult Scientist**

Temple Grandin, Ph.D., Assistant Professor in the Department of Animal Sciences at Colorado State University and an independent livestock handling consultant, was a partially autistic child. She did not learn to speak until age three and a half, and had many behaviors that are typical of autistic individuals, such as temper tantrums, intolerance to being touched by others, fixation on spinning objects and destructive behavior. She will talk about what it was like to be an autistic child, including the frustration of not being able to speak although she could understand what was said to her and the discomfort caused by being oversensitive to sound and touch. She will describe how her thought processes remain entirely visual rather than verbal, and will discuss the benefits she has experienced from low-dose antidepressant therapy.

Dr. Grandin has lectured about autism to medical professionals, therapists and teachers and has appeared on national television to describe the experience of

autism to the general public. She gave Grand Rounds at Harvard Medical School and the University of Minnesota and was the Keynote Speaker at the 1989 Governor's Conference on Mental Health in Indiana. She served on the Governor's Council for Developmental Disabilities in Arizona and is a board member of the Autism Society of America. She was a consultant to Dustin Hoffman during the making of the movie *Rainman* and received the Tramell Crow Award from the Autism Society of America in 1989. Her book, *Emergence: Labeled Autistic*, has been praised for the insights it offers into the innermost feelings and fears of autistic individuals.

An animal scientist, Dr. Grandin has designed livestock handling facilities in 30 states and 11 other countries. She chairs the Livestock Handling Committee of the Livestock Conservation Institute and is an Associate of the American Society of Agricultural Engineers. She is a Contributing Editor to *Meat and Poultry Magazine*.

A graduate of Franklin Pierce College and Arizona State University, she received her doctorate in animal science from the University of Illinois.

There are all too few children's movies that avoid "Disneyesque cliché," speak unpatronizingly to a young person's vision of the world and can be enjoyed by adults. The team of Radnitz and Clark have created a prize-winning series of just such films, including *A Dog of Flanders*, *Misty*, *Island of the Blue Dolphins* and *My Side of the Mountain*.

Its hero is 13-year-old Sam Gribley, a precocious nature lover and admirer of Thoreau, who leaves his comfortable middle-class surroundings to spend a year living in the Canadian wilds, with only his pet raccoon, Gus, for company. While the seasons change, Sam is befriended by a librarian from a nearby town, and a folk singer who marches to his own different drummer. Twelve-year-old Ted Eccles and Theodore Bikel are especially affecting as, respectively, Sam and the wandering singer. The film is noteworthy for the freshness of its camera work, by ace British cinematographer Denys Coop (*The Third Man*, *Richard III*, etc.). *My Side of the Mountain* is classic children's entertainment which has not been screened nearly as often as it deserves. Strongly recommended for all ages.

Shevchenko's film crew was the first in the disaster zone following the meltdown of the Chernobyl nuclear power plant in 1986. For more than two weeks they fought for the right to film. Then they shot continuously for more than three months, documenting both the disaster and the heroic and horrifying attempts to clean-up. Portions of the tape itself show strange white blotches, a result of exposure to radiation. After filming, the crew had to bury their camera because it couldn't be decontaminated. While editing, the director was already fatally ill. Various agencies blocked the film's release; one demanded 152 changes. The film lay on the shelf for months, and filmgoers in the Soviet Union saw it only after the director's death. Motion pictures may exert profound social and psychological effects on developing adolescents, affecting them by means of identification, their affective and visual compo-

nents, group phenomena, and subliminal and escapist effects. Mood, suicidal behavior, violence, aggression toward women, and related phenomena in adolescents can be influenced by motion pictures. In contrast the movie may also have a prosocial effect, assisting the adolescent in obtaining a more varied and wider cultural experience, which in turn may positively affect his or her rate or degree of maturation. In *Movies and Adolescents*, videotape excerpts from theatrical movies will be shown to illustrate these points. Movies featuring youth and adolescent topics, as well as films with particular historical significance in terms of their effects on adolescents, will be presented. Adolescent movie themes presented will include identity formation, depression, suicide, violence (particularly against women), horror, and Satanism. The manner in which movies can induce varying affective states in youth will be exemplified by the film portrayals of James Dean. 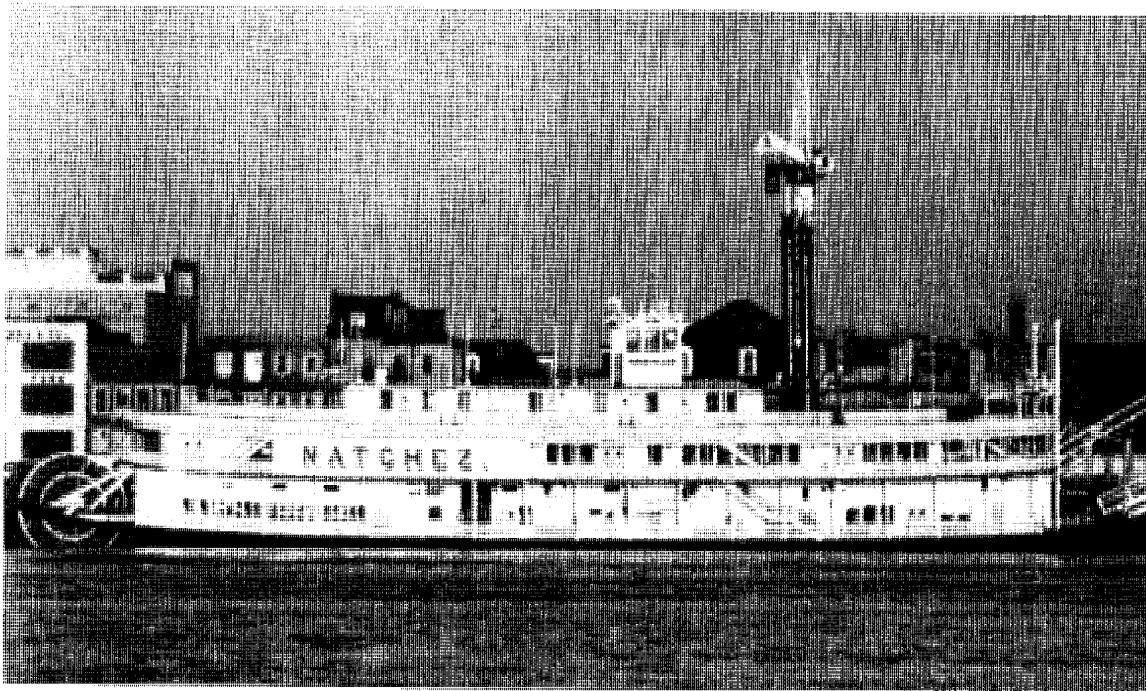
**V54 Still Killing Us Softly**

In 1979 "*Killing Us Softly: Advertising's Image of Women*," a film based on the research and slide presentation of Jean Kilbourne, Ed.D., was produced. "*Still Killing Us Softly*" is a new 30-minute video about advertising's continuing assault on the self-images of women, men and children. Using examples of ads from magazines, newspapers, album covers and billboards, Ms. Kilbourne has created a concise and important analysis of a \$120 billion a year industry that preys on the fears and insecurities of consumers. The ads sell a great deal more than products. They sell values, images and concepts of success and worth, love and sexuality, popularity and normalcy. Advertising's influence is pervasive, often subtle and mostly unconscious. In "*Still Killing Us Softly*," Jean Kilbourne examines images in advertising with the incisive wit and irony that have delighted and enlightened audiences for years. She explores the relationship of media images to actual problems in society, such as the channeling of men and women into traditional roles and occupations, economic discrimination against women, the sexual abuse of children, rape and other forms of violence, pornography, sexual harassment, teen-age pregnancy and eating disorders. "*Still Killing Us Softly*" is as important for men as it is for women. Although the focus is on the image of women, the video explores the effects of this image on men.

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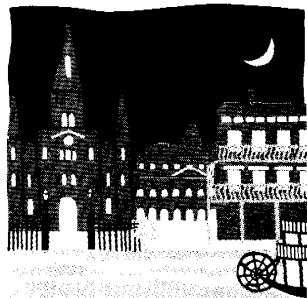

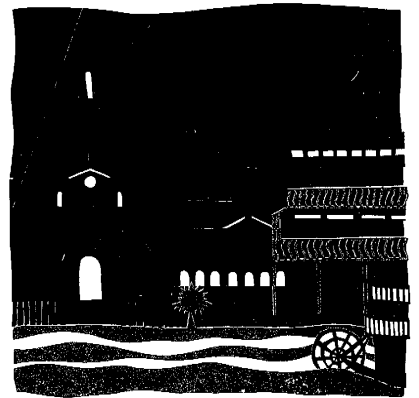
